## THE SITUATION AT GLENCOE

Boers Shelling Dundee at Long Range

BRITISH ENTRENCHED AT GLENCOE IN GOOD POSITION

But Threatened by Boers—Position Not Yet Cleared.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

CAPE TOWN, Oct 23.—It is now definitely known that Glencoe was attacked on Saturday by the Boer's main northern column.

Our forces are entrenched in a good position.

The situation here is not yet fully cleared.

10 p. m.—A despatch has just arrived announcing that the Boers are shelling Dundee east of Glencoe, at long range, but that their firing is ineffective.

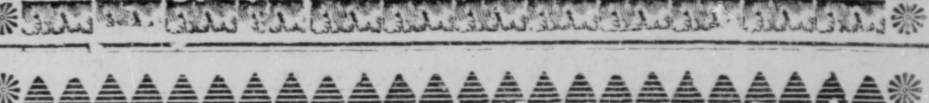

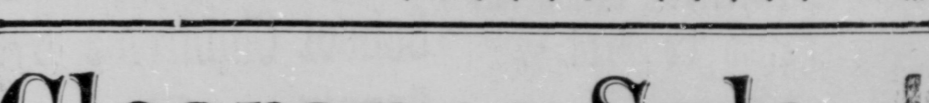
