Report Large Deposit Of Vital Tungsten In N.B.

NEW YORK (AP)—H. M. Porteus, president of Burnt Hill Tungsten Mines Ltd. announced here Sunday his company has estab-lished that it has the largest known deposit of wolframite tungsten on the North American continent and plans to double the present 150 tons a day capacity of its tungsten mill in York county, New Brunswick.

Porteus said wolframite tungsten, a vital mineral in both modern industry and in war, is known to exist in quantity in South Africa, north Korea, Communist China and Portugal. Most North American tungsten mines, however, are oper-ating in what is known as scheelite ore—inferior to wolframite and more expensive to mine and pro-cess.

HAS MANY USES

Porteus said his mine had al-ready made two shipments of tungsten concentrate which assayed at 80.4 per cent and 83.5 per cent—considerably above minimum re-quirements for commercial con-centrate.

Because of its hardness and re-sistance to heat, tungsten has many uses in modern industry. It is used to strengthen steel against wear, shock and heat and is essential in the manufacture of jet engines. Tungsten carbide is a well known material in cutting tools and tungsten in various forms is used in TV screens, surgical instruments, watch springs and electronic tubes.

Cool Shipments To Nfld Delayed

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld (CP) - The Dominion Steel and Coal Corpora-tion has told the Newfoundland board of trade in a telegram that strikes and a preference for North Sydney coal had delayed ship-ments of coal to Newfoundland.

It was reported Saturday the trade board had protested to the company that Newfoundland school-ers were finding it difficult to get access to North Sydney coal.

Disco said the congestion started in mid-September when "there were strikes at the north side collieries." It said the delay could be avoided if Newfoundland school-ers would take Dominion coal at Sydney, but they preferred to wait for North Sydney coal.

The telegram said only a limited quantity of North Sydney coal was available, and it had to be fairly distributed among the Atlantic provinces.

"We have today persuaded a few school-ers to take Dominion coal at Sydney and hope the congestion will end soon. However, we should have the alternative to load either at North Sydney or Sydney to avoid undue delays."

Forecast Boost In Steel Prices

CLEVELAND (AP)—An increase in steel prices next year is forecast today by Steel magazine.

It says the increase, expected about midyear, will stem from two factors—steel workers' union con-tracts and inventory buildup.

Inventory buildup will be the aim of steel users in the first half of the year in efforts to beat the price raise, the metalworking weekly adds. Consumers have been in-clined to build inventories this year, but haven't made much progress.

The magazine says consumption is expected to continue at a high rate during the first six months of 1956, with the automobile, heavy construction and railroad industries the big users.

Producers, meanwhile, are pro-ducing at near capacity to satisfy the current demand. Last week's output was at 97 per cent of rated capacity, a drop of half a point from the preceding week.

Steel's price composite on steel-making scrap dropped 33 cents to \$45 a gross ton. That on finished steel was unchanged.

