FIRST IN NINE YEARS

Air Cadets Will Train At Summerside Station

SUMMERSIDE—This weekend will find the "Garden of the Gulf" vibrating to the activities of some 250 Air Cadets as they arrive for two weeks annual camp on the island. The first cadets are due to arrive on Monday, July 6th and these will be the first for nine years to be encamped on the island. During the nine years of absence the cadets have been spending their summers at Greenwood in Nova Scotia.

On Tuesday ten of the high ranking officers started the nucleus of the camp by arriving five days ahead of time to make preliminary arrangements before the cadets arrive. Their special efforts were on time tables, courses for the cadets, and supplies. (Again this year the camp commanding officer will be Wing Commander Rhodia, who has filled this position for the past eight years, while Squadron Leader Langille will be filling the post of chief instructor. Both these officers come from 299 Yarmouth Squadron.

Squadron Leader Blackburn from Musquodoboit will be camp administration officer and Squadron Leader Adams of 517 Middleton Squadron will be the drill and sports co-ordinator. Flying Officer Paul Hinch, the air cadet liaison officer from Torbay, Newfoundland, will be associated with the camp in the capacity of instructor on the officer's course.

Flight Lieut. MacFarlane from Tuburn, will be camp adjutant and Flight Lieut. Dill from 569 Squadron at Brookfield will be seeing to camp accommodation for all cadets. Halifax has two representatives in F/L Cook whose speciality is swimming instructions, and F/L Guy, assistant sports director.

F.O. John Neilly from Middleton will be the supply officer, while F.O. Ray Wight from No. 10 wing in St. John's, Nfld will be camp public relations officer. All these officers have considerable experience, both with local squadrons and also at summer cadet camp.

PLANNING

Even before the cadet officers arrived much planning and work was done in anticipation of the camp. From Maritime Headquarters came details, worked out after many months of planning. The Summerside Air Base made ready with a modern barracks block to house both the cadets and the headquarters. As the current planning takes shape there are some notable changes from previous years, other than the location. Last year at Greenwood the cadets were under canvas but this year they will be housed in barracks, where there will be four cadets in a room, with ample locker space. Each section of the building has modern showers and washrooms.

FEWER CADETS

Another obvious change that came with location is the number of cadets less than other years. Greenwood saw 425 cadets in camp last year but there will be only 250 here at Summerside. These will represent the three Atlantic Provinces as the Newfoundland cadets will be flying direct to St. John's, Quebec. This year there will be no indoor pool activities as at Greenwood but the swimming program will still be carried on. However, on P.E.I. we will be using the excellent facilities of Chilton Beach where there will be salt water swimming, and a large area of sand beach. F/L Cook will be in charge of this activity and he will have with him a staff of qualified officers to help with the instruction and supervision.

W.I. Convention Meets In The Gowan Brae School

Pisquid Honors Charter Member



Improvements On Scotia II Stressed By Queens Member

The Scotia II now being used to augment facilities on the Borden-Tormentine run is well equipped for the service, Heath Macquarrie, M.P., for Queens, told this paper. He was commenting on a statement made at a Belfast political meeting recently which indicated that the boat had only two lifeboats and that a car of fuel oil overturned recently on the boat. The Scotia II has recently been in drydocks for alterations and improvements where she was equipped with radar, lifeboat, lifebelts and passenger accommodation is being increased, the Queens MP stated.

"All of this was done in accordance with the requirements of the Canadian Steamship Inspection Branch which would not allow any vessel to go into passenger service without satisfying itself as to the safety features. "It is difficult to conceive the reasons for anyone suggesting that the service is not being governed by the usual regulations prevailing throughout the country," Mr. Macquarrie said. "Certainly such a course of action or argumentation is scarcely designed to bolster our important tourist industry. The simple facts of the transportation matter are that there exists today facilities for transporting a greater volume of trans-Atlantic traffic than was ever provided in the past. "The government of Canada has also made provision for an additional new ferry at the same time as it is conducting a most thorough and comprehensive study of the many factors involved in the causeway project," Mr. Macquarrie added.
