The January heifer has a size and type unusual in an animal of that age. Brian, 12, and his 14-year-old brother, Ralph, showed the reserve champion Holstein.

**SHOWN IN SECTIONS**  
There are so many Holstein calves that they are shown in sections. The champion in section one was shown by Paulette Jones, of the Alexandra club. Robert MacFarlane, Bedeque had the runner-up in this section.

A pair of Mt. Herbert sisters, Maida and Diane Woods, showed the champion and reserve champion Dual Purpose Short-horn Calf.

The Wood family showed all three calves that topped the breed exhibit. The third calf in

the trio was shown by Robert Wood.

The champion Ayrshire calf was shown by David Wood, of the Dunstaffnage — Frenchfort Club. Robert Thompson of the Milton-Cloverdale club showed the reserve champion.

Robert Docherty of the North Wiltshire club had the champion Jersey calf and club member Elaine Clark had the reserve champion.

David MacDonald of the Kingston club, Douglas Semple of the Milton-Cloverdale club had the reserve.

The MacBeath brothers of Dunstaffnage — Frenchfort club had the top Ayrshire calf and reserve, with Alex showing the champion calf and Rupert the reserve.

**CHAMPION HEREFORD**  
Sisters Heather and Marie Ramsay of Hamilton had the Champion Hereford calf and reserve. The sisters pocketed the prize money of \$15 for the champion and five dollars for the re-

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serve, without any competition. They had the only Hereford calves in the show.

The Herefords, Shorthorn and Angus calves showed in a "Beef" classification competition. The winning club was North River with the members Jung Holmes and Mack and Hilda Dixon. The Dunstaffnage — Frenchfort club was second and Brackley-Winsloe were third.

North River had Angus, the other two had Shorthorns.

Douglas and Barbara Semple and Ernest Cole, Milton-Cloverdale club, were first in Guernsey. The Kingston trio were second.

Elaine Clark, Roger Docherty and Borden Tremere of the North Wiltshire club were first in Jerseys. Hazelbrook was second and the Triple Bay club third.

David Wood, Gary Boswell and Kathleen Boswell of the Dunstaffnage — Frenchfort club had the top Ayrshire calf exhibit. Milton-Cloverdale was second and Orwell and district third.

