DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Mae West a green pacing mare that showed sensational speed while in training at the Charlotte Driving Park track last season but was unsteady, has been placed in the hands of Willard Kelly. Willard and Mae should get along all right and we look to see her acquiring a fast tab.

Dermat 2.04 1/2 has shook the dust of Charlotte off his shoes and has by now arrived at his former home Sydney Mines. He was accompanied on the journey by Dave Pound, his faithful caretaker, who handed him over to his new owner Mat McAdam in tip top condition. Derm has the honor of the fastest mile over an Island twice around so far this year, having paced the Charlotte oval last Saturday in 2:19 with the last half in 1:07 and the final quarter in 31 seconds. He could just as easily have made it 2:14.

Jimmie Power and his co-partners were rather loath to sell the big horse, but death of opportunities to race him decided them. They are out for another good one to take his place and very soon the vacant stall will contain another equine.

F. C. Ramsay, Montrose, P. E. I., has a chestnut colt with white stockings from Sampson Hal 2.02 1/2, born May 24th, that has caught the eyes of the neighbors and all horse fanciers in that vicinity. It is large and well made. Its maternal ancestry is of the best, the dam being by Bud Axworthy 2.14 out of a Fernwood Aubrey mare.

Race meets will be held at Glace Bay and Truro June 23rd with popular classes. July 1st the season will be in full swing with races at Summerside locally, Saint John, Campbellton and possibly one or two other places in New Brunswick and Sydney, Middleton and other points in Nova Scotia.

Tyndall Semple is giving preliminary work to Plucky Scott 2.06 and several others. He likes the daughter of Peter Scott 2.05 1/2 very much and while not making any predictions he is confident that he will give strong opposition with her to the 2:15 class eligibles.

The writer had a pleasant few minutes the other day listening to "Old Timer" relating some of his experience with race horses in his many years spent in various parts of the United States and Canada. One of the oddest ways of getting over a difficulty said he that I ever heard of was used by an Ohio trainer to give a fast time tab to an adult trotter that had never beaten 2:15 for other trainers. This particular mare could not carry any weight. Unless shod with the lightest of shoes she would tire and finish almost on a walk, but she could not be gotten away except with weight as she had a tendency to pace.

The Ohioan got over the trouble by carrying out a couple of wooden toe weights that when completely filled with sand weighed three and one-half ounces. After scoring her twice with them the weights on the hind feet were sent away. Shortly after the quarter was reached every bit of sand had passed out through an opening at the bottom of the toe weights and instead of carrying three ounces she was only weighted with about one-half an ounce on each foot—just the weight of the wood. She took a record of 2:10 flat and was sold for good sum as a brood mare.

"Old Timer" has a fund of information on how the difficulty is to get him to talk, he is so reticent and modest. Two of the things that impressed him recently at the race track was the speed displayed by Heatherbell around the upper turn and the smooth gaited pacing of Claire Napoleon 2.13. By the way, Claire Napoleon is a dream of a pacer, fire-legged. She is shod differently from any time since coming to this country. Wearing three and three-quarter inch all around shoes, without hoppers she was a mile in 2:28 and came the last quarter in 32 seconds.

There were no fast workouts at the track the past week, the best being a mile in 2:22 by Derm with a quarter in 31 1/2 seconds. Bob O'Boy was a mile in 2:27 with a half in 1:10. Calumet Bee stepped in 2:25 with a half in 1:09. Heatherbell was a mile in 2:26 with the last half in 1:08 and a final quarter very close to 30 seconds.

About 25 horses are now stabled at the Charlotte Driving Park track mostly young prospects that will require a great deal of developing. There is a dearth of record material and it would look as though some horses of that description brought in here, if possessing even a medium amount of class, could pick up some money and certainly invigorate the racing game.

Old Orchard, Maine, which years and years ago was one of the leading spots of the mile-track line, is to be back on the Grand Circuit as announced in these columns, with races July 27th to August 1st. The track was formerly of the kite variety, now extinct, and a new one of the oval type is nearly completed and will be ready with new barns

and a spacious grand stand for the curtain-raiser the latter part of this month. Old Orchard is a famous summer resort with excellent bathing and out-door attractions and it is felt that the beauty of the place and its accessibility by motor roads will bring a large number of people from other states.

