

Farm Activities Reviewed In Report Tabled In House

The annual report of the Department of Agriculture reveals a slight increase in the quantity of butter produced last year over 1956, but a noticeable rise in the number of patrons selling cream. There were 5,662,427 pounds of butter compared to 5,644, 075 in value for last year of \$3,498,619, the preceding year with a gross increase in cream solders was 52. The report of the Department administered by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture, was tabled in the Legislature yesterday, and covers all branches of the department.

Cheese production dropped 12.71 pounds to 839,494 pounds with a gross value of \$306,577. Pasteurized milk production dropped 163,200 pounds to 11,180,490 while the making of ice cream rose 20,168 quarts to 811,900.

During the year the Department made grants to Exhibitions totalling over \$27,000.

FARM ANIMALS
The report shows almost consistent declines in the numbers of all farm animals with only cattle and sheep close to the totals for the previous year. It noted that during the year dogs killed 77 sheep an increase of 45 over 1956. Popularity of the Harvest Exhibition was remarked as shown by the over 700 entries received in all classes. However, it was felt that efforts should be made to have more of the entries come from Prince and Kings counties.

Falcons Farm showed more revenue than expenditure an excess of \$227, with sales of cattle and swine to other than institutions amounting to \$10,000.

EXHIBITIONS
Dealing with exhibitions it is noted in the report that the handicraft, art, food and flower exhibition last year drew 1,653 entries and there were 275 entries from

this province at the Maritime Winter Fair as it featured a women's work display for the first time. County exhibitions here were held at Alberton, Crapaud, Dundas, Egmont Bay and Souris.

It also shows that during the year there were 9 new 4-H clubs formed since September.

In his annual report Dr. George Fisher, Director of Veterinary Services, stated that the year brought the province two firsts in Canada. It is the first to be declared a Certified Brucellosis Control Area by the Canada Department of Agriculture and the first of artificial insemination to all cattle owners.

VETERINARY SERVICE
Veterinary Service of the livestock owners of the Province has shown a steady increase each year. The six practising Veterinarians responded to 9233 calls, treated 10,876 animals and drove approximately 180,253 in performing their duties. The break down according to species is Cattle 7,653; Swine 2,301; Sheep 290; Horses 632.

There is one herd of cattle with 132 head in the province and located in Queen's County. The next largest herd of 121 head is in Prince County. They are the only two herds having more than 100. The report also shows a bonus was paid on sixty-five bulls during the calendar year 1957.

With the advent of artificial insemination and with this service now available to every cattle owner in the province the Sire Policy is no longer necessary for most areas in this province. However there are still some areas requiring it, where telephone service is poor or non-existent or where road conditions are very bad during the season when the cows are bred.

POULTRY
In dealing with poultry it is revealed that there were 11 hatcheries operating last year: 6 commercial chick hatcheries; 2 R. O. P. breeder hatcheries; 2 turkey hatcheries, and 1 duck and goose hatchery.

There was an increase of 8 to 69 in the number of Approved Flocks shipping hatching eggs and this was attributable mainly to one hatchery establishing a number of flocks for the purpose of supplying eggs for broiler chicks.

The soil laboratory division received 371 samples of soil for testing, higher than the previous year but considerably fewer than in the previous years.

The Forestry Division reported having 72,000 young trees of various species on hand for planting this year with balsam fir leading by a wide margin with 31,900. Last year 40,000 were planted on Government owned land and 28,500 on privately owned land.

Four Hospitals Accredited By Joint Commission
Four Prince Edward Island Hospitals, the Charlottetown Hospital, the P.E.I. Hospital, the Provincial Sanatorium and the Prince County Hospital, have been accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals, which includes the American College of Physicians, the American College of Surgeons, the American Hospital Association, the American Medical Association and the Canadian Medical Association.

There are approximately 7,000 hospitals eligible for accreditation but Dr. Kenneth B. Babcock, Commission Director, pointed out that the omission of a hospital from the list did not necessarily mean it had failed to pass an accreditation survey. The accreditation program is a voluntary one and only those hospitals which request surveys are visited, therefore, some hospitals not listed may not have requested surveys. Hospitals with less than 25 beds are with rare exceptions, not eligible for accreditation.

"Accreditation of a hospital means," Dr. Babcock said, "that it has voluntarily submitted to a survey of its facilities and its personnel, and the committee, Mrs. W. Lowther, Mrs. J. Donahue and Mrs. Ford Wilson to choose one and select the characters as soon as possible."

Six Men Are Sentenced In Butter Cases
Sentences were imposed on six men in County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning in cases involving theft of stolen goods— the offence called for a sentence of up to 10 years in prison. Melvin Louis Ford, Joseph Stanford Biggar and Thomas Robert Jones, charged with the theft or possession of stolen goods totalling less than \$50, could receive a sentence of two years.

On the former charges, he continued that a sentence must be imposed.

Peters and Taylor, both charged with the theft of six-50 lb. cases of butter, two-30 lb. cases of lard and two-30 lb. cases of shortening totalling \$237.60 during the period of September 15, 1957 to February 10, 1958, were sentenced to two months in the Queen's County Jail plus an additional fine of \$100 or one month.

Emerson Rowan Ford was sentenced to 30 days in prison plus an additional \$100 or one month in jail for having in his possession two-50 lb. cases of butter and two 30 lb. cases of lard totalling \$82.

Fines of \$50 and costs or one month in jail were imposed upon Biggar and Jones.

Biggar was charged with having in his possession 10 one-pound packages of butter totalling \$6.40 while Jones was charged with the theft of one pound of butter. Melvin Ford was fined \$100 and costs or 30 days on the charge of being in possession of one-50 lb. case of butter.

Three more men, appearing on similar charges will appear before Magistrate Gaudet next week. The cases against Frank Louis O'Brien and Clyde Donald Bell were remanded until Monday, March 24.

James Bernard Carragher elected to be tried by Magistrate's Court when he appeared yesterday. No plea was given and the case was adjourned at the request of his counsel M.A. Farmer until March 26.
