Province of Canada. "Our people have ever borne a warm attachment to the Throne and, in peace and war, have cherished our ties of British kin not only the Province, but this Capital City and each of our three Counties, bear royal appellations. Nor are we unmindful that the present happy occasion is likewise the anniversary of the birth of our illustrious great grandfather, King Edward the Peacemaker, who also, as a young man, visited our shores, as did your grandfather and parents, their present gracious Majesties, on subsequent occasions. "It is a matter of great satisfaction at this time that His Majesty's health has so far improved as to permit of our making your own visit here one of unalloyed pleasure. "On behalf of the Province I present you with this gift to be used for whatever charity or promotion you and your consort prefer. "This gift of fur is unique in that there are no more such skins in existence at the present time and this Province is the Alma Mater of the fur farm industry."

To The King

The Premier also presented a beautifully illuminated address which he requested Her Highness to present to the King: It bears the Island coat of arms above the following words: "May it please Your Majesty: "On this happy day when we are honoured with the presence of Their Royal Highnesses the Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip, our hearts go out in loyalty and affection to Your Majesty and to our beloved Queen. "We cannot let pass this opportunity of expressing our devotion to Your Majesty and the Queen, our gratitude for your recovery, and our joy and pride in sharing personally in the welcome extended to Their Royal Highnesses in Canada."

Civic Address

Following is the text of the illuminated address presented by His Worship Mayor Stewart at City Hall: "Your Royal Highness Princess Elizabeth, Your Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh. "The Council and Citizens of the City of Charlottetown are proud and honoured to welcome Your Royal Highnesses to the Capital of Prince Edward Island and they will long cherish the memory of this great day. "As we recall again the visit of Their Majesties to our City, we ask Your Royal Highnesses to convey to our beloved King and Queen sincere expressions of loyalty and devotion and good wishes for health and happiness. We pray that the blessings of Almighty God and the affection of

a Loyal Commonwealth may continue to be given to Their Majesties and to Your Royal Highnesses in the years ahead. "We have much pleasure in presenting to Your Royal Highnesses a small gift as a commemoration of this visit and as a token of good will."

At Experimental Farm

The following is the text of the address presented by Mr. Parent at the Experimental Farm. "Your Royal Highnesses: "On behalf of the director of the Experimental Farms Service and the personnel of the Charlottetown Experimental Station I welcome you most cordially to our institution today. "We are pleased and honored that Her Royal Highness Princess Elizabeth has graciously consented to plant an English oak tree to commemorate this memorable day. "We grew this young tree from an acorn gathered from the oak which His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales planted on these grounds in 1919. The original tree was obtained from the nursery of Dr. J. Walter Jones, Prime Minister of Prince Edward Island. "Let us hope that someday Prince Charles or Princess Anne may visit this spot and plant a young oak which we shall grow from an acorn produced by this tree which Her Royal Highness is about to plant. "During the past thirty-nine years this golden shovel has been used by members of the Royal Family and other prominent persons, as listed hereon, to plant trees on these beautiful grounds: His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught; His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; the Duke of Devonshire; Lady Byng; the Earl of Bessborough; Lord Tweedsmuir; The Earl of Athlone; His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent; Viscount Alexander; Dr. L. H. Newman; Dr. F. J. Crearey; Sir William Osg."

and the crowd roared its approval of this thoughtful gesture which considerably improved the view, both for the Royal couple and for the people lining the streets. All along the procession route, many people ran along the sidewalks keeping abreast of the Royal car, and even what may have been the youngest citizen to watch the parade enjoyed this phase thoroughly. A small baby, who could not have been more than nine months old, rode on his father's shoulder as he kept pace with the car. The small tot was waving his fists energetically and lustily roaring his approval of this mode of transportation. As the Royal car turned the corner of Ambrose street, it slowed noticeably and cut sharply into the curb to permit a group of well-bundled-up youngsters a really close-up view. The Princess and the Duke looked for a moment and then the Duke's hand came up in its familiar wave while a shy smile lightened the face of Princess Elizabeth. The children grinned wide-

ly and waved their flags with renewed energy.

