LIEUT. GOVERNOR McINTYRE.

The appointment of Dr. McIntyre to the office of Lieutenant Governor of this Province, in succession to the Hon. G. W. Howlan, surprised many persons. Every reader will have noted that THE EXAMINER, in the cool shades of Opposition, was the first newspaper to announce it. Even the Patriot, was, apparently, among the "surprised." It is probable that when making the appointment, after so many months of anxious thought about the matter, the authorities at Ottawa had in view the critical condition of the Farquharson Administration. Dr. McIntyre, is, we believe, the first physician appointed to the Governorship of P. E. Island. But we fear that he comes too late to save the Liberal administration for which he is to prescribe. The doom of the Government is sealed. Dr. McIntyre's skill may perhaps ease its last hours or prolong its life. But nothing can prevent the inevitable dissolution that is at hand.

The selection of the worthy doctor, at this juncture was, however, we have no doubt, due to considerations apart from his skill as a physician. In the years that are passed he had much hard, and rough, and not always successful campaigning to do for the Liberal party; and he has suffered in consequence. If party service is the essential condition in respect to gubernatorial appointments, it may be admitted that Lieutenant Governor McIntyre has earned his position as well as any of his competitors in the race for the appointment. We hope that he will prove to be a worthy successor of Lieutenant Governor Howlan. The nephew of the late Bishop, McIntyre ought to be a good governor. However this may prove to be, we feel sure that Mr. McIntyre will preside at Government House with grace and dignity, and perform her part as the leader of society to the satisfaction of every educated and reasonable person.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The latest theory is that the Leader of the Government has been hypnotized by Mr. Gabriel McDonald,—though how Mr. McDonald "got a chance at him" is not stated.

—It is rather unfortunate for Mr. Blanchard's chances that "the master of the administration" at Ottawa is unwell; but perhaps Sir Wilfrid will stand fast and show what it is to have a French leader.

—It is reported that a number of hot telegrams have been sent to Ottawa giving the Government to understand who must be appointed County Court Judge for Queen's County. We shall see whether or not the local end of the Liberal machine will govern in this regard.

—There is an election in the wind. The Summerside Journal reports that "Mr. Bulman, of the surveying steamer Gulnare, is here, with two or three men, surveying the harbor in connection with the proposed opening of a new winter route between Summerside and Cape Tormentine. The Gulnare will be here next week, on the same service."

—In every county academy from one end of Nova Scotia to the other, there were celebrations of Empire day. The Halifax children sent this cable to the Queen:

To our Queen, London, England:
"The school children of Halifax, celebrating Empire day in common with all Canadian schools, send loyal greetings to their beloved sovereign."

THE GERRYMANDER—HOW IT EFFECTS P. E. ISLAND.

The Guardian is laboring to present to the people of this Province a case for the prematurely brought forth gerrymander bill. It refers to existing conditions in New Brunswick and Ontario. Wouldn't it be better employed in discussing the bill as it affects this Province? Hain't it better begin at home? At present this Province with 103,000 and odd inhabitants is divided into five ridings, each returning one member, as follows: King's, 21,694, East Queens, 23,464, West Queens, 22,210, East Prince, 29,723, and West Prince, 20,987. Seeing that a fifth of the population is 21,864, it must be admitted that this division is not unfair. As a matter of fact it is as fair and equal as it can conveniently be made.

Compare this division of the Province for electoral purposes, with the conditions that will exist if the Redistribution Bill now before Parliament should be passed. There will be but three electoral districts, returning five representatives! King's County, with a population of 26,633 will have but one member of the House of Commons, while Prince County with a population of 35,470 will have two, or one member for 18,235, of its inhabitants. Thus the difference as against King's County will be no less than 8,398. Is not this scandalous, and ought not every independent newspaper and fair-minded man to protest against it? At present there is a slight unavoidable difference in favor of Prince County. But, according to the Laurier bill, King's is to be treated with gross injustice as compared with Prince. Queen's County is to have one representative for 22,897 of its inhabitants, the difference in its favor, as against King's, being 3,646. This is not so bad as in the case between King's and Prince; but it is bad enough. It is nearly 1,000 greater than the greatest difference under the present arrangement.

In addition to the injustice evident in the application of the new bill upon the basis of representation by population, there is also this,—that in Prince and Queens each elector may vote for two candidates, while in Kings each elector may vote for but one candidate. The advantage thus given the party having the majority in Prince and Queens is as two to one. The smallest possible Liberal majority in Prince and Queens can by the provisions of Sir Wilfrid's bill elect four Liberal members of the House of Commons, while no matter how large the majority of Conservatives in Kings may be, they can elect but one member!

We say nothing now about the manifest unfairness arising out of the complications effected when candidates are "hunting in couples." But we appeal to the justice of the public as to whether or not, in view of the figures and facts here presented, the Redistribution Bill now before Parliament should be passed in its present form.

—All the letters to The Patriot and The Guardian in advocacy of the appointment to the governorship of Hon. Donald Farquharson seem to have gone for nothing.

—Perhaps The Patriot will state what caused "the new light" to break in upon Mr. Premier Farquharson and how it is that a tax which Mr. Farquharson bitterly opposed a year ago on the ground that the proceeds would be "license" and "blood money" is now approved and imposed by him because it will promote temperance.

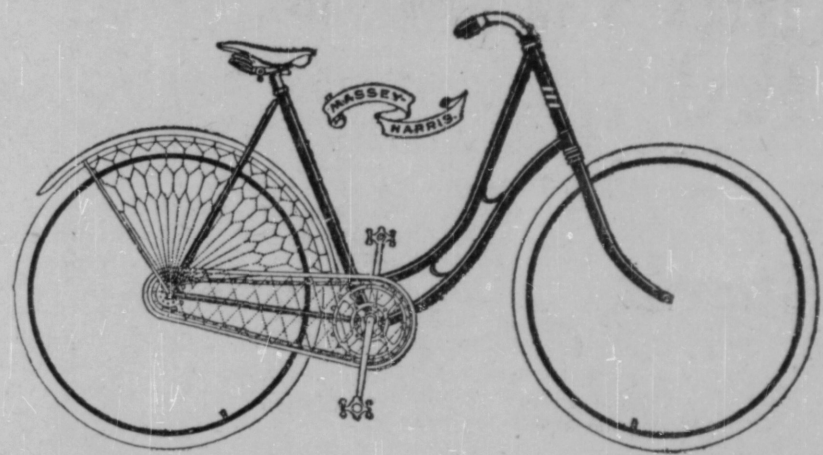

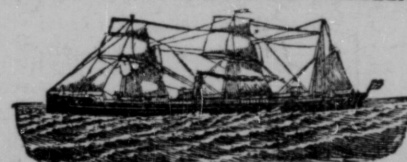