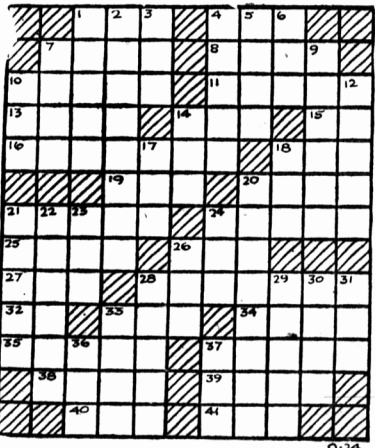


FIRST OIL WELL IN NORTH AMERICA

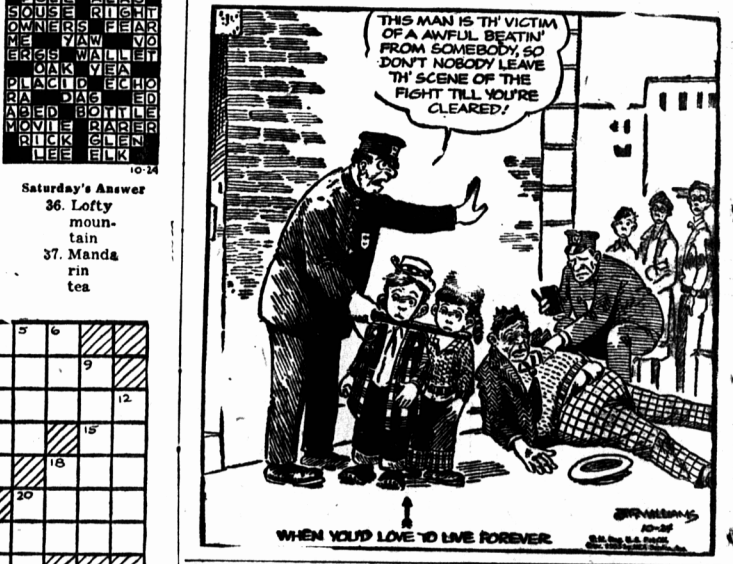

N.Y. Stock Market Gets Recovery Drive Rolling

NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market got its recovery drive rolling vigorously last week with the stoniest advance in nearly a year. It was four weeks ago that President Eisenhower suffered his heart attack. The stock market tumbled the next Monday in one of the worst falls in its history.

The shock of uncertainties surrounding Eisenhower's illness finally wore off, and last week the market touched bottom. Since then it has been advancing with growing vigor until now it has retraced nearly 36 per cent of its fall.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks last week rose \$4.20 and closed at \$169.90.

Brokers aren't throwing their hats into the air with shouts that it's all over now. The general opinion is that the market's original fall and its subsequent recovery have been within normal bounds.

The five most active issues last week on the New York stock exchange were U.S. Steel up 2 1/2%; Westinghouse Electric up 1 1/2%; General Motors "when issued" up 1 1/2%; and Sperry Rand up 1/2% at 22 1/2%.

Among Canadian issues on the New York exchange, Dome Mines gained 1/2% over the week's trading and closed at 14 1/2% Friday, International Nickel was up 3/4% at 76 1/2%, Canadian Pacific gained 1/4% at 31 1/2%, Hiram Walker was up 1/4% to 71 and Distillers Seagrams added 1/4% to 42 1/2%.

On the American exchange, Lake Shore lost 1/4% and closed at 5, Clud Yellowknife was down 7/16 at 5 1/2% and Royalite was unchanged at 13 1/2%.

Three Monarchs To Visit India Next Three Months

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—India will host within the next eight months to three monarchs, 10 pre-miers and a galaxy of other im-portant guests from 19 countries.

The first of the royal visitors will be the King Ibn Saud of Saudi Arabia, who is expected at the end of November. Next will be the Shah of Iran, who will pay a state visit to India with Quee Soray in February or March. He will be followed, in March or April, by the emperor of Ethiopia, Haile Selas-sie.

The visit which will attract most interest, particularly abroad, will be that of the Soviet premier, Marshal Nikolai Bulganin, who, with other members of the Polit-buro, including Communist party boss Nikita Khrushchev, will ar-rive in India for a tour of two to three weeks at the end of Novem-ber.

Chinese Communist Premier Chou En-lai, who came to India last year, is due to make a second visit sometime during the next few months on his way to Cairo. U Nu, the Burmese prime minister, also will visit New Delhi for a few days this month.

Another seven Asian premiers, from Japan, Cambodia, Laos, Viet Nam, Thailand, Ceylon and Nepal, are being invited to India next May for the celebrations of the 2,500th anniversary of the Bud-dah's birth.

Says School Facilities Short in Newfoundland

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) - The Telegram says pupils in all but 50 of the province's 1,138 schools are learning their three R's in ram-shackle framework buildings, with-out benefit of drinking water, wash-ing facilities, or any other form of indoor sanitation. And hundreds of children in St. John's have no school to attend.

At present, it says, Newfound-land is short 300 classrooms and teachers. A school-age population increase of 5,000 a year means that almost 170 additional classrooms and teachers will be required each year.

Less than half the present 2,583 teachers had more than a year of college training and 384 had none at all.

The paper says hundreds of school-age children in St. John's "are still unable to gain admission to classrooms because of limited facilities. There's no shortage of teachers in St. John's, but there is a definite shortage of classroom space."

It says new schools are being built but more are needed.

A principal is quoted as saying for his school "if we had 10 more classrooms we could fit them. It will be a great day for St. John's when we have the facilities to ac-commodate all the children of school age."