Because of changes in the rules of eligibility a horse will graduate much faster from one class to another this season. Many of those above have only a few dollars leeway, and the winning of even the smallest part of a purse will change their class. In mixed classes trotters are usually allowed three seconds and that would give another three seconds eligibility to the trotters in the above list.

Chief Abbedale 2.00, one of the greatest pacers on the Grand Circuit in 1933 but lame in 1934-35, is being prepared for a comeback. He is stated to be quite sound and is working miles in 2:20.

Will Caton, the man who has out such a wide swath in harness racing since coming back from the land of the czar and has to his credit two three-year olds marked in better than two minutes, both world records, trained the pacing filly Silverdale (2) 2.04 1/2—now three-two heats in 2:07 1/2 week ago. Last year she raced with the hoppers but this year she is going fire-legged and Caton believes she is destined for the two minute list.

One of the most valuable fillies foaled in the United States this season is from the combination Mr. McElwain 1.59 1/2 and Blitze (3) 2.03 1/2. Blitze is the dam of Walter Dear (3) 2.02 1/2, one of the greatest

Gomez Hurls Yanks To Win Over Tribe

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, June 5.—Lefty Gomez returned to the mound here today after a 10-day layoff with a sore arm, and held the Cleveland Indians to five hits as the league-leading Yankees came out 4-3 in a pitchers' duel.

The victory was Gomez' sixth against one loss this season. He hooked up in a tight struggle with Lloyd Brown until the eighth, when the Yanks fell on the Cleveland hurler for three runs to sew up the ball game.

Lou Gehrig, playing in his 1,700th straight game, contributed to the win with his ninth homer of the campaign.

Senators playing at home, climbed back into the first division of the American League by banging out 13 hits for a 6-2 triumph over Detroit.

The victory placed Washington in a tie with the Tigers for fourth place. Earl Whitehill, who gave up eight hits, scored his fourth pitching victory of the year.

Boston humbled Chicago for the seventh consecutive time today, by an 8-6 margin when the Sox of different hues opened a three-game series at Boston before a ladies day crowd of 13,000 at Fenway Park.

It was the fourth straight victory for the Red Sox, who suffered a shock when their usually docile "cousins" went into the ninth inning trailing 8-1 and put on a threatening five-run rally.

Jack Wilson, who has seen much relief service, started his first game for Boston and, although he was wild and erratic, he held the Chisox to four hits before being relieved by Lefty Ostermueller when Chicago's second run came over in the ninth.

All Stars Win Close Game From Anchors

The All-Stars eked out a 4-3 victory over the Anchors at the Victoria Park diamond last evening in an Industrial League game. It was a pitchers battle with Lefty MacQuaid on the mound for the winners and Hen Woolridge tossin' 'em up for the Anchors. MacQuaid had 12 strike-outs granting but five hits compared to nine retirements and six hits for Woolridge.

A triple play in the third inning engineered by Jimmy Roach, All-Star shortstop, featured the play. The youthful shortstop also played brilliantly at the plate smashing out a two base hit to tie the score and later rump home himself with the winning counter.

The game was close throughout with the Anchors leading 2-1 up to the seventh frame when the All-Stars scored the tying run and then went into the lead with a two run rally in the last of the eighth. The best the Anchors could do in their final inning was to shove one runner across.

Arky Vaughan, National League batting champion for Pittsburgh Pirates last year, had four hits, one of them a triple against the Phillies, for his 17th straight game.

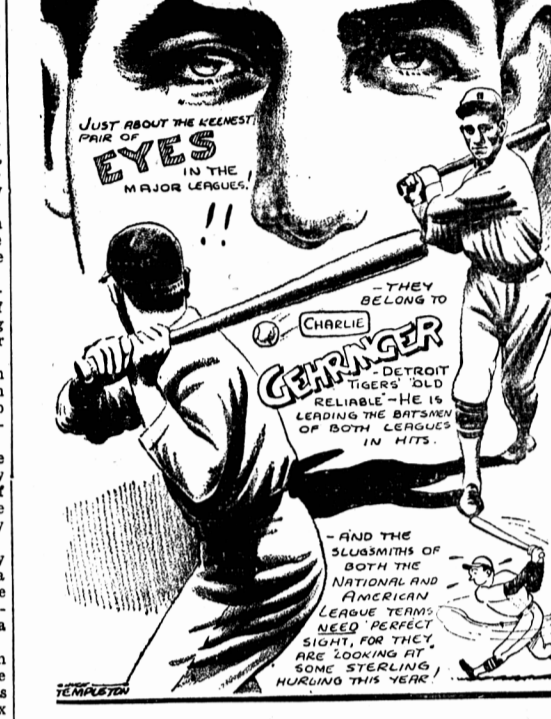
Stu Martin, the Cardinals' star rookie, hit safely for the 16th consecutive time.

