Roadside Tables
Prove Convenience
To P.E.I. Visitors

Of real convenience to tourists
in the Province are the many
roadside tables set up at strategic
points in the Island to provide
facilities for motoring families who
desire a comfortable place to eat
their lunches. The tables are large
and have adequate benches, and
their presence is easily determined
in advance by announcement signs
placed 1,000 feet ahead on the road.

The tables and benches were
built by boys in the Vocational
Training School with the heavy
lumber for the legs and posts be-
ing provided by the Forestry Divi-
sion. The sites for the tables were
carefully chosen by the Tourist
Bureau and then they were set
out by employees of the Depart-
ment of Public Works to make
the undertaking a co-operative Govern-
ment effort. To enable the eating
areas to be kept neat and
clean, large, clearly marked oil
barrels are provided for refuse.
Some difficulty was met obtaining
these but they were finally obtain-
ed and donated by Mr. J. H.
Cerry.

Determination of the sites was
done by Mr. George Fraser, Direc-
tor of the Travel Bureau on the
basis of needs on the most highly
travelled roads. One of them was
placed at Alberry Plains, between
Montague and Charlottetown; one
at Pinette between Wood Islands
and Charlottetown; one at Little
Sands between Wood Islands and
Montague; two between Charlottetown
and Souris; one on the main
highway to Summerside at Hazle-
grove; two between Charlottetown
and Borden on the Trans Canada
Highway, one at Churchill and the
other at Tryon; and two more on
the Western Road at Mt. Pleasant
and Montrose, near Tignish.

Sudden Death Of Borden
Post Master Yesterday

The death occurred suddenly at
Borden of Post Master Patrick J.
McInnis at 8:00 o'clock yesterday
evening.

Mr. McInnis was seized with a
heart attack and died almost im-

pioneers of Borden when it was
formed in 1916. At the time of his
death, he was a town councillor
and head of the finance committee.
He also held the office of Town
Magistrate and for a number years
was President of the Post Masters

Association of P. E. I.

In paying tribute to Mr. Mc-
Innis, Mayor Leard of Borden stated
"we have lost one of our finest
citizens, he was always interested
in the welfare of his Town and we
will indeed find it hard to replace
him."

The late Mr. McInnis was born
in Mount Tryon, his wife was the
former Miss Lottie King of Char-
lottetown. A son Hillard, student
of St. Dunstan's and a daughter
Inez, who is living in Toronto, sur-
