FIRST SKIRMISH WITH DERVISHES.

"Fuzzy-Wuzzy" Willing to Fight.

THE TROOPS NOW IN TOUCH WITH THE ENEMY.

The Dervishes Beaten Back in a Small Encounter.

LONDON, Sept. 2.—The War Office was relieved last evening by the receipt of a despatch from Cairo explaining the sudden interruption of news from the Soudan, which gave rise to some uneasiness as to the movements of the Anglo-Egyptian column now advancing towards Omdurman.

It appears that telegraphic communication was interrupted because the wire beyond Nasri Island, about midway between Metemneh and the sixth cataract of the Nile, had been damaged by a severe storm. Shortly after the arrival of this intelligence came the following despatch from Nasri Island:

Aug. 31, (and forwarded by messenger from the camp at the front to Nasri.) There have been many glimpses of the enemy during the last few days and the first skirmish took place today when an advance guard of cavalry located a large body at a supposed outpost near Kerikari, about eight miles north of Omdurman.

The enemy showed a disposition to fight, beating drums and displaying battle bunting.

The Montgomery troops emptied a few dervish saddles, and three gunboats steamed up the river in front of the town and shelled the enemy's position.

The dervish loss could not be ascertained. They were in a hollow, but fleeing troops could be distinctly seen.

The army is moving slowly. Yesterday it advanced four miles in close formation.

Another Victory for Amerique.

Back From Klondike.

VANCOUVER, B. C., August 31.—Miss Florence L. Shaw, Colonial editress of the London Times, has returned from a trip to the Klondike. She left on the outgoing express for the east this afternoon. She made the trip from London to Dawson in just 31 days, formed some conclusions about the place in a few days and then made the trip back to Vancouver in 18 days. She informed a reporter this morning that she had a good opinion of the future of the Klondike, but would give it in detail to the readers of the London Times only. "My text is," she said, "the permanent conditions are very good, temporary conditions are very bad."

Found in a Well

St. Louis, Mo., Aug 31.—The body of Mrs. Catherine Doerr, wife of Peter Doerr, cashier of the Lafayette bank, who was an invalid and had been missing for over a week, has been found in a well on Lemper Avenue, not far from where she lived. Mrs. Doerr, whose mind was supposed to have been unbalanced by her suffering, left home one week ago Monday night.

Edict by China's Emperor.

TACOMA, Wash., Aug 31.—Oriental advices say the Chinese emperor has issued an edict warning officials, Tartar generals, viceroys and governors that, under pain of heavy penalties, there must be no more anti-missionary riots. He says that the missionaries and their converts must be fully protected.

TORONTO, Aug. 31.—The superannuation board of the Methodist Church met today to prepare its report to the general conference. The fund is in a satisfactory condition. It amounts to \$231,000 and is invested in excellent securities at an average of 5 1/2 per cent. The beneficiaries are 213 clergymen, 186 widows, and 90 children.

WHAT WILL KITCHENER DO

After He Has Smashed the Power of the Dervishes?

CAIRO, Egypt, Aug. 30.—A brigade of friendly Arabs, commanded by Major Stuart Wortley, which has been pushing round Omdurman, the Dervish camp near Khartoum, with the view of cutting off the retreat of the forces of the Khalifa, had its first brush with the enemy on the east bank of the Nile and captured five men and a grain laden boat. The Dervish scouts are now frequently seen, and the whole Anglo-Egyptian army has reached Uterif, thirty miles from Omdurman. The gunboat Melik has been wrecked while reconnoitering ten miles up the river in a terrible sandstorm.

LONDON, Aug. 30.—The London newspapers are beginning to ask questions concerning General Kitchener's plans after the Dervishes are smashed at Omdurman. The people here are likely to wait for another week before they learn. The Sirdar is not going back to Cairo after doing what he set out to do, as Wolseley did in 1894, after failing in his task.

The Daily News characteristically observes that the motto for the occasion is surely "Be not too bold," and timorously reminds the timid that King Menelek, jealous, angry and perplexed with the fear of change, will be on the flank of any British or Egyptian force moving as far south as Khartoum. But all this has been foreseen. British plans are based upon an amicable deal with King Menelek, and, failing that, he will be fought, not this year possibly, nor next year, but sooner or later.

Unless General Kitchener unexpectedly belies his record, he will be in Omdurman by Sept. 3. Thereafter there will likely be plenty of material for the speculations and alarms of the political quidnuncs. Already there are rumors that when the Anglo-Egyptian army has smashed the Dervishes and occupied Omdurman and Khartoum the French and Russian governments will diplomatically inquire as to England's intentions. It is even rumored that France and Russia have jointly guaranteed the independence of Abyssinia, with the consequent necessity of informing England that her advance further south will constitute a menace to their proteges. But this would be hastening things unduly.

As the Daily News remarks, the Sirdar is generally believed to have a plan up his sleeve. Diplomacy is not likely to make a move until the plan has begun to peep over General Kitchener's cuff.