Dizzy Dean Halts Giants 9-2 "In Crucial Series"

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, June 5.—Featuring a seven-run uprising off Van Lingle Mungo in the fifth, and a total of 16 base hits, the Cubs shelled the Dodgers into a 12-3 defeat today at Chicago.

Bill Lee, posting his fourth victory of the season, held the Dodgers to seven hits, three of them coming in the first, when the Dodgers opened the scoring with a run.

Gabby Hartnett, Cub catcher, was put out of the game in the second inning for arguing with the umpire.

The Pirates outslugged Philadelphia at Pittsburgh in a game marked by 35 hits to win the series opener, 14-8.

The Cubs collected 23 bingles off Joe Bowman and Claude Passeau while the Phillies touched Ralph Birkofer and Mace Brown for 12 safe blows.

The Phillies took a three run lead in the third, but the Cubs evened the score in their half and went on to tally 11 more markers in the next three frames.

Ray Bengel held Cincinnati in check as Boston Bees batted out a 10-4 victory that sent them back into fifth place, a game ahead of the Reds, who were playing at home.

Bengel allowed but three hits for the first five innings but, coasting along under a big lead, relented a bit and permitted one Red to score in each of the last four innings.

The Bees found four Cincinnati pitchers for 13 hits, two more than the Reds got off Bengel.

The "crucial" St. Louis series for the league leadership opened with the second-place New York Giants easy victims for Dizzy Dean as a pitched St. Louis Cardinals to a 6-2 victory.

Only Mel Ott, who accounted for both the Giants runs with his 10th homer, scoring Bill Terry, gave Dizzy any trouble as he became the first major league hurler of the year to win 10 games. He has been beaten twice.

The victory boosted the Cardinals' first-place edge to four full games.

Cochrane On The Sidelines

(By Dillon Graham, Associated Press Sports Writer) WASHINGTON, June 5.—The strain of the American League pennant race and of battling against a succession of bad "breaks"—injuries, particularly to Hank Greenberg, and spotty pitching—has put fiery Mickey Cochrane on the sidelines for the time being.

The plot of the world champions collapsed yesterday at Philadelphia after a hard run to score on a four-base clout hit within the park. Today he revealed he had had several similar "fainting spells" during the last month.

His collapse yesterday, Cochrane said physicians explained, was due to the strain, the heat and his long, fast run. His previous "spells," none serious and all of short duration, were due, he said, to worry and excitement, to the suspense of many recent close games and to the poor record the Tigers have made in the last fortnight.

He felt better today.

Defending Champ Ousted As Mangrum Leads Close Field In Open Golf Play

(By Alan Gould, Associated Press Sports Editor) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BALTIMORE GOLF CLUB, Springfield, N. J., June 5.—Still riding hard despite a series of tumbles under second-round pressure, the par-busters today kept command of the closest, most exciting scoring rodeo in United States open golf championship history.

After another hectic day, during which the defending champion Sam Parks, Jr., of Pittsburgh, was eliminated along with nearly 90 others and the vanguard of surviving contenders badly shaken up, the pace-setting honors belonged to a lean, lanky pair of professionals—Ray Mangrum of Dayton, Ohio, and Victor Ghezzi of Deal, N. J.—with four others snapping at their heels and more than a score of players still bunched within six shots.

Alone of the triumvirate which shared the first round pace, Mangrum continued to ride at the head of the big parade by adding a 71 to his previous 69 for a total of 140, four shots under par for Baltimore's badly battered upper course. Ghezzi fired his second successive 70.

The scores of the twin leaders were only one stroke short of the all-time championship record of 139, set by Chick Evans for the first half of the 1916 tournament at Ninkahda. Tomorrow, they will be shooting at another of Chick's marks, the 72-hole record total of 285, made the same year, and equaled in 1932 by Gene Sarazen.

On the basis of all past performances, the successor to Parks, who missed qualifying for the final 36 holes by a single shot when he posted two 76's for a total of 152, should come from the half dozen shotmakers perched on top. But so many dizzy things have happened so far it's no longer safe to bet on anything.
