



NEW LIQUOR OUTLET OPENED IN CITY

The new retail outlet for the P.E.I. Liquor Control Commission located in the Royalty Mall was officially opened yesterday morning by Mayor Walter J. Cox. Seen with the Mayor at the ribbon cutting ceremony outside the

main entrance to the store are B. Wood, center, chairman of the commission, and Fred Davidson, a representative of Royalty Mall Limited. Others attending the ceremony included officials of M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., devel-

opers of Royalty Mall, and representatives of the City of Charlottetown. Development of the project in the northern section of Charlottetown is expected to approach a construction cost of approximately \$1,500,000 before completion within a year.

bulls for beef sires on their performance on rate of gain per day of age. A really good gain runs slightly more than three and one-half pounds per day.

An interesting comparison in this regard is the fact that of the 24 steers that competed in the steer class at the Atlantic Winter Fair last month, they ran from a low of less than one pound of live weight per day of age, to a high of 1.36 pounds. The grand champion steer had an average gain per day of age of 1.33 pounds, but the reserve grand champion was down to 1.03 pounds. Irving MacDonald, York had the steer that topped the class on the hoof and was third in total points, and this animal had an average gain of 1.35 pounds per day of age.

Suspended Sentence Given By Magistrate In Theft Case

GEORGETOWN — David John Butler, Gaspereau, elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to breaking and entering the fish shack of Guy Graham and stealing a chain saw, the property of Colin R. MacDonald, when he appeared before Kings County Stipendiary Magistrate, James B. Johnston, Q.C. at Georgetown yesterday.

Butler, who had no previous criminal record, was given a two-year suspended sentence and ordered to enter into a recognizance in the amount of \$500, with one surety, and to keep the peace. Deputy attorney general, J. Arthur McGuigan represented the Crown in all cases.

Everett James William MacLeod, Georgetown, was fined \$20 and costs of \$14 or 10 days in default of payment and ordered to pay damages of \$2 or serve a further one day in jail when found guilty of damaging a coat, the property of Yvon Bouchard. Giving evidence were Mr. Bouchard, his wife, and Allison Grover. The accused who was represented by Kenneth R. MacDonald did not give evidence or call witnesses.

Herbert Carroll and James Lawrence MacMahon, both of Georgetown, were each fined \$20 and costs for failing to assist a peace officer in the execution of his duty in arresting a person. The charges arose out of an incident in Georgetown on Nov. 20.

Raymond Martin Griffin, Montague, pleaded guilty to using profane language. He was fined \$15 and costs. Griffin pleaded not guilty to a charge of obstructing RCMP Cst. William Downap in the lawful execution of his duty. This case was adjourned by consent to Dec. 15.

Recount Gives Quebec Seat To Liberal

GRANBY, Que. (CP)—Louis Paul Neveu, Liberal candidate in Shefford riding, in the Nov. 8 federal election, was officially declared elected following a judicial recount which ended Wednesday.

Returning Officer Paul Langlois announced the official result as: Mr. Neveu, 9,494; Lucien Pearson, independent Liberal, 518; Gilbert Rousseau, Cretiniste, 9,447; Paul O. Trepanier, Progressive Conservative, 9,467. The number of votes rejected in the judicial recount was 424.

The recount was held under the supervision of Mr. Justice Evander Veilleux of Quebec Superior Court.

In the original count of Nov. 8, the leading candidate was Mr. Trepanier. Later when the service vote was counted, Mr. Neveu came out ahead. A judicial recount was then sought by Mr. Trepanier and Mr. Rousseau.

Judge Veilleux upheld a decision made by the returning officer Nov. 15 following the discovery of a sealed but empty ballot box from Waterloo, Que.

Mr. Langlois at the time accepted the figures for the box, No. 59, given to him by the Waterloo returning officer. The figures had previously been given to the candidates and were accepted by them.

Remains Of Barn Burn At Vernon

A barn burning in Vernon yesterday drew attention from passing motorists who travelled on the Trans Canada Highway in the Seal River area.

The building, located on the farm of Curley Drake of Vernon had previously been torn down.

Mr. Drake last night said he disposed of the remains of the building by burning them.

Island Native Named Hall Of Fame Member

A P.E.I. native, Alberta's "cowboy senator," the late Daniel E. Riley was recently named as a member of the Canadian Agricultural Hall of Fame. His portrait was hung in the Royal Winter Fair Building in Toronto, in the presence of family members and directors of the Western Stock Growers Association, which nominated him for the honor.

The late Senator Riley was born in Baltic, Lot 18, in 1860, where he taught school before moving to Western Canada in 1881. In 1883 he was a cowboy in High River, Alberta. Two years later when the Riel rebellion broke out he volunteered and was signed up as a despatch rider. After being murdered out he filed on a homestead at High River and developed a cattle spread.

High River and Dan Riley literally grew up together. When it was incorporated as a town in 1906, Dan Riley was elected the first mayor. When the first schoolboard was formed, Dan Riley was the first chairman.

He was one of the organizers of the Western Stock Growers Association and was president of it for a number of years.

In 1927 he was appointed to the Senate. He was married to the former Edith Thompson of Darnley, P.E.I. who predeceased him. Two sons Neil and Kenneth also predeceased him. Remaining family members are Claude of Calgary, Alberta, Dan

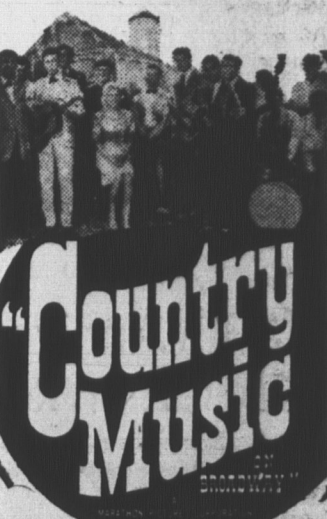
