St. Patrick's Day.

MONTREAL, March 19. Reports from all parts are to the effect that St. Patrick's Day passed off pleasantly and quietly.

Distress in Connaught.

DUBLIN, March 19. Earl Spencer, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland has written to the Bishop of Connaught, informing him that no further loans to poor tenants can be made by the Government. This will result in much distress in Connaught.

Parallel Repudiated Connection with the Explosion.

LONDON, March 19. Mr. Parnell, in the House of Commons on Saturday, repudiated the connection of the Irish party with the explosion at the Westminster Local Board Offices. He says that the laborers engaged in Scotland at present are in a dangerous condition, and to them may be attributed the cause of the explosion and not to the Irish.

Lost at Sea.

LIVERPOOL, March 19. The iron ship "Dunstaffnage," Sunderland, master, was lost on passage from Calcutta to this port. Eighteen men, and a number of women and children were lost. The "Dunstaffnage" was 1810 tons, was built in 1881, and was owned by J. Houston of this place.

Abolition of the Nova Scotia Legislative Council.

HALIFAX, March 19. The House of Assembly on Saturday passed a resolution to abolish the Legislative Council of the Province.

Overawing Socialists.

PARIS, March 19. The Socialists throughout France, and particularly in this city, are becoming overawed by the strong military precautions taken by the Government.

Telegraph Notes.

The Bulgarian ministry have resigned. General Soboleff is forming a new Cabinet.

Two maiden ladies were burned to death on the 15th, in their dwelling at East Hartford, Conn.

Three thousand weavers in Huddersfield district, Eng., have struck, owing to a disagreement regarding wages.

A woman named Figner, an important nihilist who arranged the murder of General Strelnikoff at Odessa in 1882, has been arrested.

At a consistory held on the 15th, the Pope appointed several Bishops, including the Bishops of Halifax, Charleston and Grand Rapids.

The defalcations of M. Makoff, president and secretary for regulating the social condition of Russian Jews, and who committed suicide, amount to 11,000 roubles.

Four anarchists, including two members of the press, have been sentenced to two years imprisonment and to pay a fine of 3,000 francs, for delivering seditious speeches.

Billion in the Bank of England has decreased \$240,000 during the week. The proportion of the Bank reserve to liability which last week was 43 per cent. is now 42.34 per cent.

Hon. David Davis, ex-president of the United States Senate, was married, on the 14th, at Tokay, N. C., to Miss Addie Burr. It was a quiet wedding. The presents were numerous and costly.

It has been discovered that Emmett O'Neil, of Schenectady, N. Y., broker, who recently failed, has fled and that he has victimized persons in Schenectady and Danesburgh out of \$250,000.

Two Chinamen who were some time ago driven from Waynesboro, Ga., and there stoned by a mob, have brought suit for \$115,000 damages against several prominent citizens in the U. S. District Court. Considerable excitement is occasioned thereby.

A most dangerous counterfeit of the stamp standard silver dollar has made its appearance in the States. The base coin has the exact weight, ring and appearance of the genuine, and resists acid. Unless the outer coating of silver is penetrated, it would readily be accepted as genuine by merchants. Several pieces only have been discovered upon reaching a sub treasury.

Despatches from St. Joseph, Mo., says that in the case of Enos J. Crowther, charged with complicity in the robbery of \$100,000 city bonds there about a year ago, which is now on trial, John S. Cox, one of the defendants, has turned State evidence and testified that he, together with Crowther, Irwin and Scott, planned the robbery, and that on the night of the 17th March, while the St. Patrick ball was going on in the City Hall, Crowther and Scott entered the office of the City Registrar and abstracted bonds from the vaults. Subsequently Scott and Irwin went to New York and negotiated them. The testimony produced a sensation and was partially corroborated by other witnesses.

