City Man Given Two-Year Term

A two-year sentence in Dorchester Penitentiary was given yesterday to a 27-year-old man charged with a theft of less than \$50, by Magistrate A.J. Heston. The man, who was named yesterday, followed the accused across the Hillboro Bridge at a speed of 100 miles over the limit of 40 m.p.h. The man was charged with entering a CNR express car, Jan. 22, at Charlottetown, and was sentenced to two years in jail with bail set at \$500 cash.

In handing down the sentence, the magistrate said that the accused had been in the company of a young man facing court, and that he was influencing persons with no criminal records to follow his example. Sterns Webster, deputy-chief of city police, will take over his new duties as police chief Feb. 1 following the retirement of the present chief, C. W. MacArthur. The appointment was approved yesterday at a special meeting of city council, called for the purpose of naming a new chief. Coun. W. R. MacNeill, chairman of the council committee, stated that his committee had unanimously approved the appointment of a man he had known for many years, and who had given the police force as a constable in 1929. He was appointed deputy-chief in 1955, and since that time has been in charge of investigations. Suspended Sentence Given On Theft Count

Appearing for sentence on a charge of attempted theft of gasoline, Barry Lawrence Buel, 21, Albion, was given a one-year suspended sentence by Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C., in the Queen's County Magistrate's court yesterday afternoon. In addition the accused was ordered to enter into a bond in the amount of \$300 with an additional surety of \$300. He cautioned the accused that should he again get into trouble with the law within the 12-month period, he could be brought before the court and be sentenced to imprisonment or a fine on this theft count.
