Former Islander Honored At Reception

Friends and neighbors gathered at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cairns of Lower Freetown recently, to renew friendships with their son Robert and to welcome him and his wife and daughter, Lisbeth, on their brief holiday. Mr. R. Allison Profit was appointed master of ceremonies, and after a few brief remarks, called on Mr. William Cairns who read an address of welcome to the presentation of a well-filled purse was made by Mr. Howard Cairns, Robert, who left the Island at an early age, is a graduate of Prince of Wales College, also a graduate of Queen's University, Kingston, Ontario. Since his graduation he has been employed by the Department of Transport, radio branch, in the Dominion Government.

His home is now in Ottawa. His work has twice taken him overseas, first to France, where he was the only delegate representing Canada and the United States at a conference held in Paris. He also was a delegate to a later conference held in Italy. In his reply to the address from the assembly of neighbors he gave a very interesting account of his travels abroad, and of the conditions in both France and Italy. He spoke on such topics as food, ways of travel, architecture, political unrest, and the very many ancient buildings, ruins, etc. which may be seen in these countries. This discourse was with great interest and was much appreciated. Mr. and Mrs. Cairns were accompanied to the Island by Mrs. Cairns' mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Harry Cruce, of Trenton, Ontario, who later spent some time in Annapolis Valley, visiting the apple orchards. At the close of the evening lunch was served by Mrs. Frank Cairns, assisted by the ladies present.

West Prince Contributions To B. & F. Bible Society

The people of the Protestant churches of West Prince have again made fine contributions to the finances of the British and Foreign Bible Society, according to the annual report for 1950 which has just been issued. Special credit must be given to the Bloomfield Branch, which has given the largest amount in West Prince, almost one hundred and thirty dollars (\$129.90). The president of this branch is Edward MacAusland. The secretary is G. Russel Leard and the treasurer is Ivan Webb.

Other centers in West Prince have contributed as follows: Alberton, almost one hundred and twenty-six dollars (\$125.95); Brae, \$42.41; O'Leary, \$40.80; Glenwood and West Point, \$40.75; Knutsford, \$25.40; Elmsdale, \$15.45; Ellerslie and Bideford, \$34.30; Montrose, \$70.40; West Devon, \$5.00; Fort Hill and Lot 14, \$22.65; Cape Wolfe, \$33.75; Freeland, \$64.36; Campbellton, \$19.45. The largest amount in the Prince Edward Island Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society was contributed by Summerside which donated \$5,636.68. The Capital City gave \$2,256.07. Another community, Bequete, made a splendid showing, contributing \$357.25.

Financially, the year 1950 has been a good one for the Bible Society. General branch contributions including Life Memberships and offerings total over eight thousand dollars (\$8,070.77) which is an increase of over one hundred dollars (\$102.33) over last year. Requests yielded \$5,165.90 for the work of the Society, a magnificent increase over the \$1,332.00 of the year before.

During the year twenty-two new Life Memberships were issued. Of the 81 branches of the Bible Society in P. E. I., 35 forwarded an increased contribution. In these figures there is great cause for thanksgiving to the Giver of all good that in the face of trying times, these expanded resources have been forthcoming for the meeting of the tremendous challenge of the world for the Word of God.

Splendid work has been done by the District Secretary, Rev. E. M. B. Wheelock, B.A., B.D., S.T.M., of Saint John, N. B.


