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We should consider assistance to our own Indian, Metis and Eskimo populations, or to sending a Canadian youth worker to a developing country.
In view of the lack of agreement the manager and president of the council decided that any action on this matter should be deferred until after the annual meeting. Through meetings already held at Charlottetown, it

has become obvious to your committee that it would be unwise to continue the program in 1964 and consequently our recommendation is that no action be taken this year. One of the unfortunate things about having a program of this nature after one year is that the initial planning always involves a great deal of work on which we could've well capitalize in succeeding years of participation. In addition it creates a gap of a year in this type of activity. With these things in mind it may be advisable in future to carry a program for at least two consecutive years providing it is reasonably satisfactory.

Club benefits are numerous

It is quite impossible to identify all of the benefits a 4-H boy or girl acquires through club membership, retiring president G. L. Landon told the annual meeting of the Canadian Council on 4-H Club here last night.

"Perhaps among the many I might draw your attention to those I consider the more meaningful for the future. I would suggest that 4-H Club work can greatly aid a member in adopting certain attitudes that are paramount and basic to acquiring skills and knowledge which will subsequently lead to a set of principles of life-long value, adapting desirable attitudes towards a behavior that will enable the adult of tomorrow to enjoy true meaning of the fullness of life. A second major benefit is to gain an appreciation for excellence. Practical lessons in this characteristic are experienced by all club members in the course of judging and project exhibits. It later applies in so many phases of living that it becomes a quality character which young people should strive to acquire," he said.

In an advanced society in which we now live young people were never before faced with so much exposure to the lofty and academic ideals through all the mass media of modern machinery nor were they ever faced with so much violence, poor reading materials, unacceptable codes of behavior through the same media as they are today.

A suggestion which comes to us from the Indian-Eskimo Association of Canada concerns financial support of the Association's training program for leaders in the Friendship Centres operated in various urban communities across Canada. This is something that could possibly be undertaken especially better than nationally. Other opportunities for work with Eskimos are being explored and it is hoped that something may evolve here in which 4-H could be of assistance through a Canadian Council program.

There are many avenues through which assistance can be channelled in aid of less fortunate young people that those who are members of 4-H clubs in this country. The committee feels that 4-H members should, as part of their training, be encouraged to support community
