

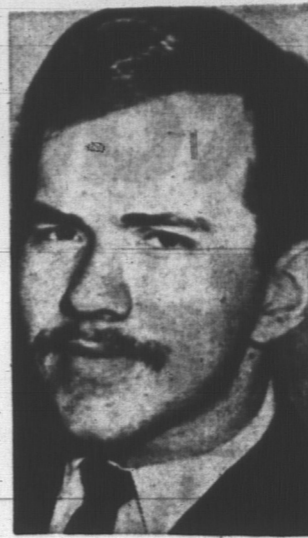

SDU Paper, Red And White Sees Editor, Staff Changes

Lawrence DonElysyn has been elected editor-in-chief of the Red and White, the student publication of St. Dunstan's University, it was announced yesterday by Dave Morton, president of the Students' Union.

Mr. DonElysyn, a junior arts student from Montreal, has been associated with the paper for the past three years, serving as a news writer, features editor, and managing editor. He succeeds Roger MacDonald, who is to graduate in May.

Mrs. R. Younker Places Third In Can. Judging

A Kingston lady, Mrs. Roy Younker, placed third in Canada among the ladies who entered in the All Canadian Guernsey judging competition this year. Mrs. Younker has 166 points. The highest score was the 171 recorded by Mrs. Violet Holyoak, Langley, B.C.

Roy Younker was the Islander who stood highest among the male competitors with a score of 159. Other Island men who competed included Allison Carr, Harrington, with 152 points; Guy Rodd, Brackley, with 148; Eric Hurry, West Royalty, and Keith Coles of Milton, each with 142.

Shortly after his promotion to the editorship, Mr. DonElysyn announced the new appointments on the staff to fill the positions left vacant by members of the outgoing senior class.

These are: Charley McMillan, associate editor and sports editor; Joe Condon, business manager; Bob Britton, advertising manager; Mike O'Brien, features editor; Tommy McMillan, alumnae; Dick Trotter, photography; Mary Cullen, circulation manager, and Brian Duffy, layout manager.

The first issue of the Red and White published by the new staff will appear April 24.

Winsloe Guernsey Cow Places 3rd In Canada

A Winsloe Guernsey cow, Waverly Dianne's Glenda, stood third in Canada last month in her mature production class for owner Leigh Semple, a Charlottetown pharmacist, and her production is the best in the Maritime provinces for the first quarter of the current year.

Glenda produced 14,685 pounds milk, 670 pounds butterfat for breed class averages — comparisons with other Guernsey cows in the same age group across Canada — of 179 for milk, 163 for butterfat. Her average test for the lactation was 4.56.

Another Semple cow, Johnsdale, Lady Jane, produced 11,241 pounds milk, 538 butterfat for BCAs of 137 and 131.

Horse Shoe Suez produced 10,783 pounds milk, 526 pounds fat for Mrs. Mary Palmer and Sons, Kensington for BCAs of 132 and 128, also in the mature class.

Patricia Verben's Silverlocks produced 74,285 pounds milk, 3,969 butterfat in eight lactations for a Gold Medal longline production for owner J. Eric Hurry, West Royalty. Another Hurry cow, reported previously, Patossie Dorraine's Lassie, produced 140,612 pounds milk, 6,473 pounds fat for BCAs over the nine lactations of 151 milk and 138 butterfat for a diamond medal.

Mr. Semple's cow continued to produce for 376 days making 16,319 milk, 738 fat, all of which was shipped to Charlottetown for fluid consumption as Guernsey milk.

This is the fourth good record completed by Glenda who was bred and developed by John Docherty, Winsloe. She produced 10,297 milk, 474 fat as a four-year-old.

Glenda is officially classified "very good" for type, the second highest rating obtainable and her classification rating is supported by her successful show record at the Old Home Week Show at Charlottetown where she was second as a junior yearling in 1957; first as a milking two-year-old in 1958 and third as a dry three-year-old in 1959.

Mr. Semple operates Buryleigh Farms at Winsloe. He has been a member of the Canadian Guernsey-Breeders' Association since 1961 and he has had his herd on test since that time.

Impaired Driver Given \$100 Fine

Chester Arthur Wilson, charged with impaired driving, received a fine of \$100 and costs from Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, yesterday in Queens County Magistrate court.

Delegates Tour Island From Commerce Dept.

