THERMOMETER READINGS.—The lowest record during last night was six below zero; at nine this morning two below was marked.

NEW SCHOOL.—A school has recently been opened at Elmira, Lot 47. The public hall there has been converted into a school house, and Mr. Raymond McNeil has been hired as teacher.

MONTREAL CARNIVAL.—The winter carnival sports at Montreal will open on Monday next, Feb. 6th, and will continue until the 11th. A big time is promised.

ANOTHER SUMMONS.—A summons was served yesterday on Tanawis White, Bayfield Street, for violating the Liquor Regulations Act. The summons is returnable on Monday.

MASS MEETING.—At the close of the usual services to-morrow (Sunday) night, a mass meeting of the different denominations will be held in the Second Methodist Church. Everyone is cordially welcome.

PUBLIC MEETING.—A public meeting will be held at Alberton on Wednesday, the 15th inst., to consider the matter of holding an exhibition at that place the coming autumn. The exhibition at Alberton last year was very successful.

MOUNT STEWART CONCERN.—Reserve the 17th of March for the concert at Mount Stewart in aid of the sidewalks for that place. As this is the only call the committee intend to make on the public during the season, a full house and good attendance may be expected.

A NARROW ESCAPE.—A man who attempted to board the C. P. R. express while it was in motion at Quispamisias on Saturday last, was thrown between the train and the platform and was somewhat bruised. He had a very narrow escape from death.

NEVER TOO LATE.—A married woman of about 30 years of age, having no children, entered the other day as a pupil in one of the primary departments of the Dartmouth school. She is a native of Newfoundland, and wants to be able to read and write. She had never been sent to school in her youth.

PETITIONING.—The people of Souris and vicinity are petitioning the Minister of Public Works for a grant of money for the building of a post office, customs house and savings bank combined. The petition is numerously signed, and it is sincerely hoped the money will be granted the present session. A town of such growing importance as Souris is entitled to the most favorable treatment at the hands of the Government.

CRAZED BY CIGARETTES.—An exchange reports that Frank Henschel, of St. Louis, a clerk, shot and probably fatally wounded his sweetheart, Alice Bruce, at her home on Wednesday. A little later the police, looking for the would-be murderer, found his dead body in an alley two blocks west of the scene of his first bloody work. Henschel was about 23 years old, and so far as known, had no cause for a quarrel with Miss Bruce. Friends, however, knowing him to be a slave to the cigarette habit, are of the opinion that he committed the crime while crazed by the effects of cigarette smoking.

TWO PRETTY WINDOWS.

The expense of putting in a bay window is considerable after a house is once built. Here is a suggestion for obtaining more light and air beside beauty for a room if one can't afford to have a bay window put in. The double window is copied exactly from one of a big stone studio built on the grounds of an artist's country home (Fig. 1).

The little windows above open out horizontally, the lower ones swing outward like the old-fashioned lattices. A broad window seat holds whatever one may wish to put there, and the couch below is raised at the center into a sort of table for books, etc. A thin smart curtain draped lengthwise over the top of the window reveals the squareness.

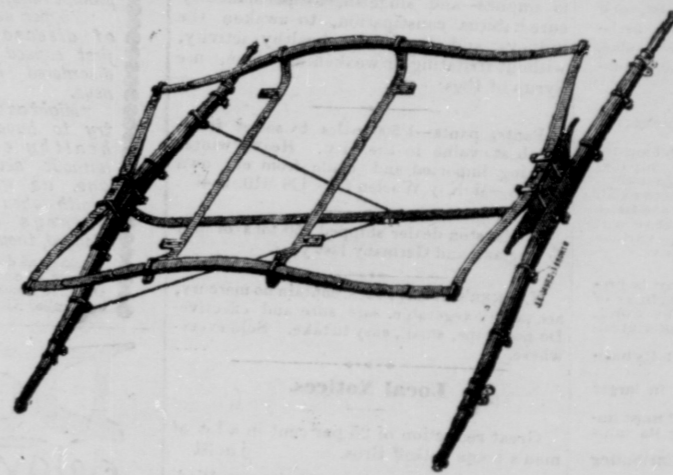
