

July Manpower Situation Said Tightest Since 1951

OTTAWA (CP) — The government said Monday Canada's manpower situation in July was the tightest since the Korean defence buildup of 1951.

Employment in the month rose to an all-time high and there was a sharp drop in the number of jobless Canadians.

The bureau of statistics said the number of persons with jobs at July 21 was an estimated 5,789,000 some 142,000 higher than in June and 201,000 above July, 1955.

At the same time, the bureau said, the number of persons without jobs and seeking work declined by 15,000 from mid-June to 102,000, about 48,000 below July a year ago.

The labor department's national employment service said that at July 19 there were 179,300 unfilled job applications on file at its offices across the country. This was

a reduction of 12,000 from the June 21 total of 191,371 and a drop of 32,000 from 211,230 on July 21, 1955.

DECLINE IN EAST

The decrease from June was due to declines in applications of 5,900 in Quebec, 4,000 in the Atlantic provinces and 1,600 in the Pacific region. A moderate increase of 1,800 was recorded in Ontario and the total for the Prairie provinces remained unchanged at about 23,000.

The bureau's estimates are based on a sampling of 30,000 households. Both the bureau and NES figures are subject to adjustment.

"The employment level, which has been rising rapidly in recent months, reached an all-time high during July," a joint statement said.

"Although there was the usual

strong influx of students and other seasonal workers into the labor force, this development produced a tighter manpower situation than in any year since the Korean buildup in 1951."

Demand for workers in July was particularly strong in the farming, forestry, construction and tourist industries. Shortages were especially high in farming and forestry and among many professional and technical occupations.

Here are the totals of unfilled NES job applications by region at July 19, with the figures for June 21 and for July 21, 1955, in brackets:

Atlantic, 21,418 (25,395 and 25,746); Quebec, 56,812 (65,701 and 65,230); Ontario, 57,784 (55,947 and 70,856); Prairie, 23,818 (23,787 and 27,717); Pacific, 19,447 (21,041 and 21,731).

Let's Talk It Over

The decision of the Summerside Town Council to charge for use of the new Civic Auditorium \$25 rental for church organizations and \$75 for all other groups who charge admission is in our humble opinion somewhat discriminatory to welfare organizations in the town.

A \$75 fee would serve to discourage the promotion of such enterprises.

Surely there should be some difference in the charge made to outsiders coming in to Summerside to put on shows for their own profit, and organizations of taxpayers in the town working for the town's welfare.

our position in Confederation and perhaps, even more notably our position in the Canadian economy. And we are not just exactly happy about either. During the past several years we have been making a very big effort to get our problems placed before the National Government and to influence public opinion in the rest of Canada in favour of helping us to find the answers.

"We have been fortunate, in New Brunswick, in finding new natural resources — notably base metals. You have all heard of the Brunswick-Anacon and the American Metals ores. This summer we are very hopeful that one

and possibly two further important discoveries may be started toward development.

NEW PROBLEMS

"Although this is very fortunate for us, in many ways, it has also produced new problems for the many municipalities and for two ago we were faced with a power crisis. We met that by beginning construction of the Beechwood Hydro Development which will give us 68,000 k.w. next year and a coal burning plant at Chatham with another 20,000 k.w. which will add power in the capital outlay for all of this will run to some forty million dollars — a lot of money for a small province like New Brunswick. Furthermore, well before 1960, we may have to turn round and begin even larger power developments than the ones we are now building because we cannot allow the future of the province and of its people to be frustrated because of power shortages.
