Premier Deladier Proclaims Strength Of French Revolution.

PARIS, July 14 (CP)—Premier Deladier proclaimed tonight the strength of the French Army after France and Britain joined on the 50th Anniversary of the French Revolution in a massed parade of land, sea and air forces.

Tsingtao And Tokyo Scenes Of New Disturbance

Hand Grenades Hurlled Into British Consulate At Tsingtao While Mob Is Halted At Gates Of British Embassy In Tokyo.

FLASH LONDON, July 15 (Saturday)—(CP)—Reuters News Agency reported today from Tokyo that the Anglo-Japanese negotiations over the Tientsin blockade were formalized at the official residence of the Japanese Foreign Minister, Hachiro Arita.

SHANGHAI, July 14—Bitterness in Anglo-Japanese relations heightened today when unidentified persons hurled two hand grenades into the British Consulate at Tsingtao, where increasingly violent anti-British demonstrations began three weeks ago.

The British Embassy here reported windows were shattered and other minor damage inflicted but that no one was injured in the attack, the third within a week on the Consulate building in the Japanese-held Shantung Province port.

The Consulate, which British officials said had been under a virtual state of siege since July 3, was stoned Monday and Wednesday by a group which the British said was Japanese-inspired.

Travellers arriving from Tsingtao said property of the American Standard Vacuum Company was damaged in the anti-British demonstrations which spread from the Consulate to the Hong Kong Shanghai bank when an anti-British demonstration was arranged for repairs.

The accounts brought out by the reports of the anti-British outbreaks in Tsingtao which started three weeks ago and have become increasingly violent.

A noisy crowd of 50,000 men, women and children staged one of the greatest outbursts against a foreign country in Japan's history during the day in Tokyo when an attempt was made to rush the gates of the British Embassy.

Japanese accounts of today's Tsingtao incident said the hand grenade throwers "maybe were anti-Japanese agitators trying to aggravate Anglo-Japanese relations."