In the recent race the Oxford crew had the best of an uneven start. They pulled regular stroke, nearly 40 to the minute and were almost clear of the Cambridge boat at Craven Steps. About six furlongs from the start the Cambridge boat here deflected towards the Middlesex shore. The Oxford at end of the first mile, which they covered in 4m. 15s., were two lengths ahead and were rowing well together. Here the darkness thickened and snow began to fall; the Cambridge crew were making considerable head by the time the soap-works were reached. At Hammersmith bridge, one and three quarter miles from Putney, they were nine seconds behind

Oxford. At Chiswick-Lyot, three quarters of a mile distant, they were three lengths ahead, but were going better. A violent hail storm came on when they were at this point. The Cambridge eight quickened their speed, but, when on the Corney Reach, it was evident that it was all over with them. The Oxford boat came in, through a steadily falling rain, an easy winner. The result of the race causes greater excitement than any previous race has, in consequence of the heavy betting on the Cambridge crew who, at the start, were the favorites at 7 to 2. The defeat of a crew on which such odds were laid is unprecedented.

Irish Notes.

It is stated that Joe Brady, one of the Dublin conspiracy prisoners, has confessed that he murdered Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke.

The Government intend to release John Walsh from custody, because the evidence against him is insufficient to warrant his extradition. It is believed that Walsh will accompany Frank Byrne to America very shortly.

Mr. Gladstone, in the House of Commons, on the 15th, strongly denounced Parnell's statement that the courts imposed the rack rents. He insisted that tenants were willing to pay the rents fixed by the Court. He hoped that Parnell would give assurance that the new crusade would be in a strictly legal manner. It would be in violation of the duty of the Government to demand further sacrifices from landlords. Mr. Gladstone's remarks were repeatedly cheered. The second reading of Parnell's bill was then rejected by a vote of 63 yeas to 250 nays.

Patrick Egan, in a lengthy interview at New York, denied the truth of the statement of his escape from Dublin. He said the chief purpose of his visit was commercial business in connection with his firm in Dublin, who deal largely in American flour, and to give evidence in extradition proceedings now pending against Sheridan. He says there is no truth in the statement that he was obliged to flee from Dublin in disguise to avoid arrest. That he came here to give the leaders of the movement such information in his power regarding the situation at home. Regarding the prosecutions in connection with alleged assassination conspiracy in Dublin, he says the Government would be wanting in its duty if it did not do everything possible to break up such conspiracy and convict its members, provided it acted fairly and squarely. He denies the rumor that Land League funds were contributed towards the conspiracy. Regarding the charges of misappropriation of Land League funds, made by Lady Florence Dixie, he says: "Lady Florence Dixie had been led, through her craving for notoriety, to become the mouthpiece of Richard Pigott, whose own statement would receive no attention, and in April 1881, Mr. Pigott wrote me that he had been offered \$500 by the Castle officials to publish a statement in his paper, the 'Irishman,' alleging misappropriation of Land League funds. He said he needed money and threatened to accept the offer unless I sent him \$300. Of course I refused to do so and defied him to do his worst. Subsequently, a pamphlet which was in Pigott's writing was set up in type for Lady Florence Dixie. She became frightened at the serious charges it contained against the leaders of the Land League, and gave orders that the few copies printed should be burned and the forms broken up. I secured one of the copies, and all charges made since by Lady Florence Dixie are those which were then made in the pamphlet. Of course they are utterly false. My accounts had been thoroughly audited by John Dillon, Rev. Father Sheehy, and Matthew Harris. No complaints have ever been made by actual subscribers to the Land League fund. There is now in hand between \$25,000 and \$26,000, all of which is invested in American securities in the names of five trustees." Egan will probably remain in America for three or four months. He expects to visit Buffalo to see Mr. Mooney, and to visit Boston. He will be present at the convention to be held in Philadelphia, March 25.

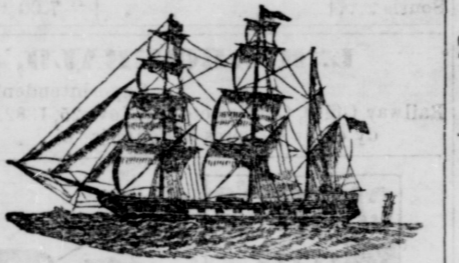
