



### SCUBA DIVERS INVESTIGATE ALBERTON SCALLOP BEDS

A three-man team of scuba divers Saturday carried out an "on the spot" investigation on the volume and extent of scallop beds near Alberton harbor. Operating from the department of fisheries patrol boat Howe Point, captained by George Morrison, John Greer, a member of Alberton detachment of the RCMP, Bobby Bruvels of O'Leary, and Roy Ramsay, Summerside, went down to a depth of 100 feet and reported a good volume of scallops on a smooth sandy bottom. The three divers are shown enjoying a coffee break after a 17-minute stay on the bottom where they found the water extremely cold below the 50-foot level. From the left they are Ramsay, Bruvels and Greer. As a result of their investigations some changes are expected to be made in the type of drags being used by two scallop druggers currently fishing on the bed. Arrangements for the investigation were made by Phillip Kinch of Alberton Industries in co-operation with the department of fisheries. The scallop beds are located about 12 miles off Alberton harbor.

### Motorist Draws \$125 Fine For Driving While Impaired

### CNR To Build N.S. Spur Line

MONCTON (CP) — The CNR has called tenders for preliminary work on a new 3.80 mile spur line to serve the \$50,000,000 pulp mill to be constructed at Abercrombie Point near New Glasgow by Scott Maritime Pulp Limited.

The railway said tenders are being invited for the grading, ditching and fencing of the route, as well as the installation of pipe culverts and other incidental work required for the construction of the subgrade for the spur line.

The new line will run from Alma, on CN's Oxford subdivision, to the mill site on Pictou harbor.

The line is scheduled for completion in October of this year.

The Prince Edward Island Centennial Grants Committee (Committee of Administration) invites applications for proposed 1967 Centennial projects.

Briefly summarized the following pertains:

(1) All applications to be submitted by an "initiating agency" which may be a city, town, village, municipality, school district, etc. or a grouping of such jurisdictions desiring a joint project.

(2) Federal/Provincial matching grants will be available for approved projects on the following maximum schedule for each initiating agency.

Federal	\$1.00 per capita
Provincial	\$1.00 per capita
Initiating Agency	\$1.00 per capita

Based on the 1st June 1963 intercensal population estimates of the Dominion Statistician.

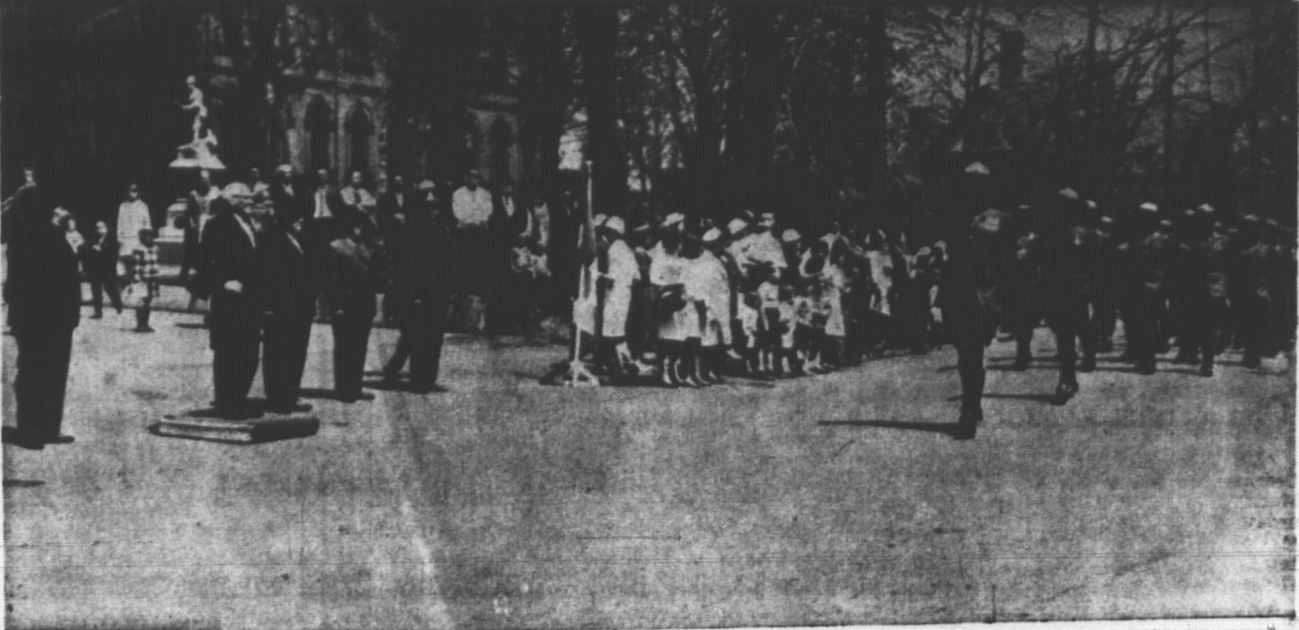
Initiating agencies may further supplement the above schedule.

(3) It is necessary for the 1967 Centennial projects to be of a lasting nature and broadly stated may include:

- (a) the acquisition or construction of parks and buildings of a recreational or cultural nature.
- (b) the acquisition or restoration of buildings of historical or architectural merit.
- (c) the creation, completion and publishing of works of the fine arts, fine crafts and books.
- (d) all projects must be completed in sufficient time for the Centennial observances.
- (e) Pageants or celebrations do not qualify as Centennial projects.
- (f) all proposed projects and applications must be submitted to this office not later than 31st October 1965.

### Student Facing Perjury Charge

RIMOUSKI, Que. (CP)—Grafton Allaire, 19-year-old student, was charged with perjury Saturday eight minutes after he had been freed following a six-day sentence for contempt of court.

Allaire, from St. Jean Vianay, was declared a hostile witness by the Crown last week during the current trial of Claude Poisson, 20, charged with capital murder.

Poisson, also a student, was charged with the bludgeoning in April, 1962, of Brother Oscar Lalonde, 50, porter at Matane College. His trial has been in progress three weeks.

Judge Jean-Paul Berube of Riviere-du-Loup granted a defence request for bail on the perjury charge against Allaire. It was opposed by the Crown.

Mr. Justice Georges Pelletier, presiding at Poisson's trial, Tuesday a Crown request last Tuesday to present evidence of perjury against Allaire.

The Crown said it wanted to show that Allaire perjured himself in denying, at the Poisson trial, that things he had told provincial police in an earlier statement were false.

A pro forma date of June 11 was set for Allaire's perjury case.

Much of the early session at Poisson's trial Saturday was taken up with testimony by Armand Morin, a former provincial police captain who was in charge of the police identification bureau. He showed the jury methods of taking finger-prints.
