THEIR CHARLOTTETOWN MEETING GAVE SHAPE TO CANADA

Story Forms Big Part Of Island's Heritage

Woven into the fabric of the great new series, The Fathers of Confederation, which starts this week in The Evening Patriot, there is the story of the Island's greatest moment in history and one of the richest features of its heritage.
