Richmond Team Clears Last Hurdle

RICHMOND, Va., (AP)—Richmond cleared the last hurdle in its efforts to become a member of the class AAA International League Tuesday night when four men raised \$200,000 to make improvements of municipally-owned Parker Field.

Mayor Ed Haddock made the announcement less than four hours before the deadline set by the league for Richmond to find a home park that would meet triple-A requirements.

Richmond's entrance into the IL now is considered only a formality.

Only Monday night, city council agreed by a vote of 7-to-2 to make Parker Field available for baseball use. Haddock had regarded this as the biggest obstacle and had considered the action of the council as assurance Richmond would have a place in the league.

Choral Boy, winner of the 1953 Ascot Gold Cup, is a five-year-old bay colt by Hyperion out of Choral.

LONDON, (AP)—The "keep Pirie in England" campaign gained steam Tuesday as more newspapers set up a howl against the possibility of the great distance runner going to the United States.

Butch Stahan Tries Comeback With Senators

OTTAWA, (CP)—Veteran defenceman Butch Stahan is trying a comeback with Ottawa Senators of the Quebec Hockey League.

Stahan, who has played 17 seasons in the former Quebec Senior Hockey League, showed up for Tuesday's practice, asking for a change to make the club, a spokesman said.

Stahan earlier this year was offered from American colleges.

John Macadam in the Daily Sketch started the "keep Pirie in England" campaign. Tuesday the Daily Mirror, with a circulation of more than 4,000,000 took up the fight.

"Reaction to Pirie's possible 'self-exile' in America has been immediate and violent," wrote Peter Wilson in the tabloid Mirror. "It could be summed up in four words: 'Pirie must not go'."

Wilson said he has been approached already by one British firm about giving Pirie a job.

Edmonton Eskimos Of Football Union Report Profit

EDMONTON, (CP)—Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Inter-provincial Football Union made a profit of \$13,172 during the 1953 season. Their gross income was \$423,531.

The annual report by manager Al Anderson listed a club treasury of \$80,026, consisting of the 1953 profit and a carry-over of \$66,852.

The expenditures totalled \$410,000 with the biggest single item \$265,439 for players' salaries and travelling expenses. Anderson did not give a separate figure for safaris.

Gate receipts totalled \$342,000 while \$51,000 was earned from the Eskimo Touchdown Club, and \$22,000 from program and radio rights.

To Discuss Minor League Hockey

MONCTON, (CP)—Officials of the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association will meet with officials of Maritime Provinces physical education departments to discuss minor league hockey. John MacDougal, MAHA president said here Tuesday.

MacDougal passed through Moncton en route to Winnipeg to attend the semi-annual meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

He said the meeting will be held in February at a site yet to be chosen. It is hoped to set up a committee to study minor hockey, and as a start the MAHA hopes to investigate the possibility of insurance to protect all boys of organized hockey.

Marciano May Not Defend Title Next Month

NEW YORK, (AP)—Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano may not defend his title next month. Jim Norris, president of the International Boxing Club, said Tuesday he had two talks with Al Weill, Marciano's manager, "and I got the impression that Al wasn't too anxious to fight until June."

Norris said Ezzard Charles, Nino Valdes of Cuba, Dan Bucceroni and England's Don Cockell were mentioned as possible opponents for the champion.

Former Boxer Committed To State Hospital

CHICAGO, (AP)—Oscar Battling Nelson, 71, former world's lightweight boxing champion, Monday was ordered committed to the Chicago State Hospital.

Dr. Clarence Geary told the court that Nelson was suffering from "an incurable senile dementia."

Two brothers of the old-time boxer, Charles F. Nielsen, superintendent of schools of Paradise county, Calif., and Arthur Nelson of Chicago, protested the order. Judge Geary said they could take Nelson from the hospital any time they could provide him with private institutional care.

Nelson, born Oscar Nielsen, held the lightweight championship from 1908, when he knocked out Joe Gans, until 1910.

English Runner May Go To U.S.

LONDON, (AP)—The mass circulation Daily Sketch launched a campaign Monday to keep Gordon Pirie, Britain's great distance runner, in England.

"If Pirie goes to the United States to obtain a betterment that is not available to him here, Britain may as well give up and get out of amateur international athletics altogether," wrote John MacAdam, columnist, for the newspaper.

His comments were prompted by Pirie's recent statement he is "seriously considering several scholarship offers to American colleges."

Shoulder Patch For Base Units

OTTAWA, (CP)—Base units of the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade in Germany soon will have their own distinctive shoulder patch. To many it will be familiar.

Army headquarters Friday described the new patch as a red diamond divided by a blue horizontal stripe. This was the badge

worn by the 1st Canadian Corps in the Second World War, but its new designation is "the Canadian Army Base Units Europe" patch. It will be worn only by units not in the Brigade's order of battle, meaning administrative, signals and communication personnel.

Those units listed in the formation's order of battle will continue to wear the 1st Canadian Division's famous "red patch", a rectangular piece of red flannel worn by the division in two world wars.
