## New MacLeans Sail Today From Alberton For Far North

ALBERTON — Sign painting can be difficult enough at any time but trying to do a good job with Eskimo names like "Nassig" and "Qilnagaa" from a bobbing dory taxed even the skill of David Broderick, Alberton sign painter.

The Alberton-built longliners are scheduled to leave today for Hudson Bay.

Among the many items load-

ed aboard the two vessels in the past 10 days are 50 bags of Inland potatoes for distribution to Eskimos along the 2,500 mile route followed by the two boats, groceries for co-operative stores at Port Burwell and George River such as baking powder, lard and tobacco, things always in short supply according to Ches Russell, who will captain the 46-foot "Qilnagaa" on the long cruise.

The smaller "Nassig" will be commanded by Don Milligan, also from the department of northern affairs.

### Bishop Nelligan Is Preacher At 50th Anniversary Mass

SUMMERSIDE — Most Rev. Charles Leo Nelligan, DD, titular bishop of Fense and professor at Assumption University, Windsor, Ont., was the special preacher at the solemn high mass celebrated in St. James' Church, Summerside by Rt. Rev. F.P. Hughes, last Sunday, the anniversary of his first high mass which he celebrated in this church 50 years ago.

The deacon of the mass was Rev. J.B. Croke, pastor of St. James', the sub-deacon was Rev. John Cash lately attached to the basilica staff, Charlottetown. The master of ceremonies was Rev. L. MacCormack, a native of Souris and at present a student in theology in the Regina Cleri Seminary, Regina, Sask. The pastor welcomed Msgr. Hughes back to his native parish and extended congratulations on his own behalf and on behalf of the parishioners. He also expressed the deep appreciation and joy of the parish at the presence of Bishop Nelligan.

In his sermon Bishop Nelligan spoke most eloquently of the dignity of the Christian priesthood. He also extended congratulations to the jubilarian on his missionary work in Western Canada.

An address was read to Msgr. Hughes in the name of the parish by Aeneas McIntire. A purse was also presented to him by Gerard Allen.

In thanking the pastor and parishioners for their kindness, Msgr. Hughes expressed the hope that his return to the parish to celebrate the anniversaries of his ordination and first high mass might be an inspiration to young people of both sexes to embrace the religious life.

St. James' Parish Council of the Catholic Women's League served dinner at the rectory after the mass.

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — Seven draft resolutions designed to ease the United Nations financial crisis passed by comfortable margins through the General Assembly's budgetary committee Tuesday.

Despite opposition from the Soviet Bloc and France, the 11-member committee provided between 77 and 84 affirmative votes for each of the resolutions.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says much cooler air pushed rapidly into the Maritimes last Tuesday night and Sydney, at 10 pm, reported a reading of 38 degrees; a drop of 26 from its record-breaking afternoon reading of 64 degrees. The highest temperature in the Maritimes Tuesday was recorded at Liverpool, N.S., with a reading of 53 degrees.

Temperatures Wednesday are expected to be generally 10 to 15 degrees cooler in all three provinces. Skies will remain clear as a high pressure center east of James Bay moves southward towards the Maritimes.

### Gov't Obtains Limespreaders

Agriculture Minister Andrew B. MacRae, yesterday announced that five limespreaders have been purchased by his department and will be available for custom work after the haying season.

Each machine has a three-ton capacity, and it is estimated that they will be able to haul and spread lime at 18 per ton. Mr. MacRae said that this price appeared reasonable, as how it costs \$3.00 at the car, plus the expense of hauling and spreading.

Joseph Smith, Pownal, has been operating a limespreader for this year, and to date he has handled 600 tons.

The first tour will most likely be to the eastern end of the province, and he is in conjunction with next Tuesday's cabinet meeting slated to be held in Souris, a move which was instituted by the premier several weeks ago.
