## Proposed \$4 Milk Guarantee Described As Being Too Low

Not even the federal government guarantee of \$4.00 per hundred pounds for milk from the dairy farms of the country is expected to halt the decline in milk production in Canada, it was observed by J. Lincoln Dewar as he returned from an Ottawa meeting of the advisory committee to the agricultural prices stabilization board.

Announcement of the \$4.00 guarantee is expected from Ottawa within the next week or so. The guarantee would be for \$4.00 per hundredweight (f.o.b. the dairy plant). In this province it cost an average of 35 cents per hundred pounds last year to transport the milk from the farm to the plant, the creamery or cheese factory. This would mean that the \$4.00 guarantee (f.o.b. the plant) would actually mean a net price to the farmer or dairyman of \$3.65, according to E. W. Adams, provincial dairy superintendent.

## Souris Dwellings Levelled By Fire

## Parliament At A Glance

An all-day wrangle over the Munsinger affair stalled the scheduled business of the Commons.

Conservatives demanded that Justice Minister Cardin get up and name names in the sex- and security allegations involved in the affair.

Mr. Cardin sat through the uproar without making a remark.

Creditist Leader Caouette read into the record parts of a Toronto Star story reporting Gerda Munsinger is alive in Munich.

He also got in, via questions, the story's quotes linking Gerda with Pierre Sevigny, associate defence minister in the Diefenbaker cabinet.

Prime Minister Pearson offered to have a judicial inquiry into the affair but the Conservatives rejected it, demanding names first.

Mr. Cardin told the press Thursday the Munsinger woman was a one-time spy romantically involved with two or more Conservative ministers.

Outside the House, a government spokesman said the cabinet would set up a Munsinger inquiry on Monday.

## Six Die In Crash

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. (CP) — A small amphibious plane crashed into the shore of the Portland Canal about 60 miles north of here Thursday, killing six of seven persons aboard. The survivor was Roy Berryman of Prince Rupert, pilot of the Pacific Western Airlines' Grumman Goose aircraft.

## Conservatives Demand Names

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister Pearson said Friday night the government definitely will set up a judicial inquiry into the Munsinger sex-and-security allegations case. He sent word to this effect to a reporter after the Commons adjourned at 6 p.m. EST.

## Business Set Aside Gerda Holds Stage

OTTAWA (CP) — The Gerda Munsinger sex-and-security uproar took stage centre in the Commons again Friday. Regular business was sidelined as the House for the second day in a row exploded in cracking exchanges over Justice Minister Cardin's charges that former Conservative cabinet ministers were linked romantically with an East German beauty he says once was involved in espionage.

Adding a fillip to the debate was a story in the Toronto Star that a reporter had located Gerda Munsinger in Munich where she runs a coffee shop. Mr. Cardin told a press conference Thursday she died some years ago in East Germany of leukemia.

"The lady involved is now dead," Mr. Cardin had said. "She left the country and the news came to us that she died of leukemia in East Germany."

Mr. Pearson and Transport Minister Pickersgill challenged the opposition to move a motion in Monday's supply debate and defeat the government if they could.

Four Conservative motions were ruled out of order during the course of the stirring debate. Three of them sought to have Mr. Cardin back up his charges in the House or resign his seat. The fourth was that the House go into committee immediately to examine Mr. Cardin.

All ran afoul of procedure in the Speaker's view. Conservatives served notice that they would stick to their guns in seeking specific details on Mr. Cardin's charges.

"We will not move until this happens," said Mr. Winkler, the Conservative party whip.

Opposition Leader Diefenbaker was away on a fishing trip in British Columbia. He was expected back for Monday's sitting and his first chance to join the steamy debate since Mr. Cardin's press conference.
