Cedric Crockett Dies In Quebec

ALBERTON — The death of Cedric Crockett occurred in the Montreal General Hospital, Saturday. Youngest son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Hammond Crockett, he was born at Woodvale 47 years ago.

After attending Prince of Wales College he taught school for a few years before becoming an instructor in the RCAF. He received further education at Mount Allison University in Sackville, and in St. Thomas, Ontario. Prior to his illness, which began a year ago he had been teaching in Mount Royal, Quebec.

Some 22 years ago he was married to Thelma MacAulay of O'Leary. She survives him as do their two children, Clair and Nancy.

Also surviving are four sisters and four brothers: Mrs. Hampton Horne (Fillis) of Woodvale; Mrs. Bradford MacKay (Gladys) of Coleman, Russell of Burlington, Mass.; Mrs. Howard Bowness (Frances) of Montrose; Mrs. James Slavin (Florence) of Brookline, Mass.; Kenneth of Woodvale; Lorne of Montrose and Byron of Summerside.

His body is expected to arrive at the home of his brother, Kenneth Crockett, on Tuesday. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

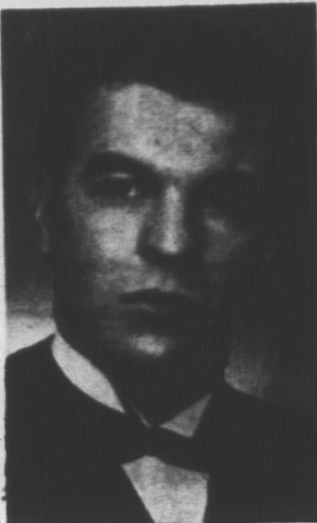

Also entered in Saturday's competition was Fred Archer of Sherwood, winner of the Charlottetown Road-e-o.

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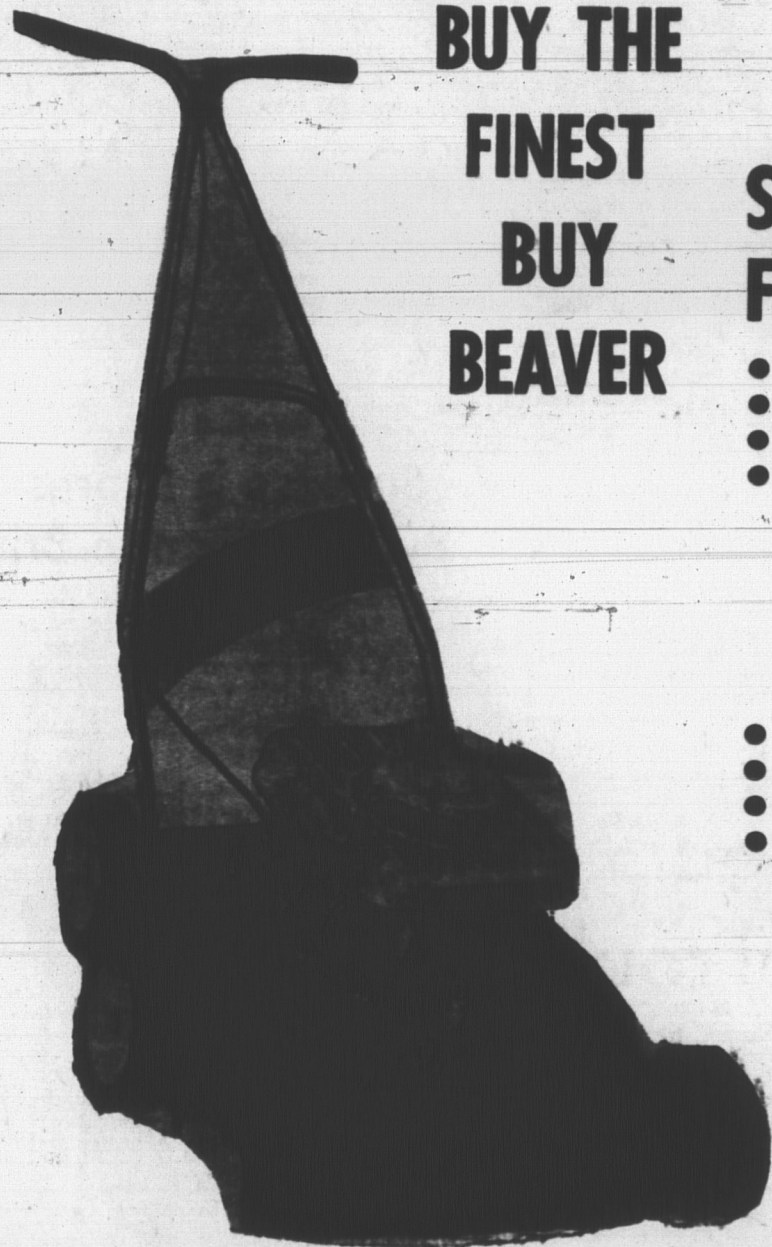
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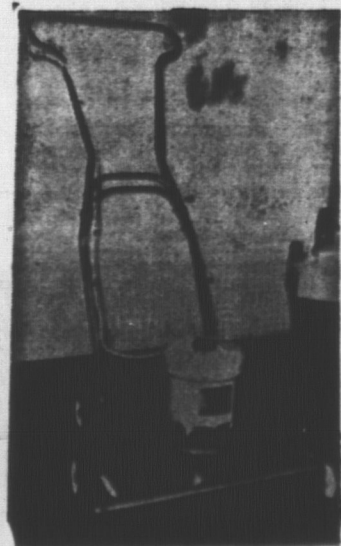


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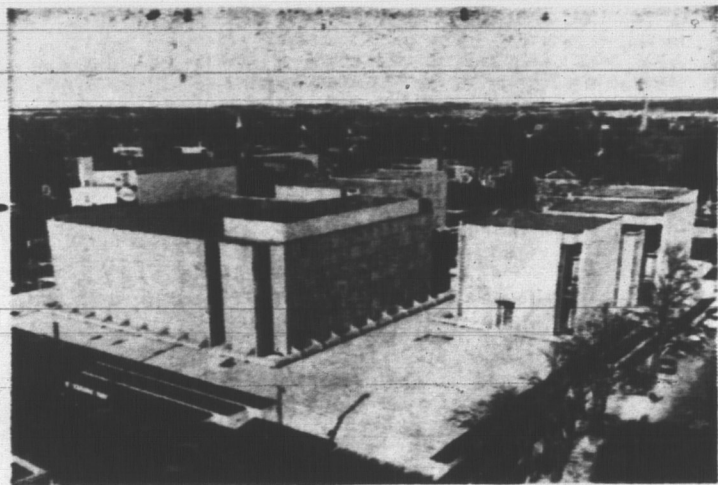
