

Yankees Smother Giants 13-1; Favored To Take Deciding Game Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 9 (AP)—The World Series blew up-boom-right in the Giants' red faces today, and probably the safest bet on the board is that New York Yankees will nail down their third straight world championship tomorrow in their own ball yard.

In the worst slaughter perpetrated in a playoff game for 15 years, the Bombers put the slug on Leo Durocher's wonder boys 13-1 to run the victory count to 3-2 in their favor and by the savagery of their attacks make the final result look a foregone conclusion.

Records were tied all over the Polo Grounds as Gil McDougald, the Yankees' great rookie infielder, propelled a home run into the left field balcony with the bases loaded in the third inning and Joe DiMaggio celebrated his 50th appearance in a World Series Game.

Only two other batters ever matched the feat of the 22-year-old McDougald, who only last season was the most valuable star in the Texas League. None had done it since 1935, when Tony Lazzeri of the Yankees helped off-late at a similar massacre of the Giants in the same park. DiMaggio's big 50 equalled the record set by Frankie Frisch more than a decade ago.

Horrible Exhibition

Except for another wonderful job of pitching by Ed Lopat, slick Yankee southpaw, it was a pretty horrible exhibition for 47,530 fans—mostly of the Giants' persuasion—to witness. It was strictly no contest after McDougald exploded to climax a five-run fifth inning which disposed of Larry Jansen, righthanded Giants' ace.

The stylish Lopat exactly matched his magnificent performance of the second game by throting the National Leaguers with five hits and a single run. Only one Giant reached first in the final four innings as Lopat's mastery reached its peak.

For the Giants, the afternoon was a nightmare. They employed five pitchers in an effort to still the Bomber bats, but finally succeeded in doing so only in the final two frames.

Co-starting with McDougald in the 12-hit assault was little Phil Rizzuto, who pushed a two-run homer into the close right field stands in the fourth off Montie Kennedy. The great shortstop also clouted a single and scored three times.

Typically for the Giants, the beating they received probably would have been much smaller had the game been played in

Yankee Stadium. It is extremely doubtful that McDougald's high fly would have reached the seats at the stadium. Rizzuto's lucky punch shot only a few feet from the foul line in the Yank park. The Giants contrived two of their five hits and their only run off Lopat in the first when Alvin Dark lined a single to left and came home on Monte Irvin's single which leftfielder Gene Woodling bobbled.

After that Easy Ed had them hogtied. The chunky portlander permitted only one Giant to reach second in the last eight innings. That was on catcher West's error never saw third. Lopat issued only one walk, to Willie Mays to open the second inning. He struck out three.

Only Dark and Irvin continued to thrive on Yankee hurling. Each whacked a pair of singles in a hopeless case. Irvin's brace ran his total for the five games played to 11, tying the record for safeties in a six-game series. The most ever hit in any series was 12, by four different players, by Gene Woodling in deep left-center robbed Irvin of what looked like a certain triple in the ninth.

Yanks Feast on Offerings

Every player in the Yankee starting lineup except Lopat feasted on Jansen and his relievers. Woodling belted a prodigious drive to right-center in the ninth, but was thrown out trying to stretch it into a home run. Besides Jansen and Kennedy, George Spencer, Al Corwin and Alex Konikowski felt the lash.

Jansen, winner of 23 victories during the regular season and the playoff with Brooklyn, again proved a terrible disappointment to Giant's followers. Lopat beat him in the second series.

The scoring details of the latter part of the dreary contest scarcely are important. The Yanks loved to stretch it into the tomorrow. George Spencer, who belted two runs in the sixth and then slammed him out of there with only one out in the seventh. Three runs scored as Corwin took over and delivered a wild pitch for variety and DiMaggio laced a double down the left line.

The Giants committed three fielding errors, one of them by Hank Thompson in right field in an effort to get some righthand power against Lopat. Thompson will be back in the tomorrow.

Hoping to wind things up, Stengel is giving Vic Raschi another shot at the drooping Giants tomorrow. Durocher has little choice. It was to be Dave Koslo, the southpaw who beat the Yanks in the Series' opener.

IN THIS CORNER

If coaches A. J. MacAdam of Saint Dunstan's University, Gordon Bennett and Jim Coyle of Prince of Wales College or Major MacCormack of Mount Allison University were to walk into the advertising department of a newspaper today the add they would probably insert would read something like this "Wanted—One or more experienced football players with proven ability to dribble the ball. If the applicant desires full time work he should be able to tackle, pass and kick the ball. If not he will be used only on wet days when ball handling is difficult. A minimum of Grade XII education is necessary when applying to either S. D. U. or Mount A."

Anyone of the three teams could have used a number of experienced dribblers in the three football games over the week-end. Dribbling or pushing the ball with the feet or shins is an art that comes only with practise and is useful at all times, especially in a wet day.
