eries and MP for Queens.

The bridge opening ceremony will mark the completion of the Trans-Canada Highway in this province, a 75-mile highway from Wood Islands to Borden.

Mr. Mactherson said the opening will be part of the official opening of the whole of the Trans-Canada Highway project across Canada.

A motorcade of 11 official cars, representing all 10 provinces and the federal govern-  
ment, will leave St. John's, Nfld. on Aug. 1 and make a cross-country tour that will Mac-

## Freedom Of Frontier Described To Rotary

Rev. William Warren, rector of St. Matthew's Church, Fair-  
banks, Alaska, was the speaker at the weekly luncheon meet-  
ing of the Rotary Club held at the Charlottetown Hotel yester-  
day. The chairman was H. H. Simpson, and the co-chairman, R. H. Jones.

Although the trend of his address was towards the humor-  
ous and in lighter vein regard-  
ing life in the American and Canadian Northwest, the speaker was definite in his claim that the residents loved the region and put the word and principles of liberty ahead of excessive possessions.

"There are no Joneses to keep up with, or rather if there are, I never met them," the speaker said.

"This is a frontier country where all sorts of conditions of men and women, people who are honest with themselves.

"With the mixed races, plus the presence of the service, and the Christians feel they should be missionaries substituting West-  
ern culture for non-western cul-  
ture."

"The Christian missionary presence is a very dry tree with-  
ing by life," Mr. Warren said.

## Unemployment Insurance Act Violations Bring Court Action

Two persons pleaded guilty to violations of the Unemployment Insurance Act, at their arraignment before Magistrate J. James B. Johnston, J.C. in Queens County magistrate's court yesterday.

On three separate charges of making false statements to the Unemployment Commission, in order to obtain unemployment benefits, Gordon Wilson Ward, Charlottetown, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days in jail each count.

Also charged with one similar offence, Joseph Dunn, Newtown Cross, was fined \$25 and costs or 10 days. In addition, under the Act, his name will be required to make restitution for the amount by which he was overpaid by the commission. Be-  
fore them, the two accused were given a pay back close to \$10.

## RESTING CHARGE

Appearing for sentence on a charge of resting a passenger officer in the performance of his lawful duties, Leo William Osborne, New Haven was fined \$35 and costs or 15 days.

With testimony and argument completed, Elaine Bernard Gallant, North Rustico, charged with possession of stolen goods, was given adjournment until Aug. 6 for judgement. Counsel for the defence is John J. Holmes and for the crown Alan K. Sciles.

Charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, Emmanuel Gallant, Rusticoville, was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days. Augustus Adolphus Macdonald, Winkler, as the charge of driving while intoxicated to which he has pleaded not guilty, was remanded until Aug. 6. In this case defence counsel is Lester P. O'Donnell.