A few moments after the Royal car and its attendant string of motors had passed one part of the route, a tiny tot of three or four was heard to say, "I don't want to go home yet, Mommy. I'm waiting to see the Princess". Perhaps she couldn't see the forest for the trees.

In mid-afternoon when the Princess and the Duke with their entourage were on their way from the luncheon at Government House they circled off Brighton Road around the driveway at the Prince Edward Island Hospital. There the main hospital building and the Veterans Wing had every window full of faces as patients got their only look at the visitors. Lining the roadway were hospital authorities, graduate nurses and nurses in training. They waved flags and cheered heartily as the car containing the Royal couple slowed to a crawl.

Just before the motorcade arrived, a crib with four little boys was placed on the sidewalk to the main entrance. It slipped over the curb and as the nurses lifted it back, one of the castors came off and had to be replaced by another nurse while four others lifted it up. Getting a tremendous thrill from it all were the four youngsters, Heartz Godkin, 5; Winston Smith, 9; George Edmonds, 6; and Garry Meredith, 7. All patients at the hospital, they said they thought they "were lucky" to see the Princess.

Young Farmer Will Be Charged Today In Georgetown Court

Police yesterday arrested Joseph G. MacDonald, Little Harbour, as a suspect in connection with the death of Mrs. John MacKinnon, 41, who was shot Thursday evening while playing with two of her eleven children in the kitchen of her home at Little Harbour. MacDonald was arrested about 3 a.m. yesterday and it is learned from the Attorney General's Department that a formal charge of murder will be laid against him before Stipendiary Magistrate J. A. MacDonald at Georgetown at 10 o'clock this morning. Deputy Attorney General J. O. C. Campbell will attend the proceedings.

Following the laying of the charge, there will be a formal adjournment for a week while police investigation into the matter is being continued. A police dog, which was being employed on other work at Tormentine, has been called into the investigation to help "search for certain evidence."

MacDonald is awaiting trial on a charge of rape, and is scheduled to appear at the November sitting of the Supreme Court at Georgetown on Tuesday. He was out on a \$10,000 bail bond.

The tragedy occurred about 10 o'clock on Thursday evening. Mrs. MacKinnon had spent the evening at a friend's until 9 p.m. She and two of her children and a hired man were in the kitchen of her home, which lies three miles east of Souris and about one and one-half miles from the main road. The house is a two-storey frame construction. The driveway passes directly in front of the kitchen widow, at which side the shot was fired. The area has since been roped off by the police. There are trees near the pond about 140 yards away, and a hedge 25 feet back of the house, which is on the left hand side of the driveway.

The two children, it is understood, said they did not hear the shot which killed their mother, although some ten or fifteen minutes later they thought they heard a shot fired in the woods, which are separated from the house by some 200 yards.

MacDonald, a farmer whose age is said to be about 22, was released on a \$10,000 bail bond and the success of the program is in great measure due to his thoroughness and efficiency.

ported unofficially to have been arrested in his bed about 3 o'clock yesterday morning. A widow whose husband died two years ago, Mrs. MacKinnon is survived by eleven children. They are: Estelle, 19, nurse-in-training at the Charlottetown Hospital; Alban, 17; Alfred, 16, living with an uncle at Souris Line Road; Alice, 14; Daniel, 13; Margaret, 11; Marie, 10; Justin, 8; Barry, 7; Kenneth, 5; and David, 4. Another son died at the age of one year.

Funeral arrangements were not announced yesterday. The body was taken to the home last night. Mrs. MacKinnon was the former Mary Ann MacAulay. Six brothers survive: Clarence and Frank in Halifax; George, St. Catharines; Albert, Souris Line Road; Joseph, Souris West; Charles, in Labrador.

A few hours after the shooting Coroner Dr. M. N. Beck of St. Peter's impanelled a jury. After the body was viewed, the inquest adjourned until Nov. 16. It will be held at Souris Hall.
