Passenger Trains Are Going Today

Edgar Taylor, CNR superintendent, yesterday stated that Canadian National Railways is expected to be in full operation this morning with CNR car ferries operating on normal schedules and now carrying trucks and buses. Passenger trains are expected to be operating this morning with the Borden train carrying passengers at 7:45 for the boat to the mainland.

Mr. Taylor said it's just a matter of notifying workers, and dispatching equipment throughout the island. The first train to operate, apart from yard engines, left Charlottetown CNR station at Friday morning bound for Borden and Summerside with the equipment necessary for these points to resume normal operation.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says skies were cloudy in nearly all sections of the Maritimes late Friday evening. A few showers were occurring in Prince Edward Island and Eastern Nova Scotia.

New Brunswick and Southwestern Nova Scotia will have mostly sunny weather today. Elsewhere skies will not become sunny until the afternoon. Temperatures will be cool, generally reaching only the low to mid 60s in the afternoon.

Sunny weather with somewhat warmer temperatures is expected Sunday in the three provinces.

Fish Plant Receives Water System

The Atlantic development Board will finance the construction of a fresh-water supply system for a fish processing plant in North Rustico, P.E.I., it was announced today by Jan M. MacKeigan, QC, Chairman of the Board.

The \$20,000 project will provide water for a fish plant which is now under construction. The plant will process 70,000 pounds of fish daily during its initial period of operation, and production is expected to rise to 210,000 pounds daily.

The new plant will specialize in pickling and packaging mackerel and other fish species, mainly for the West Indies market. A number of modern techniques will be introduced, both in fishing and in processing the fish. The operators plan to use electronic fish finders to locate schools of mackerel, and to catch them with large 900 by 80 foot seines. Fish pumps will be used to empty the seine into the boat, and to transfer the catch to the plant. The operation as planned includes bucket conveyors, holding tanks able to handle 800 pounds every six minutes, and a splitting machine which handles 100 fish per minute.
