Fisherman's Body Recovered Tues.

The body of Clifford Vincent Doucette, 38, of Ebbaflet, was discovered Tuesday near Richibucto, N.B., and has been returned to his home for burial. He was one of two fishermen from the Miramichiqua area missing since they jumped from their burning fishing boat on Aug. 10.

Doucette and two companions, Leslie M. Hustler and Calvin Costain, had been on their way back to Miramichiqua from a fishing trip when their boat, the Deas H, caught fire.

Both Doucette and Hustler chose to abandon ship rather than face the fire. Costain remained on board. Doucette and Hustler took deck boards to keep themselves afloat and jumped into the waters of the Northumberland Strait. They were not heard from again.

The next day, Aug. 11, the boat was sighted from shore and on investigation, Costain was found lying in the bottom of the burnt hull, suffering burns and shock, but alive. He later told the story of the fire.

An air and search was made immediately, but was later abandoned when no trace of the pair could be found. Fishermen, however, were asked to keep a look out when fishing their traditional trip when their boat, the Deas H, caught fire.

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TIGNISH — Fire of undetermined origin yesterday afternoon levelled a large modern farm home owned by Sylvère Chaisson on the Harper Road.

The dwelling, valued at \$11,000, burst into flames while members of the family were nearby outdoors and they were unable to enter the home owing to the extreme heat. Everything in the house was lost including a sum of money.

The Tignish fire department was called, but the fire was out of control when they arrived. The firemen fought a successful several hour battle to save a large barn and a smaller building.

There was reported to be only \$100.00 insurance on the loss.

Gov't Plans To Boost Foreign Aid 3 Ways

MONTREAL (CP) — External Affairs Minister Martin indicated Wednesday the government gradually will expand its foreign aid program in three main directions: Educational assistance, capital projects and food give-aways.

He spoke to 35 Canadian high school teachers who are being sent this week to six underdeveloped countries around the world by the external aid office, a federal agency.

It is the third and largest contingent of teachers assigned overseas in the last three years by the Canadian government. More than 100 Canadians will teach in foreign schools in the coming academic year.

"This is a significant contribution and I am very hopeful that we can continue to enlarge our program in the coming year," he said.

He announced that film projectors and other audio-visual aids and 17 trucks will be shipped to eight African countries to assist their education departments.

The new aid shipments will go to Tanganyika and seven former French colonies that now are independent: Morocco, Senegal, Niger, The Congo (Brazzaville), Dahomey, Cameroon, and the Central African Republic.

Slight Increase In Late Blight Is Reported

A slight increase in the amount of late blight has been evident in Prince Edward Island following the recent rains. However, it is too early yet to discover what effect these rains may have on the disease situation. Generally low seasonal temperatures, which occurred at the same time, will have had the effect of retarding sporulation of the fungus. Because of these low temperatures, the progress of the disease will likely be slower than might be expected during a wet period.

If the present rainy period is followed by a few days of high

day and night temperatures, the disease would become more active. Growers, therefore, are advised to spray as soon as possible.

When we visited the Annapolis Valley last week we saw no infections, the season up to that time being rather dry. Since then rains have occurred in that region.
