Third low gross in the men's championship division was Don MacDonald of Charlottetown, and Bernie Dunning of Summerside held the low net spot. Miss Hogg, with a low gross of 183, also repeated her win of last year, with Mrs. Norman MacLeod in runner-up spot with 194.

Low net winner was Mrs. Charles Linkletter, and second low net was Mrs. Thomas Baker.

The tournament began Thursday when the ladies' division occupied the first two days of play, with the ladies commencing Friday and the men on Saturday, and each division finishing on the second day.

OTTAWA (CP) — Marlene Stewart Street of Fonthill, Ont., playing a precision-like short game and never over par, won her seventh Canadian Women's Open golf championship at the Royal Ottawa course Saturday, defeating Gail Harvey of Toronto student, recovered from a poor drive and birdied the 19th with a 25-foot to square the match.

It was the only hole won in the afternoon by Miss Harvey, who had to press with her powerful drives and left herself vulnerable to error as Marlene grudgingly went to work and began to pull into a lead.

She won the 20th with a birdie and the 22nd the same way. With her remarkable short game at its best, Marlene moved into a three-up lead on the 25th, where Gail three-putted, and the Toronto girl's chances began to fade.

were Ben Shannon, 20, of Glasgow, the ship's second engineer, and 14 Foronosa crew members.

The two officers and one seaman were brought to Quebec by the Irish Whirlow. Seven Foronosas were brought in by the Conde de Fontana, which scraped its hull passing over the sunken Tritonia, and six women were life jackets and apparently leaped off the ship. The cold water and exposure apparently caused their deaths. The bodies were covered with oil.

All that could be seen of the Tritonia were its foremast and stack, sticking out of the water. The Roanagh Head was riding at anchor on the scene, a big hole in its bow at the water line. There was a report that she may try to return to Quebec under her own power.

Capt. Delandine Lafleur, pilot on the Irish Whirlow, which was outboard at the time it received a distress signal, said that when his ship arrived on the scene the Roanagh Head's anchor was down and all its lights were out.

"There was a strong current," he said. "Lifeboats carrying crewmen were drifting away."

"We could hear screams for help but it was so dark that we had to go around five or six times before we could locate them."

Both Capt. Swanson and Shannon said they suffered from the cold water.

"Why don't they warm up the water," said Capt. Swanson, when he was taken to hospital suffering from shock and two broken ribs.

Capt. David Davis of the Halifax said by radio telephone interview that his ship picked up nine bodies and transferred them to a schooner before pressing on to Quebec with its six Chinese survivors.

Four of them appeared in good condition and two others were coming out of shock.

Upwards of 800 race fans enjoyed thrilling finishes at the Summerside Raceway where 26 horses in a total of eight dashes, paid as high as \$181.80.

On stage with "Miss P.E.I.", at the coronation, were her two charming princesses, Miss Claudia Sears, and Miss Gail MacDonald, along with all but two of the other contestants, who were unable to attend.

After presiding at a lobster supper in the Stadium, Miss Paquette, who starts training as a nurse this fall at Summerside, performed her role of officiating in the presentation of prizes to various Lobster Carnival winners in the float parade.
