

Youth To Dorchester; Given Two Year Term

Wendell Sherman Francis Grady of Summerside in supreme court yesterday was sentenced to two years in Dorchester Penitentiary by Mr. Justice G.J. Tweedy of Charlottetown. Grady had been found guilty by a seven petit jury Friday of robbery under section 238 of the criminal code. The charge arose following the robbery of Gerard Dalton of Bloomfield on the morning of Sept. 24 in St. Nicholas' street here. Dalton was reported to have been robbed of approximately \$150.

Prior to the judge passing the sentence, Defence Counsel J. McNeill Campbell stated he felt the court should know of the accused.
He stated that Grady was 19 years of age and had attended school to grade 8 but felt that he hadn't benefited much from the latter grades. In continuing, he said the prisoner had been fairly steadily employed and lived with his mother who has a fair condition and that it was important that she have someone close at hand.

He added that Grady had taken an active part in athletics and also aided in the minor hockey program here. He had also played with Summerside in the Prince County Hockey League last year. Mr. Campbell said.

Defence counsel suggested that the crime had been more a test than a robbery and that the prisoner had not been identified as taking part in articling the complaint in this particular case. Mr. Campbell further suggested a short jail term as he felt a term in penitentiary would possibly embitter him.

Crown Prosecutor George R. McMahon conceded that the prisoner seemed fairly steady and added that the prisoner was single and making money and that as a result there had been no reason at all to commit the robbery.

He cited the prisoner's previous record and stated that he had been given suspended sentences on two occasions and both times had been in trouble before sentences were up.
He therefore suggested a term in Dorchester Penitentiary for two years.
