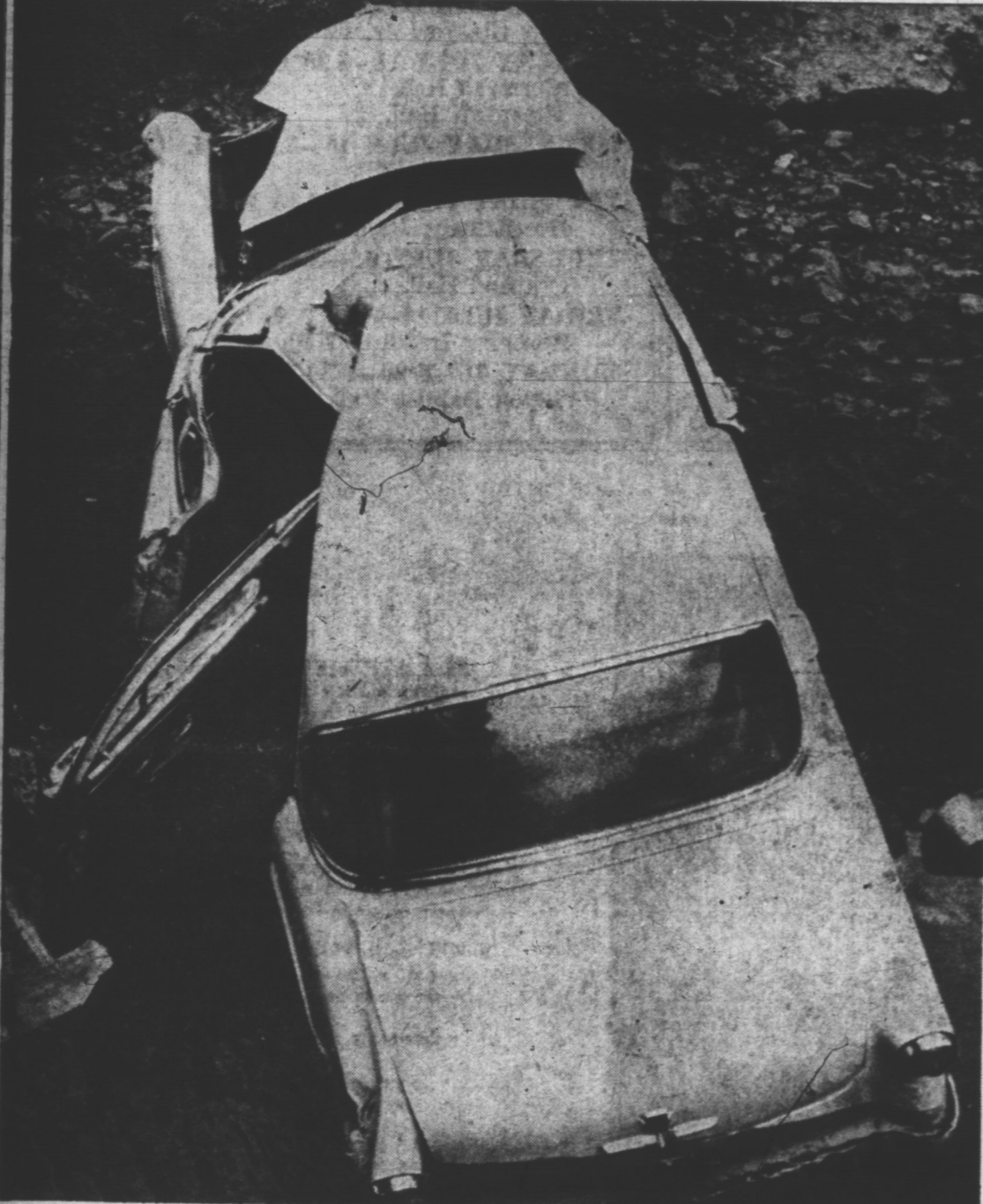

Three Bodies Recovered Following Sunday Fatality

Divers yesterday recovered the bodies of three young men who were drowned late Sunday night when the car in which they were riding plunged into the Pinette River. They were Malcolm Campbell, 35, and Robert Knox, 29, both of Montague, and Alton Ross Cantello, 34, of Pinette.

The car crashed through the guard rail of the old bridge. The accident was seen by Donald Franklin MacLean, night watchman on the opposite end of the bridge, who could do nothing to stop the car.

The bodies were recovered yesterday by divers Gus Gallant of Charlottetown and Albert Lejoie both of whom are employed by the CNR at Borden.

Cpl. Don Wannamaker and Constable James Dunn of the Montague RCMP detachment are in charge of the investigation.

Campbell was married and the father of five children aged one to nine. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Campbell, Montague, and had been a crane operator with Wellner Construction Company.

Robert Knox, not married, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Knox, Montague. He had been employed for three years with MacLean and Son, electrical contractors of Charlottetown.

Alton R. Cantello also was single. The son of Mr. Dan Cantello, Pinette, he has three sisters and two brothers.

Coroner Dr. L.E. Prowse, Charlottetown, went to the scene of the accident this morning.

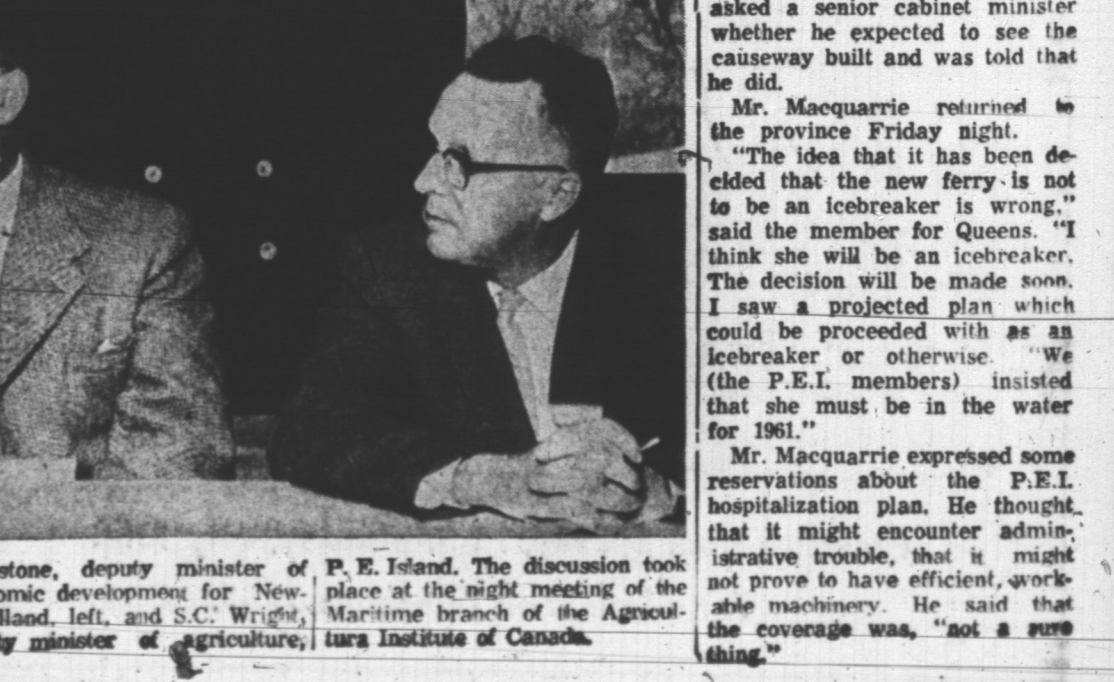
