SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.
A Mayor Incensed.
OTTAWA, Jan. 3.
Mr. McLeod Stewart, the popular Chief Magistrate of Ottawa, has lost his Mayoral seat, and is disqualified. The proceedings against him have been in court for many months. He is condemned to pay all costs of the proceedings. The charges of personal bribery are sustained by judgment handed down by Mr. Justice Street, J. T. Johns, a citizen of Ottawa, is the relator. The Municipal Act provides that a person who is disqualified shall be ineligible as a candidate at any Municipal election for two years thereafter. It is a somewhat curious fact that this decision was announced on the last day of the year, and it seems that in spite of the present decision, Mr. Stewart was Mayor de facto during 1888.

News from Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.
Sir John Macdonald, Hon. Mr. Costigan and Hon. Mr. Foster will attend the board of trade dinner at Toronto.
A special cable says Chief Justice Allen, of New Brunswick, has been knighted, Mr. Trutch, of British Columbia, has been appointed a K. C. M. G., and Major-General Oliver, late of the Military College, a C. M. G.
A dispute over the drawing for prizes at a bazaar, in Hamilton, has caused a declaration by the police magistrate that all such drawings are illegal, and will have to be stopped.
A special cable says Canadian stocks are all partaking of the general upward movement of the markets. Dominion, provincial and municipal gained materially during the week.

McShane Disqualified.

MONTREAL, Jan. 3.
The Court of Review to-day gave judgment in the LaPrairie election petition, unseating Goyette (Grit) and disqualifying Hon. James McShane, (Grit), for personal bribery and corruption during the last election, unanimously granting the prayer of the petition. McShane is disqualified for seven years and fined \$400, and Bourassa, the Grit boss in the constituency, is disqualified and fined \$200. McShane will have to resign his seat for Montreal centre. He was once before disqualified. The above decisions open Montreal centre and LaPrairie. There is some talk of Mercier introducing a white-washing bill, but such proceeding is not probable, and writs will likely be issued without delay.

Sentences Confirmed.

DUBLIN, Jan. 3.
In the County Court to-day, Judge Kelly confirmed all the sentences imposed upon persons evicted from the Vanduler estates who had previously been found guilty of resisting the sheriff and attacking the police. Judge Kelly denounced the Government for laxity and moderation in dealing with a rebellion, and said the prisoners each deserved to be imprisoned for five years. So far the evictions at Palevragh county, Donegal, which began yesterday, have been carried on without serious disturbance. Five tenants have been evicted.

Montreal Murmurs.

MONTREAL, Jan. 3.
Notwithstanding the cry that ice would not be forthcoming for the great place on Dominion Square, the corner stick of the castle was laid to-day with appropriate ceremonies.
H. J. Cloran, who was defeated by J. J. Curran, Q. C., at the last Dominion election, will probably be the Government candidate for Montreal Centre. C. J. Doherty's name is mentioned as the Conservative standard bearer.

Perished From Cold.

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 3.
At Sabunsschi, near Tiflis, a train became blocked in an immense snowdrift and before aid could be sent fourteen passengers perished from the intense cold, and twenty others were badly frost-bitten. A relief party which started out to relieve the imperiled travellers lost their way and died in the snow.

The Windsor Mayoralty.

OTTAWA, Jan. 3.
There is great interest taken in the Mayoralty election at Windsor, which takes place next Monday, it being the first instance where the question of Annexation with the United States is made an open issue. Solomon White, an ex-member of Parliament, goes before the people as a candidate for Mayor as an Annexationist.

A New Year Call.

QUEBEC, Jan. 3.
Thieves are operating extensively at Mount Pleasant and along the St. Foye Road. The residence of Bishop Williams was entered and pillaged last night. The thieves carried off a quantity of articles including rare old wines, from his Lordship's cellar.

Bismarck's Health.

BERLIN, Jan. 3.
Great anxiety is felt regarding Bismarck's health. The Chancellor has received 6,000 telegrams expressing sympathy. He has been ordered to remain in strict repose, and not to go to Berlin.
