

KENNEDY FIRES SECOND GOAL

Rookie Paces Bruins To 5-2 Win Over Chicago

BOSTON (CP)—Larry Regan, a 26-year-old rookie from Quebec, scored twice and got two assists Thursday night in Boston's 5-2 National Hockey League victory over Chicago.

Veteran Vic Stasiuk added two goals for the Bruins, who moved into a third-place tie with the New York.

Doug Mohs and Real Chevrefils also scored for the home forces. Forbes Kennedy and Ken Mosdell collected the Black Hawk tallies.

Regan's goal gave the Bruins a 2-1 lead in the second period, firing the imaginations of the 10,507 onlookers. The newcomer took a pass at his blue line, weaved across the ice through the defence, faked his way around Ed Litzenberger and fired past goalie

Al Rollins into the far corner from 12 feet out.

CALLED ILLEGAL

Boston trailing 1-0 in the first period, apparently scored when Mohs' corner pass bounced cleanly off Stasiuk's chest into the nets. Referee Ed Powers signalled the goal illegal because he said the puck was pushed in by a hand. Boston led 3-1 entering the final period when Jack Caffery fired the puck into the nets. Players on both sides immediately suspended action and the tally was recorded on the scoreboard. However, goal judge Bill Cleary said no goal and later defended his call by saying the puck had hit the crossbar.

Says Governments Should Give More Aid To Amateur Sports

TORONTO (CP) — President K.D. McKenzie of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada said Thursday the provincial and federal governments should give greater assistance to all amateur sports.

He told 40 delegates at the opening of the union's 63rd annual meeting that the governments could assist "by supplying proper coaches to schools and recreation centres," as well as through financial grants.

The AAU includes national committees on boxing, fencing, gymnastics, handball, track and field, weightlifting and wrestling. It controls the selection of members of Canada's Olympic team, and other internationally competing teams, in those sports.

McKenzie, from Vancouver, said the British Columbia branch of the union expects a firm commitment for assistance from the provincial government in the near future. He did not elaborate.

Commenting briefly on the forthcoming Olympic games in Australia, he said Canada's team while not as large as had been hoped for, is as strong as ever before, and possibly stronger in track and field competitions.

The delegates represent union branches in British Columbia, Saskatchewan, Alberta, Manitoba, Central and Southwestern Ontario, Quebec and Nova Scotia, as well as the three armed services.

Other reports Thursday were by honorary secretary E. K. Yost of Winnipeg and honorary treasurer J. M. Wilkie of Regina.

Horvath was sent to Providence of the AHL only a couple of days ago. He played with Rangers last season and was formerly property of Detroit Red Wings when he played with Edmonton in the Western Hockey League.

CAMDEN N.J. (AP) — Jockey Willie Hartack the nation's number one rider suffered an eye injury in Thursday's third race at Garden State Park.

Hartack was riding the Calumet Farm's 2-year-old Clardy and was just pulling down his goggles when he was hit in the left eye apparently by a clod of dirt. His right eye immediately began to water and Hartack momentarily blinded said he took his mount to the outside.

Clardy finished out of the money. After examination at the track first aid station Hartack was released but cancelled his remaining mounts as well as those slated for today.

There was some good luck to the day for Hartack as he picked up his 320th victory of the season in the second race aboard Grandpa's Sue.

5-Man Committee To Name All-stars For Dec. 5 Game

WINNIPEG (CP)—A five-man selection committee has been named to handle the choice of the two teams participating in the second annual Canadian east-west all-star Shrine football game at Vancouver, Dec. 8.

Chairman of the committee named at a closed meeting Wednesday night, is Ralph Misener of Winnipeg, head of the Canadian Rugby Union group on the national committee in charge of the game.

Eastern representatives are Don F. Downey of Toronto, first vice-president of the CRU, and J. P. McCaffrey of Ottawa, president of the Big Four; Western—Ken Montgomery of Edmonton, president of the CRU, and Karl Slocumb of Winnipeg, president of the Western Interprovincial Football Union.

Selection of the two all-star teams will be based on results of the popular vote of fans across Canada, together with selections by the sports writers, radio and TV sportscasters and coaches of the nine teams in the two major leagues. Final selection will be announced Nov. 27.

Millar fended off 26 shots, 12 of them in the final period, as the Aces battled back from a 1-0 deficit and went on to score three unanswered goals.

After two scoreless periods, Greig Hicks of Chicoutimi tallied. Orval Tessier of Quebec squared the count and a little more than a minute later Skip Teal caged what proved to be the winner. Defenceman Jean Paul Lamrande added an insurance tally.

COACHES USE PSYCHOLOGY

NEW YORK (AP)—It was a dark, soggy day with the rain falling monotonously and the sports news was pretty well lost in the flow of bulletins from the Middle East.

There was a brief story quoting Hank Greenberg to the effect that Leo Durocher said he wasn't available to manage Cleveland Indians and another item revealing New York Giants had signed Hank Greenberg to the effect that youth movements were fairly long pieces, one quoting Colorado coach Dal Ward on the mental fortitude of his footballers as they prepared to face Oklahoma, and the other telling how coach Eddie Erdelatz is at the prospect of his Navy team meeting Notre Dame Saturday.

GOOD PSYCHOLOGY

The two stories offer a vivid lesson in applied psychology, as each coach is using tactics designed to prepare his team mentally for the particular problem confronting it.

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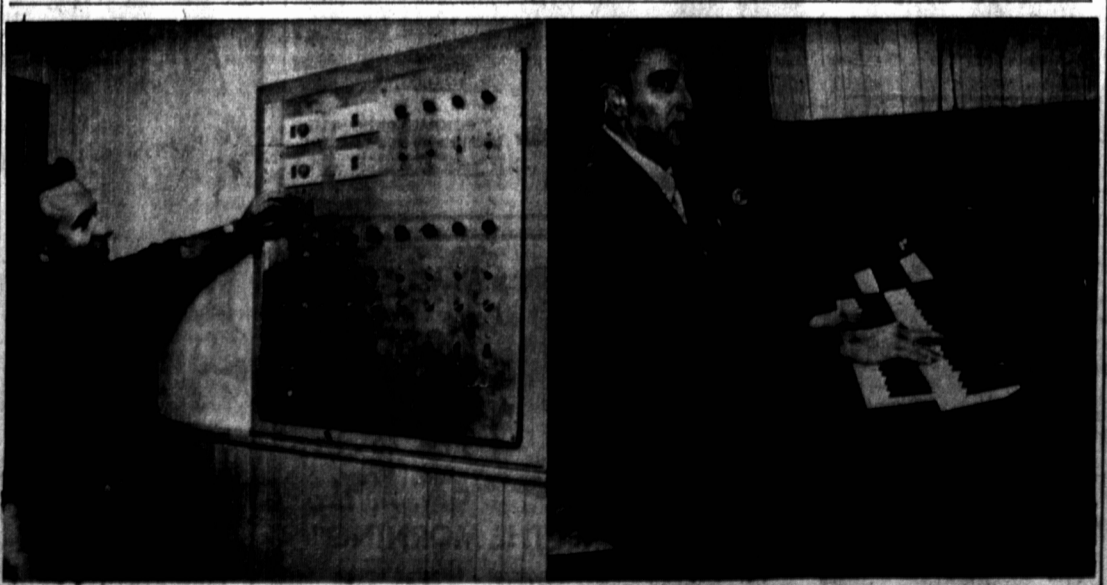
