News by Telegraph.

LONDON, August 12, evening.—Information has been received here that an American ship recently attempted to make a landing at a port in the Island of Formosa, but that the officer in charge of the boat was killed by the natives. The name of the ship and that of the murdered officer is not given.

PARIS, August 12, evening.—It is asserted that a meeting will certainly take place between the Emperor Napoleon and the King of Prussia.

DUBLIN, August 12.—The case of Captain Moriarty, who was arrested during the first of the Fenian outbreaks in Kerry, and who has been on trial for treason before the Commission in that county, has resulted in the conviction of the accused. The sentence has not yet been pronounced.

GIBRALTAR, August 12.—The Austrian Frigate *Nearre*, despatched to Mexico for the purpose of obtaining and bringing back to Austria the remains of the late Maximilian, after receiving from the Austrian Government her orders, for which she was waiting at this port, sailed to-day for Vera Cruz.

LONDON, August 13, evening.—Advices from Shanghai give the following account of a conflict between two steamers of the American squadron in Chinese waters, and the pirates at the Island of Formosa. The United States authorities having received neither satisfaction nor apology for the murder of the crew of the American barque *Rover*, the *Starford* and the *Wyoming* were ordered to the scene of the outrage at the Island Formosa. They sailed early in June, and arriving off shore, a demand was made for the surrender of the murderers, which not being complied with, and in the meantime it being apparent that the natives were preparing for fight, the shore was vigorously shelled by both vessels. Several boats of sailors and marines subsequently effected a landing, and a sharp fight ensued with the Formosians which lasted over five hours. The heat was intense. One hundred and fifty officers and men were reported as struck. Lieut. Sillit McKennie, of the landing party, was shot, and died of his wounds. At nightfall the fighting party was withdrawn from the shore, and the bombardment was resumed, and continued until the natives had all disappeared, when the two ships sailed for Shanghai, where they arrived on the 15th of June.—Consols 98 7-8. Corn 38s 9d.

LONDON, Aug. 14.—Further advices from China state that the port of Tomoso, in Japan, has been designed by the Japan Government for the use of foreigners, and thrown open to the commerce of all nations in accordance with the agreement made with the foreign representatives at Osaka.

LONDON, Aug. 15, (midnight).—In the House of Commons to-night the regulation Park Bill intended to prevent public meetings in the Royal Parks, was withdrawn by the Government.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—Despatches from Constantinople state that the Turkish Government after giving due consideration to the collective note of the European Powers has come to the conclusion that it cannot admit of intervention of other Governments in the affairs of the Island of Candia, and refuses to assent to the enquiry proposed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 15th.—The Sultan on his return here received an address from the Grand Vizier, whom he left in charge of the Government during his absence. In his reply the Sultan, after reviewing his recent journey to Western Europe, says, as the result of his observations, he is prompted to inaugurate an era of progress for the Ottoman Empire, and he promised to submit a series of measures of reform for the benefit of his subjects.

BERLIN, Aug. 15, eve.—A meeting is being planned to take place between the King of Prussia and the Emperor of Austria.

LONDON, Aug. 15, eve.—The House of Lords have decided the appeal in the bankruptcy of Overend, Gurney & Co., which was brought before them, in favor of the liquidators.

FRANKFORT, 15th.—Last night a disastrous fire broke out in the Domkirche, or Roman Catholic Cathedral. The structure was of great antiquity; dated from the year A. D. 1426, and was famous for its architectural beauty and historic associations. All the elaborate decorations of the interior were destroyed and the walls, roof and tower were so badly injured that it will probably be necessary to take the whole building down.

FIGUERA, Aug. 15.—Garibaldi is known to be at Sienna, where it is said he is actively engaged in renewing the preparations for a movement on Rome which was to have been attempted last month.

At a horse fair at Buffalo yesterday the great trotter 'Dexter,' trotted against his best time, making a mile in harness 2 minutes 17 1/2 seconds—the best on record. Sold 405-8.

There were 3333 deaths from cholera in Sicily for the week ending July 24.—The Empress Carlotta is in better spirits, and her mental condition has slightly improved. She knows Maximilian is dead, but fancies he died from fever.—In Rome and most of the cities of Italy where cholera prevailed, the disease is abating.—The latest quotation of gold is 111.—Quite a serious riot occurred in the Halifax Penitentiary on Sunday last. Windows were smashed, and everything that the riotous inmates could lay their hands on, was destroyed. The soldiers were called in to quell the disturbance, which they succeeded in doing after wounding several of the rioters. The riot was a concerted affair.
