REGINA, Sask., Nov. 30—(CP)—Zachary MacAulay (Zach) Hamilton, 78, pioneer Western Canada newspaper man and author, died yesterday.

He finished writing a Christmas message for his magazine, The School Trustee, at 11:30 P. M. last night. At 1 A. M. he died of a heart attack.

Mr. Hamilton was born in the Shetland Islands and as a young man in Edinburgh knew Robert Louis Stevenson and John Buchan. He is said to have made a million in Regina real estate in the early days.

### Guide Scroll Welcomed in Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 30—(CP)—A small uniformed welcoming committee will be on hand at Uplands Airport Wednesday—and this time the occasion won't be the arrival of a visiting dignitary.

Instead, the group, composed of Girl Guide heads in the area, will receive a hand-painted illuminated scroll of friendship.

The scroll, which carries the greetings of British guides to the guides of each of 28 member countries of the world association, has passed through the hands of guides and brownies throughout Eastern Canada.
