## Audience Demands Piano Team Encore

The Alumni of St. Dunstan's deserve the thanks of the public for their continuing initiative in arranging concerts by reputable artists, both local and visiting.

The duo-piano team of Nelson and Neal gave a programme that was interesting to the general public and connoisseurs alike.

The first half of the programme was dedicated to two works conceived for four hands on a single keyboard, starting with the well-known Overture to A Midsummer Night's Dream in its little-known original version as written by Mendelssohn when a lad of seventeen but already a mature composer.

There is little doubt that Mendelssohn was thinking in orchestral terms even at this stage, but it comes off quite well as a piano duet, and our soloists gave a sparkling performance of it in spite of a slight lapse of memory near the end. The shimmering "fairytale" passages were a little scrambled, and I think that a slightly slower tempo would have been advantageous. In Mendelssohn's music every detail should be absolutely clear and tidy, even when he is being "atmospheric".

The Brahms Serenade in its two-piano version was unearthed by Mr. Neal from the collection of the late Paul Wittgenstein, and contains much beautiful music. Unfortunately the acoustics of the somewhat cavernous auditorium emphasized the harsh overtones of the pianos and militated against the full enjoyment of this work.

After the intermission a Shostakovich novelty of stupefying banality was offered. In compensation, this was followed by a ravishingly beautiful reading of Ravel's Rhapsodie Espagnole, more familiar in its orchestral
