Mary MacKeen, well known chester artist, will present an exhibition of her work as the inaugural presentation of the art gallery in the new Acadia Students Center in Wolfville. The exhibition will be opened by Rear Admiral J.V. Brock, RCN (Ret) at 2 p.m. on Monday January 10, 1972. This will coincide with the opening of the Center.

The exhibition will be composed of oils, charcoals and pastels and will deal primarily with works portraying children for which Mrs. MacKeen is famous. She is perhaps best known for her sketch of a child which is used as a logo for the Issac Walton Killam Children Hospital.

In 1969, Mrs. MacKeen exhibited her work in the gallery of the Student Union Building at Dalhousie University. This exhibit was viewed by over five hundred people in a two week period—a record in that year for the Gallery.

The exhibition at Acadia University will run for two weeks beginning January 10. Gallery hours are from two to four and from seven-thirty to nine-thirty in the evening.

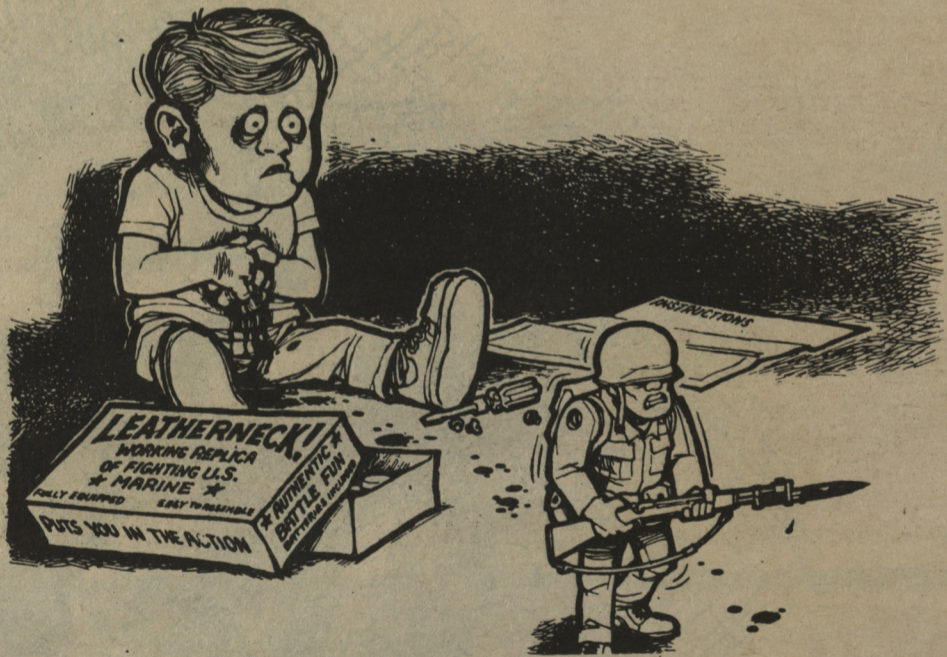