### Queens Liberal Candidates Prepare For Campaign Battle

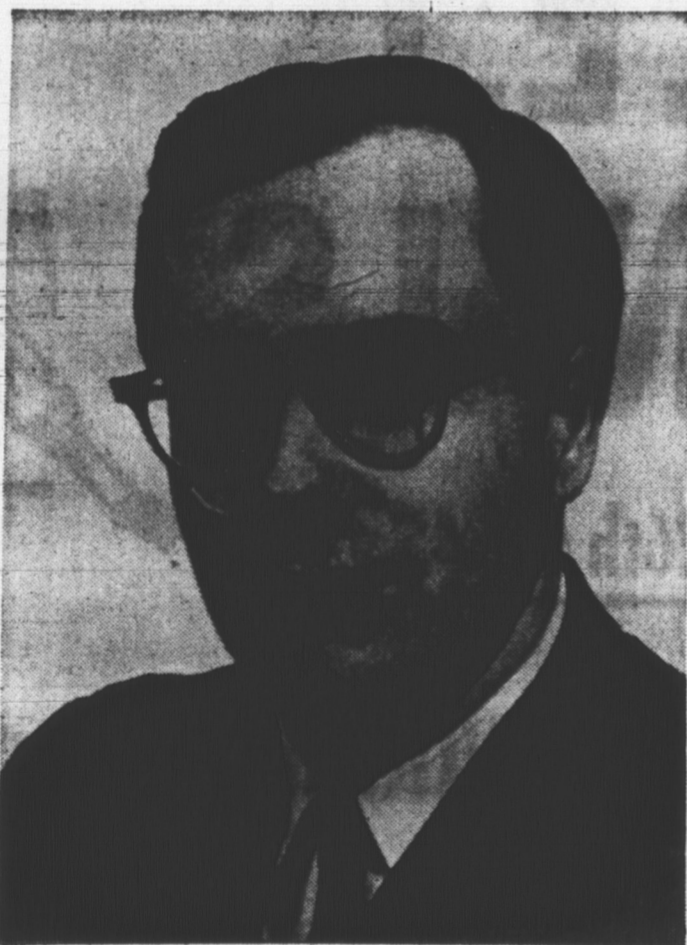

**DR. MARK R. MacGUIGAN**

A distinguished scholar and dedicated humanitarian, Dr. Mark MacGuigan is a native son of Charlottetown who is returning to his home Island to continue a career already well established in public life and political activity.

In the realm of public service, Dr. MacGuigan is a member of a special committee of seven appointed by the Minister of Justice to report on hate propaganda in Canada; is president of the Exchange for Political Ideas in Canada; vice-president of the Canadian Civil Liberties Association; past president of the Thomas More Guild; a director of Street Haven for Homeless Girls in Toronto and an active member of the special interfaith committee of the Canadian Council of Christians and Jews. He was counsel for the Liberal party on the Roach Crime Commission of Ontario in 1962. He has published two learned books on law, written many articles on legal and philosophical subjects, and is a much-sought after public speaker.

Dr. MacGuigan is first vice-president of the Toronto and District Liberal Association. He was a Liberal candidate in St. Patrick riding, Toronto, in the 1963 Ontario election and came within a few hundred votes of defeating the veteran Conservative, Hon. Kelso Roberts. His wife is the former Maryllen Symons and they have a three-year-old daughter and one-year-old son.

**B. B. JONES**

Mr. B. B. Jones of Bunbury is a farmer whose roots historically and by love are deeply embedded in the rich, red soil of this province. A Bachelor of Science in Agriculture from the Ontario College of Agriculture he conducts a 400-acre farm at Bunbury which is one of the oldest agricultural properties in the province.

Mr. Jones aged 30, is a noted Holstein Breeder, fur breeder and cereal grain grower. The "Abegweit" prefix in Holsteins is nationally and internationally recognized among cattle breeders everywhere. Mutation mink which he bred on the Island were sold as far away as France and England, from the Bunbury ranch. Seed grain from this farm has won top awards at some of the leading seed shows in the country.

Born in 1915 Mr. Jones attended Bunbury and West Kent Schools and Prince of Wales College. He then entered Ontario Agricultural College of the University of Toronto, receiving his Bachelor of Science in Agriculture degree in 1940. During college years he excelled as an athlete in swimming, track and marksmanship. He was an outstanding student. While at University he was chosen to represent Canada on the Canadian Collegiate Agricultural Judging Team at Chicago. This was an International Judging competition in 1939.

Mr. Jones is a past winner at the Queen's County Plowing Match. He served two terms as president of the Queen's County Plowing Association and is a member of the Provincial Plowing Council.

In the course of an active farm life he has served as president of the Canadian National Silver Fox Breeders Association, and of the P. E. I. Holstein-Friesian Breeders Association. He was also a national director of Canada Mink Breeders and chairman of the advisory committee of the Holstein-Friesian Association in the Atlantic Provinces. He was director of the Canadian Seed Growers Association and the P. E. I. Milk Producer and Vendors Association. In 1962-63 he was a member of the Atlantic Province Economic Council.

Mr. Jones has been active in many local community endeavors. He was a member of the Charlottetown Board of Trade as Agricultural representative. He has been a member of the Provincial Liberal Executive and is now president of the third district of Queens.

Mr. Jones is married to the former Jean Robertson, daughter of Dr. Allan Robertson, former Federal Veterinarian in the province. He is the son of the late Honorable J. Walter Jones long time Premier of the province and a Senator at the time of his death in 1954. His mother lives with him at the family farm at Bunbury.