SEVEN MEMBERS of the department of trade and commerce are currently on a two-month tour of Eastern Canada. For the last two days, the delegates have been on Prince Edward Island visiting local industry and various towns around the province. Five of the delegates are, from the left, Douglas Ditto, Calgary; Anthony Eytton, Toronto; Cameron Miller, Montreal; Bernard Gagosz, Toronto; and David Schulman, Quebec City.

The seven-man delegation visited Newfoundland and Nova Scotia last week and left last evening for New Brunswick. They will spend three days in New Brunswick and then go to Montreal and Ottawa. The tour itself is controlled directly by the minister of trade and commerce and the members must familiarize themselves with the economy of the Maritime provinces before being posted to various sectors of the world.

Follow-Up Meeting Held On Custodial Care Home

TIGNISH — The need to have a boarding care home for senior citizens built in the village of Tignish, strongly recommended by a large number of community people at the resources development study group meeting in March, was the business dealt with at a follow-up meeting held in the co-operative assembly building recently.

A preliminary survey to determine the number who would like to make use of a nursing home was reported not completed, as all forms were not returned.

The need to have custodial care in the area was thought a great, and such a home is the only answer for this part of the province, it was agreed.

Gordon Ripley, field man for the ARDA program, chaired the meeting. Mrs. Reg Eldershaw, secretary, read the minutes of the previous meeting and reported for the survey committee. Walter Christopher and Leo Handrahan were elected to work on the survey committee until completed.

A follow-up meeting will be held Wednesday May 5.

Prior to the meeting a film "Royal River" was viewed. Rudy Dallenback, fieldman with ARDA, was present at the meeting.

Federal department of trade and commerce members are currently on a two-month familiarization tour of the Maritimes and Eastern Canada.

The tour has a three fold purpose, it provides the representatives with an opportunity to contact Maritime exporters, the promotion of foreign trade, and a chance to familiarize the group with the economy of the Maritime Provinces.

The delegates of the department have spent the last two days in Prince Edward Island on a tour arranged by the Charlottetown Board of Trade and conducted by Eric Kipping and W. R. Brennan.

Sunday, the delegates visited the national parks, Kensington, Summerside and Charlottetown. Col. Frank Storey took them on a tour of the Confederation Centre and all the representatives were impressed with the architecture and structure of the Complex.

The board of trade and the provincial government gave the members a luncheon yesterday in the Charlottetown Hotel. Speakers were S. C. Wright, deputy minister of agriculture, Eugene Gorman, deputy minister of fisheries, Andrew MacRae, minister of agriculture and Premier Walter R. Shaw. The delegates also paid a courtesy call to Lieutenant-Governor W. J. MacDonald at Government House.

Richard C. Duffy of Charlottetown was fined \$14 and costs when he pleaded guilty in city police court yesterday to a speeding charge.

Magistrate A. J. Haslam, QC, adjourned the case of Mrs. Rose Gauthier, charged with selling liquor to another person, to April 15.

For possession of liquor in a place other than his residence, a resident of Souris was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

Joseph William Dunphy, also from Souris, was charged with drunken driving and remanded to April 14th with bail to stand.

Eight people, charged with being drunk and incapable, appeared. Four accused were each given 20-day suspended sentences, two were each fined \$20 and costs and two were sentenced to 20 days in jail.

A vagrant was remanded to April 14 without bail and an accused, charged with being drunk and disorderly was fined \$15 and costs or five days.

Off-Season Trout Fishing Draws Fine

SUMMERSIDE — A Newton man, Joseph Melvin Boyles, was fined \$10 and costs by Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald yesterday morning in Prince County court.

The accused appeared on a charge of fishing trout in closed season.

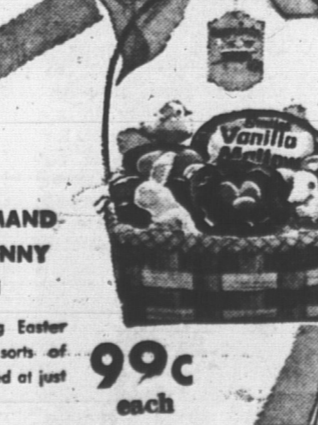

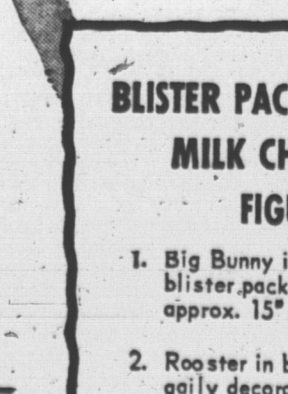
