Potato Questions Discussed Last Night At Lively Meeting In Kensington

Following vocal interruptions by Messrs William Pound of Hazel Grove and John Dawson of Albany, a disturbance which threatened the continuation of a meeting in connection with the Potato Marketing Board at Kensington last night occurred as chairman Louis O'Connor of Clinton defended himself when a young man rushed at him from the audience after Mr. O'Connor told Mr. Pound he would have to abide by the rules of order or leave the hall.

Before accepting chairmanship of the meeting Mr. O'Connor obtained the unanimous agreement of the audience of 250 people, to maintain order and not interrupt any speaker. He promised a fair hearing to anyone who wished to ask questions, take part in discussion, or speak for or against the board.

In the disturbance which occurred, order was restored through the earnest appeals of Messrs Louis O'Connor, James Saunders, Austin Pendergast, and Austin Scates. The young man announced that he was satisfied to forget the whole thing and the remainder of the meeting was conducted in a spirit of complete order throughout.

Speaking for the Marketing Board, Messrs. Donald A. MacDonald and Leo MacIsaac outlined the policies proposed by the board, and answered questions asked from the audience.

The principal spokesman for those in opposition was Mr. Austin A. Scates, who in a lengthy address to the meeting, among other matters, dealt with correspondence from the auditors of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board in regard to the financial statement prepared and issued by the board which he alleged to be incorrect. This letter, which appears as part of a letter from Mr. Scates in the Public Forum in this issue, stated in part that the board's financial statements for each of the years ending May 31, 1952 and 1953 are incorrect in that they did not show the correct liabilities and surplus.

The item concerned is an amount of \$10,000 borrowed from the Potato Promotional Committee and later repaid.

Mr. MacDonald, in reply to the remarks made by Mr. Scates, said that when the board was organized the firm of H. R. Doane and Co. were engaged as auditors. They have had full and complete authority to go over all records in the board's office, prepare the financial statement for the board and certify

The regularly monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held last night with the president, William Hayward, presiding. Mr. Fred Bell reported to the members that the matter of proper railway signals at the Arnett Road crossing had been taken up with Mr. Montgomery and that he had received a letter from the superintendent that this matter was being taken up by the proper authorities and will be dealt with in the near future.

Speaking for the tourist and publicity committee, Mr. Ross MacKenzie referred to the plan accepted by the P. E. I. Tourist Association of taking tourist bureau attendants on familiarization tours of the areas they serve and he suggested that the attendants at the Summerside bureau be included in this tour next summer before the season gets under way.

Considerable discussion took place on the question of parking facilities in Summerside. No definite steps have been taken to procure a parking lot in town.

On the matter Mr. J. Wilfred Kelly said that he personally was opposed to taking the parked cars off Water Street on Saturday. These cars indicated life and activity in the town.

The matter of lack of courtesy on the part of car drivers was mentioned by Mr. Amos Hubley and supported by various speakers including J. Frank Arnett who spoke of the impressions he had of the courtesy of motorists in Europe.

Mr. Arnett said this was one of the outstanding impressions of his visit to the Old Country. Mr. Arnett said he believed that a campaign should be sponsored by the Board to teach courtesy to local drivers. He said that there have been a lot of accidents in town and it is a miracle that someone has not been killed.

Mr. Wilfred Kelly dealt with the matter of juvenile driving cars in Summerside in a very careful and dangerous way. Mr. Kelly said that some of the old cars driven by those young people would not be allowed on the streets in other places. He said he felt that the police should take definite action against these juveniles.

Charles Linkletter speaking on driving habits on Schurman Avenue expressed concern for the safety of children on this street. Mr. Linkletter said that Schurman Avenue is just a raceway.

Mr. Edgar Cannon suggested that some provision should be made to provide a parking space for tourist trailers, some place where water and electric power would be available.

Mr. T. J. Inman said he believed that such facilities were provided in Charlottetown at Victoria Park.

Under the report of the marine and transportation committee, Mr. Bell discussed the matter of planking the car ferry Prince Edward for the accommodation of cars. He pointed out that if this were done it would expedite the transfer of many more cars and from the province during the busy seasons.

The meeting decided that this matter should be taken up with Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. for his consideration.

Mr. Edgar Cannon said he believed that something should be done to provide more roadside tables for the convenience of tourists. He said this province has next to none and "what we do have are very poorly located." This matter was left with the tourist committee to deal with.

Mr. Cannon also dealt with the matter of a sports supervisor in Summerside. He said that since the Department of Physical Fitness had discontinued this service something should be done to have the matter rectified.

Mr. R. S. Hinton explained that this service had been discontinued as there were no funds available to pay the salary of such a supervisor. The policy had been discontinued by the Federal Government, he said, because it hadn't worked out satisfactorily.

The president Mr. Hayward gave a brief but concise report of his attendance as a delegate to the Maritime Provinces Board of



Trade and Chamber of Commerce meetings held at Halifax. At the meeting of the Maritime Provinces Board of Trade many matters were on the agenda for presentation at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce. Among the subjects submitted for consideration at this meeting were a uniform standard of traffic signals for all the provinces of Canada; discouraging of the flying of the United States flag at catering places. This habit, Mr. Hayward said, was considered objectionable by American tourists when visiting in Canada. Another matter submitted to the Chamber of Commerce was to endeavour to have Canadian products shipped from this country through Canadian ports instead of through United States ports.

Mr. Hayward said that in the matter of a national flag the meeting was definitely in favor of retaining some semblance of the Union Jack in whatever type of flag would finally be decided on.

At the Rebekah hall in Alberton last evening Mr. Gordon Warren of the Experimental Farm at Charlottetown gave a most interesting illustrated address on the arrangement and growing of flowers. Mr. Warren was the guest of Regalette Rebekah Lodge members who sponsor the Alberton flower show each autumn. Through courtesy of the lodge all interested persons were invited to be present and many lovers of flowers availed themselves of the opportunity.

Speaking informally Mr. Warren showed slides picturing flowers, ornamental trees and shrubs at the Experimental Farm and at a number of private homes on Prince Edward Island and in the other Maritime Provinces. He also answered a number of questions giving much helpful advice.

A hearty vote of thanks from an appreciative audience was extended to Mr. Warren.

Several Special Events At S'side Air Station Within Next Few Days

The R.C.A.F. Station at Summerside will be a hive of activity for the next few days with visits from Air Cadet squadrons and high officials. This morning Commodore W. L. M. Brown, D.S.O., O.B.E., D.S.C., Assistant Chief of the Naval Staff (Air) in the Royal Navy, will visit the station as part of his tour of naval and air establishments in Eastern Canada. The Commodore has had a varied career in all parts of the world, having taken part in the Battle of Narvik, been shot down over Tobruk and taken prisoner, and later led the landing party which effected the re-occupation of Hong Kong. Since then he has served in the United Kingdom, the Far East and in the Korean war.

Tomorrow the Air Cadet Squadrons of Summerside and Charlottetown will be guests at the station to take lectures and training available during weekly parades. Featuring the visit will be one hour's airtime for each cadet and the inter-squadron rifle competition.

Air Commodore Martin Costello, Air Officer Commanding the Maritime Air Command, will arrive Tuesday for a two-day visit. It is his first call at the Island base since he arrived at his Halifax headquarters last August. A native of Ontario, he entered the R.C.A.F. as a graduate pilot and later did aerial photography in the north country as well as forest fire patrols in Northern and Western Canada. In 1936 he went to Singapore and Gibraltar with the R.A.F. Coastal Command. During the war he served four years in Halifax and then was posted to lead a R.A.F. Coastal Command station in Northern Ireland. Since then he
