AI BREEDERS MEET

Problem Increases Of Feeding World

Every year more people are added to the world population than the total number of people in Canada, and by the year 2,000, only 35 years away, there will be twice as many people in the world to feed as there are today, Dr. J.W.G. Nicholson, animal nutritionist, Research Station, Nappan, N.S., told the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Artificial Breeding Association.

The meeting was held at Birch Court, President Charles Milligan, Milo, presided.

Dr. Nicholson discussed the principles of feeding cows, with special emphasis on techniques used for working out rations for animals in various stages of production.

The term "calories", now stressed so much in human diets, will be used in future for livestock instead of the present total digestible nutrients, or "TDN", the speaker suggested.

Dr. D.G. Moore, general manager of the breeding unit at Fredericton, N.B., with which the P.E.I. breeders are associated, discussed some of the policies in use at the present time.

Dr. Moore paid an unusually warm compliment to the inseminators who work on the Island. They are the equal in efficiency of anything elsewhere in Canada, or in the United States, he emphasized.

This can best be accomplished by studying nutrient requirements and the nutrients that are available in various food products, he said.

But, Dr. Nicholson emphasized, "hollow belly" is the disease which is more prevalent than any other in many cattle.

Student Loans Total \$26 Million To Date

OTTAWA (CP)—Loans totaling \$26,385,941 have been given to 11,284 persons under the Canada student loans plan, Finance Minister Gordon reported Friday.

He said the figure, as of April 1, indicates that the plan is being used almost to capacity.

The minister, in a report tabled in the Commons, also outlined new guide rules agreed on by the nine provinces which are co-operating with the federal government in the program initiated last September. The lone exception in Quebec which decided to operate its own student loan plan.

The new rules, decided on at recent federal-provincial meetings to meet administrative problems, cover criteria for determining the size of loans, the province of residence requirements and eligibility of various post-secondary institutions for loans.

The federal government guarantees the loans awarded by the chartered banks and administered by the provinces.

The minister said the program provided total allocation of \$30,266,000 for 1964-65. Most of it has been used among the provinces on the following basis:

Newfoundland, 722 loans, involving \$458,512; Prince Edward Island, 431, \$238,609; Nova Scotia, 2,450, \$1,729,008; New Brunswick, 2,008, \$1,347,188; Ontario, 21,287, \$14,004,565; Manitoba, 2,259, \$1,371,530; Saskatchewan, 2,965, \$1,867,420; Alberta, 4,491, \$2,063,483; British Columbia, 4,650, \$3,100,031; and Yukon and Northwest Territories, 31, \$17,600.

Parade marshal is George W. Schleyer.

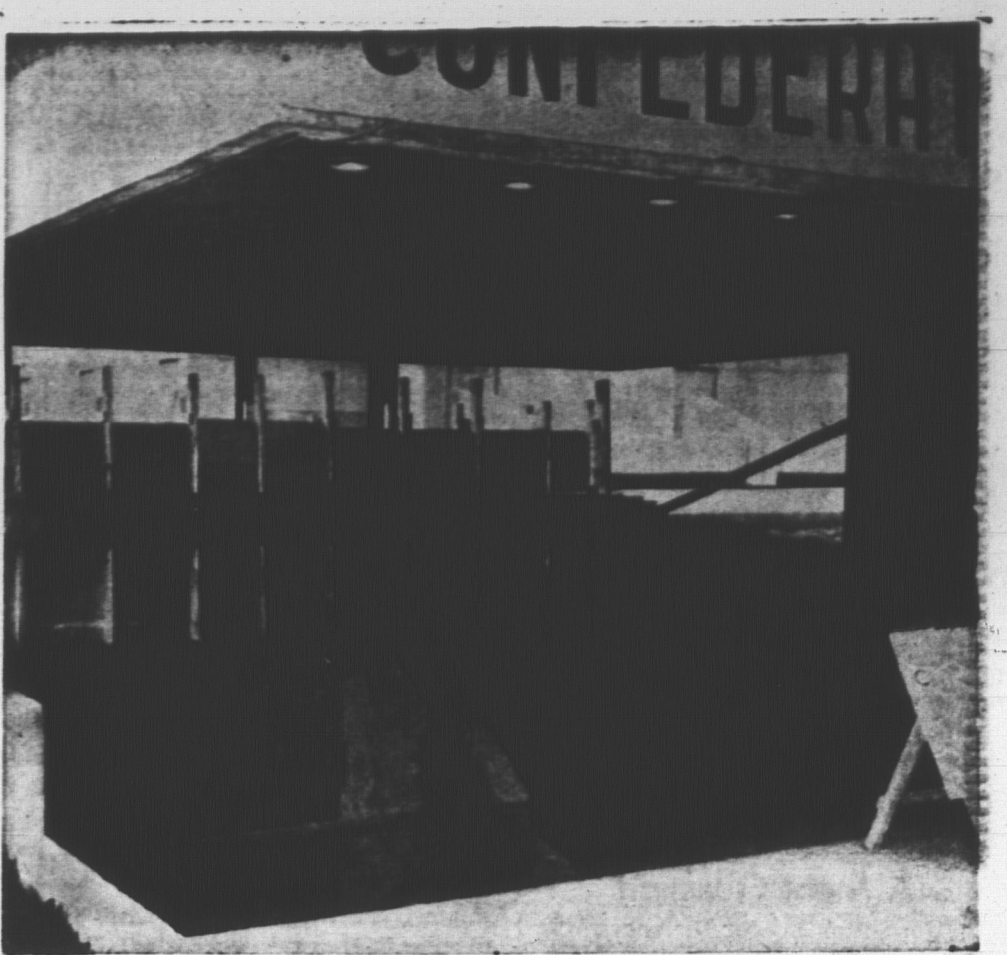
The Prince Edward Island Regiment, accompanied by Lads and Lassies Band along with the Birchwood High School cadet band will be a major part of the parade.

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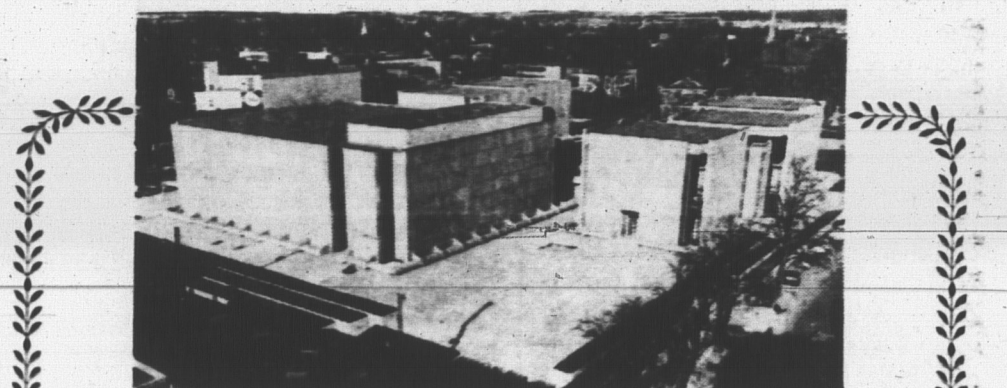
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CENTRE GETS RE-WORK JOB
