Crises Claims Government Consumer Spending Continuing

Whether business wants to come here or expand is being chased right out to Parkdale, St. Peter's and the 'Royal'.

This was town planning committee chairman Walter Cox's way of describing the result of the recent City Council action regarding the zoning in the Elm Acre and Malpeque areas.

He said the Council, by its action, was "chasing business out of town."

Mr. Cox also said he had personally received a number of protests from business men who were protesting the zoning changes. He pointed out that this was not in accord with the plan of Walter de Silva, provincial town planner, who had proposed building apartment houses along Malpeque Road.

The committee chairman termed the action "ridiculous."

Mr. Cox also remarked "regarding the zoning changes, somebody's toes are always going to be stepped on."

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Scrap Prices Hit High Level, Steel Reports

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel says its scrap price composite rose 10 cents to its highest level in two years—up 33 cents in a two-ton size.

The best first-half tonnage movement of finished steel in four years may be in the making, the publication adds.

Department store sales in January were 12.7 per cent higher than in January, 1963, according to the Maclean-Young Research Bureau, with surveys showing that consumers will remain in a buying mood for at least the first half of this year.

The bureau also forecast that Canada's retail trade this year could reach \$15,000,000,000 more than \$1,000,000,000 higher than in 1963.

Steady demand for new cars, with an expected increase in furniture and appliance buying, should help boost the trade total.

SALES SHOULD CLIMB
Furniture and appliance sales will exceed the first quarter's second-quarter order volume will exceed the first quarter's—except possibly automotive buying.

Builders of railroad equipment, construction and road machinery, agricultural implements, machine tools, and other capital equipment are providing demand for steel as the tempo of the economy quickens.

Steel says steel production has been running 11 to 12 per cent ahead of February's, and indications are April production will be better than in March.

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Construction Crane Topples From Ramp

GEORGETOWN—A large crane owned by Weller Construction Company, overturned on Thursday morning at the railway siding in Georgetown as it was being loaded on board a flat for transportation to the north.

The crane which had been used on steel construction work at Bathurst Marine here last winter in the morning attempted to unload a large crated steel press, weighing in the vicinity of nine tons from a railway flat car but was unable to lift it.

At the time of the mishap, the crane, which has a boom approximately 80 feet in length was being loaded aboard a flat, when the ramp leading to the flat gave way and the crane toppled over.

Fortunately the operator of the crane was able to jump from the cab in time or he might have sustained serious injury.

Later in the day the crane was pulled to an upright position by a government snow plough, after the boom was disconnected from the cab.

Later the boom was re-attached and on Saturday the crane was transported to the City by a trailer flat.

The resultant damage to property of the crane is not believed to be extensive.
