

## Seek New Areas Of Service Advised Auxiliary Present

EDMONTON — The women of the Anglican Church of Canada must be prepared to change where change is needed and to submerge individual ambitions for the good of the whole church, Mrs. John Robertson of Kitchener, Ont., Dominion president of the women's auxiliary of the Anglican Church, said last week.

In an address to the opening business session of the auxiliary's 78th annual meeting, she urged church women to look for new areas of service, and to make an "earnest attempt" to do more studying and praying with those who are not auxiliary members.

"We must seek status but must make it clear our aim is the wholeness of the church," she said.

One of the main decisions delegated from the 29 diocesan meetings was expected to make at the four-day meeting was whether or not to amalgamate all the present Anglican women's organizations, including parish and church guilds, into one organization.

The W. A. itself, Mrs. Robert-

son recalled, had begun as an auxiliary to the church mission society, but since 1947 has been an auxiliary of the whole church.

The Dominion president suggested members look more intently at the problem of the ageing population. "We should no longer leave the matter of suitable homes for the aged to the Roman Catholics, the Salvation Army and the Lutherans, but should be prepared to share in this great work," she said.

She also urged members to make greater efforts to be elected to church synods, where they could contribute particularly in the fields of housing, immigration and social problems.

Mrs. Robertson has been president of the W. A. since 1962. Like nearly all Dominion officers, she will be standing for another term of office.

The conference gets down to heavy business sessions today with reports from Dominion officers and the opening conference session, discussing the trend of thinking about women's parish organizations.
