

Fine Handicraft Display At Rochford Square School

How skill in handicraft as well as the traditional "book learning" can be acquired from the earliest school grades was demonstrated to visitors at Rochford Square School over the week-end, where a wonderful display of art work and sewing exhibits, representative of the work of every grade, was admitted by a large number of parents and others interested.

The exhibits illustrated, now, in Grade I handicraft, the children use sewing cards and cut-outs and are taught paper weaving in its simplest form; in Grade II they take on, in addition, finely decorated hemming; Grade III branches out into the production of aprons of many designs followed in grade IV by embroidered runners and in grade V they take on hemstitching of pillow cases. The work becomes more complicated in Grade VI when hemstitching breaks into the field of vanity sets, with hemstitched initialled guest towels and articles of like nature.

On entering grade VII the student must feel that she is "A big girl now" because she is allowed to use the sewing machine, cut out aprons and blouses and chair sets and complete the job throughout.

Here also the button-hole stitch takes its place along with the art of darning and making a good patch, two life-long accomplishments worth acquiring. Grade VIII finds the pupil making her own school uniform with a white broadcloth blouse and a navy blue jumper dress. At grade IX the pupil may bring her own commercial patterns for a variety of productions which she may put together as a forerunner of the bright and cheery things which some day decorate her home. She may make her own little ones in turn take their place in the study line, looking well nourished and nicely dressed, to begin where she has left off in the circle of school life. The exhibits of weaving and knitted products in articles of clothing are truly a credit to the students and teachers in every respect.

Grades VIII, IX and X have an exhibit of skirts, Bolero jackets, ladies' stoles, baby carriage wraps, tea sets, Chesterfield sets, hand bags, vanity sets, linen towels, smock dresses, quilted satin cushions and other articles which thrilled their parents and friends and brought pleasure to their instructors.

Following the reading of the minutes, the secretary, Mr. Lester MacLeod, presented the financial statement. Total receipts \$27,004.90. Total expenditures, \$28,870.31, leaving a deficit of \$1,865.41 to this is added outstanding bills still to be paid \$4,215.25, making a total deficit of \$6,080.70. To balance this deficit there are still school taxes collectable to the extent of \$6,744.91, leaving a final surplus for the year of \$664.21.
