IMMENSE FIRES IN MANILLA

Many of the Residences Burned Down

ANOTHER FIGHT IN STREETS WITH INSURGENTS

Thousands of Natives Burned out and Homeless

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

MANILA, Feb. 23.—Immense damage was done here by fires believed to have been started by the insurgents last night.

There was fighting in the streets during the night but the Americans quelled the uprising.

A number of insurgents were killed and several American soldiers were wounded.

Between six and seven hundred residences and business houses were destroyed and hundreds of homeless natives are huddled in the streets.

PEKIN, Feb. 22.—A serious conflict has taken place between the Russians and Chinese at T'ien-Wan, 300 of the latter being killed. It is said to have originated in a question of taxes.

LONDON, Feb. 22.—It is now definitely known that Prince Alfred of Saxe-Coburg, grandson of the Queen, and son of the Duke of Edinburgh, committed suicide at Meran, Austria, whether he had been taken from Berlin, and placed in a private sanitarium. The cause of the Prince's removal from Berlin was a gambling scandal, compromising him gravely. It was given out by his family that the Prince was suffering from brain trouble.

LONDON, Feb. 22.—The president of the board of trade, C. T. Ritchie, speaking in the House of Commons on the amendment proposed by Henry Seton Karr, conservative, to the address to the queen in reply to the speech from the throne at the opening of parliament, relative to the dependence of Great Britain on foreign imports of food supply and the danger therefrom in the event of war, said her majesty's government had fully enquired into the existing conditions and did not believe that the fears expressed in some quarters were justified. The government, however, would be glad if some arrangement could be made by which a larger supply of food from the colonies might be received. But if anything in the nature of projection was necessary in order to obtain this desired end, he feared that it was not likely to be fulfilled.

THE KHALIFA IS BACK AGAIN

Advancing With an Army on Omdurman.

HAS AN ARMY OF TWENTY THOUSAND MEN.

Anglo-Egyptians Making Ready For His Reception.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Feb. 23.—Khalifa has left Shockell, and is moving northward with a considerable force. He has been constantly raiding the Arabs along the route he is following, and the latter have become panic-stricken.

Major McDonald, the head of the British expedition which has been exploring East Africa, has started for Omdurman, and Major General Hunter, the recently appointed Governor of Omdurman, and other British officers on furlough, have been recalled.

The Daily News publishes the following despatch from Cairo:—

The Khalifa is advancing upon Omdurman with between 15,000 and 20,000 men. Preparations are quietly proceeding to meet him.

A foot note to the despatch says the facts are that Colonel Kitchener's scouts came in touch with the Khalifa strongly entrenched with 16,000 men, and the British officers only having a small force he found it necessary to retire on Omdurman.

This retirement the Khalifa regarded as a sign of weakness, and it led him to rally his forces to advance.

Lord Kitchener has 9,000 men at Omdurman.
