Publisher Stuart Keate
Plans Informal Approach

One of the few things the
CBC and its dissident producers
have been able to agree upon is
the selection of Stuart Keate as
the man to seek a solution to
their differences.

Controversy has marked the
career of the heavy-set, greying
publisher of the Vancouver Sun
but he has been involved in
making it more often than medi-
ating it.

In capsule, the background of
P. E. I. Minister Pearson's
chosen peace-maker:
Born in Vancouver 52 years
ago began newspaper work in
1933 as a 20-cent-an-inch space-
writer. Graduate of the Univer-
sity of British Columbia. Golf
writer for the Vancouver Provin-
cial, later Toronto Star re-
porter before moving back to
The Province as a feature
writer. He spent three years in
the navy - rising to lieutenant-
commander and worked for
Time magazine in New York
and Montreal. He became pub-
lisher of the Victoria Times be-
fore moving to The Sun in simi-
lar capacity. He has been pres-
ident of The Canadian Press
and of the Canadian Daily
Newspaper Publishers Associa-
tion and was a founder of the
Canadian committee of the in-
ternational Press Institute, an
organization of journalists in 30
countries which attempts to
promote better understanding
among non-Communist peoples.

INFORMAL APPROACH
For the promoting of better
understanding between the CBC
and the producers, Mr. Keate's
approach will be informal. He
does not plan to hold hearings
or call witnesses, but will read
files and briefs and hold dis-
cussions in his Ottawa hotel
suite.

His report will go to the
prime minister.
Why was the pipe-smoking
publisher, who operates more
than 2,000 miles from the seat
of the controversy, chosen for
the job?
In his words:
"As a person who came up
as a writer, I have some knowl-
edge of the creative process
and, as a newspaper executive,
I have some knowledge of man-
agement. I guess this provides
some balance and makes me
acceptable to both sides."

Mr. Keate says he has
watched 80 to 90 per cent of the
This Hour Has Seven Days pro-
gram, the touchstone of the con-
troversy.
"I think it's a very lively and
provocative show. It's unique in
that there's never been a show
quite like it."

However, he believes the show
sometimes "went off the top
Seven Days is the focal point,
end" and stresses that while
Seven Days is the focal point,
producer-CBC differences ap-
pear to go deeper.
As his paper comments edi-
torially:
"The present clash . . . ob-
scures a much wider issue of
organization policy."

RAPPED MEDICAL MEN
Mr. Keate's personal clashes
have included battles with:
-The medical profession - "for
underestimating the vast
and compelling" interest of
the public in the work of doc-
tors. Arnie Myers, Sun medi-
cal writer, won a National
Newspaper Award for a 1965
series on water pollution.

-The courts - for what he
called the tendency of jurists
to control the flow of court-
room news that may be used
in the press.
-The press - for being timid
and complacent. "The main
job of a newspaper is to hold
up the mirror of life and
we're not doing it."

He has taken on all-recog-
nized political parties on either
the federal or provincial level.
Mr. Keate's 1965 run-in with
Premier W. A. C. Bennett and
his Social Credit administration
led to a charge by the British
Columbia premier that Mr.
Keate was trying to become
leader of the Liberal party.

He took on the Liberals on a
federal scale when former jus-
tice minister Guy Favreau sug-
gested the government might
stop publication of the names
of accused persons until after
conviction.

Said Mr. Keate:
"The press of Canada is be-
coming increasingly concerned
about government tinkering

Trade luncheon in Vancouver
that Prime Minister Diefen-
baker's hesitation in backing
United States action in the Cu-
ban crisis made "him feel
ashamed of being a Cana-
dian."

Mr. Keate feels himself to be
essentially a reporter and a re-
porter's job is "to expose the
facts and lay them open to pub-
lic scrutiny, secure in the knowl-
edge that truth has never yet
lost an argument."

Personally, he is quick-wit-
ted but quiet - a personality he
does not advocate for his news-
paper.

It is the job of the
newspaper to make itself ob-
servant to promote ferment
and change, to challenge seem-
ingly orthodox theories and de-
fend the right of unpopular
opinions."

The Keate wit is a family
trait. Brother Jeff is a widely
syndicated cartoonist for pub-
lications all over North America.
It is a wry wit: He once told
a group of budget-conscious
newspaper executives:
"I suspect that we have been
spending too much time sharp-
ening our pencils and not
enough sharpening our papers."

DIG UP GRISLY HISTORY
BERLIN (AP) - A cellar ex-
cavation in Frankfurt has un-
covered what experts believe is
the mass grave of Swedish sol-
diers killed more than 300 years
ago. The site is near a moat
that surrounded Frankfurt be-
fore King Gustavus Adolphus of
Sweden sacked the city in 1631.

POLITICIAN ESCAPES
ALGIERS (AP) - Hocine A.H.
Ahmed, imprisoned Algerian
politician, has escaped, usually
well-informed sources said
Monday. Aft Ahmed led an up-
rising in late 1965 and was ar-
rested a year later and sen-
tenced to death. But Ahmed
Ben Bella, then president, com-
muted his sentence to life-im-
prisonment.
