The Gathering of the Clans.

The Scottish Gathering yesterday under the auspices of the Caledonian Club of P. E. Island, was in every respect a complete success. It is estimated that about five thousand people were in the field. The grand stand, capable of seating two thousand people, was crowded to its utmost capacity. The Governor's platform was occupied by His Honor Governor Haviland and family, His Worship Mayor Hooper, Hon. Col. Gray, Col. Johnson, U. S. Consul of Pictou, Senator Montgomery, Senator Howland, Fredk. Brecken, Esq., M. P., Austin C. McDonald, Esq., M. P., Donald McKay, Esq., M. P., Wm. Murphy, Esq., C. C., Chas. Palmer, Esq., Q. C., and other prominent citizens and visitors.

From the grand stand floated in the breeze the Canadian Ensign, the U. S. Stars and Stripes, the Union Jack, St. Andrew's Cross, St. George's Cross, and the Scotch Standard. Competition at the games commenced at 11 o'clock and continued without intermission until 5 o'clock, when the following prizes were awarded and handed to the successful competitors by the Hon. A. A. National Feast of the French Acadians.

A GALA DAY AT TIGNISH.

Wednesday was a gala day at Tignish, being the National Feast of the French Acadians. During the day nearly 2,000 persons assembled on the beautiful grounds adjoining the Roman Catholic Church. Many of different nationalities also assembled, the day being generally observed as a Public Holiday throughout that section of the country. The proceedings opened with Grand Mass in the Church, celebrated by Rev. P. Doyle, assisted by Rev. D. McDonald, P. P., and Dr. Grant as Deacon, and Sub-deacon. The choir rendered some good music, and the new organ, said to be the finest in the Province, was played with much taste and skill. A platform had been erected outside on the grounds, and after service the multitude left the Church and assembled to hear the Speeches, which formed part of the programme. The discourse proper for the day was delivered, in French, by Red. A. Trudelle, being followed by Rev. D. McDonald and Dr. Grant, who were received with much enthusiasm. Hon. S. F. Perry and F. J. Conroy, Esq., also addressed the assemblage. Each spoke in French and English and both were repeatedly cheered. After the conclusion of the speeches, a procession of the different societies was formed and the people returned to the Church, where benediction was given. About five o'clock the multitude quietly dispersed to their homes. The best of order prevailed throughout the day, and the manner in which the proceedings passed off reflects great credit on all concerned. The celebration of the National Feast was in every way a success.

CONCLUSION OF "DAILY PATRIOT" MATCH—THE CONSOLATION MATCH—THE OTTAWA TEAM.

Perhaps the most successful meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association that has yet been held at Kensington Range was concluded yesterday evening. Successful, in that there were a larger number present than on former years, and also because the best of harmony and good feeling prevailed, among all ranks and companies, during the four days the several matches were in progress. The news of Captain F. Doherty's promotion to the rank of Major, being an exceedingly popular promotion, was well received by all the militia, and everyone was eager to be the first to tender the newly appointed Major their hearty congratulations. Among the whole corps of militia, there are no two officers who have taken more interest in the welfare of Island militiamen, and whose services are, therefore, better appreciated than Major George and Major F. Doherty.

At the 600 yards, owing to the heavy breeze that continued during the afternoon, which rendered shooting very difficult indeed, the scores were not so high, but on the average were as good as could have been expected under the circumstances. Captain Stewart of No. 3 Co., with a score of 27 points reached the highest number of points made. During lunch hour, Lieut. McDougall, Corporal J. Dover, and Lieut. McGregor, who tied each other for the medal in the All Comers match, fired off, the latter winning by one point. Lieut. McGregor, besides winning several high money prizes also carried off the Governor General's Silver Medal for highest aggregate "in all the Matches." Lieut. Crockett of No. 4 Co., was the fortunate winner of the Bronze Medal for second highest aggregate.

The Great Race at Watkins.

HANLAN THE WINNER.

Over ten thousand people witnessed the great aquatic event at Watkins, N. Y., on the 15th. The trial heats were two in number, and a distance of a mile and half straightaway. The first was won by Wallace Ross, Lee second, and Courtney third. The second heat was won by Hanlan, Hosmer a good second, Teemer third. In the third and final heat it was three miles and a turn. The contestants were Hanlan, Hosmer, Wallace Ross, Lee. At the starting buoys Hanlan occupied the first position, Hosmer second, Lee third, and Ross fourth. The water was choppy but the men made no objections to rowing. The wind blew strong all the afternoon from the south, and 10,000 people sat three hours waiting for the race. Although the contest was announced for 2.30 the men were not in position till 5.30. The word "go" was given at 5.38. Ross caught the water first, all pulling evenly, Hanlan on outside of course rowing several rods to the right. The other three kept their bows about even, rowing with the tips of their oars almost touching. Hosmer led Ross half a length on the first quarter. The race was a beautiful one. At the mile Hosmer turned toward Hanlan, while Lee and Ross continued to crowd each other. Ross near the stakes began creeping ahead with Hosmer, and Lee losing two boat lengths. Ross soon after crossed Lee's bow. The latter continued to lose and before the fifth quarter was completed, turned and pulled ashore, being 8 or 10 lengths in the rear. All the men showed signs of fatigue and dropped down to about 30 strokes per minute. Hanlan maintained his own course well, but Hosmer and Ross crowded each other. Hanlan still led at the turning buoy, his turn being made in 9.18 from the start. Hosmer turned in 9.22 and Ross in 9.24. The water was very rough, the breeze suddenly freshening. The men were helped in the first mile and a half by the breeze, but in the second half of the race they had hard

work against wind and waves. During the last half of the second mile, Hanlan kept about half a length ahead of Hosmer, increasing his lead to a length in the first half of the third mile. Ross kept the bow of his boat ahead of Hosmer's stern, but was unable to get on even terms. The goal quarter was one vigorous spurt. Hanlan led Hosmer by three lengths, making the home buoy in 21.09; Hosmer second, Ross a good third.

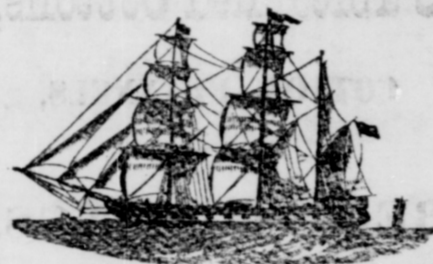
