Ottawa Correspondence.

All gentlemen (as society understands this term) do not necessarily possess gentlemanly instincts, while among the lowly and uncultured are frequently to be found natural refinement and delicacy of feeling. It does not add to the moral strength of a cause to send bores and blackguards as its advocates, yet these gentry were represented on the temperance deputation. When it was announced in the lobby that Sir John was not well enough to receive them, one fellow was heard to remark that probably the Premier was detained over a glass of whiskey. Let us hope that this beautiful exemplar of Christian charity has by this time acquired sufficient decency to be ashamed of himself.

On Friday the House went into committee of the whole to consider the resolution extending the time for the completion of the Baie Verte ship railway.

Mr. Foster explained that it was proposed, in addition to the extension of time, to remit the penalty of \$5,000. He quoted from the company's estimates showing the work that has up to the present time been done in connection with the railway. The total quantity of clay and rock excavated was 7,745,957 cubic yards, leaving only 278,933 cubic yards yet to be excavated. The steel rails required for the work and the hydraulic machinery were all on the ground, while the cradles were ready for shipment and the locomotives were being built at the Kingston Locomotive Works. The sum of \$580,175, or, in round numbers, about three millions of dollars, had been expended, leaving about two and a half millions yet to be expended to complete the whole work. He explained, further, that a series of unforeseen difficulties had interfered with the progress of the work. No payment would be made to the company by the Government until the completion of the work.

Mr. Davies, speaking on the question, wished it to be distinctly understood that the members from the Maritime Provinces, of neither side of politics, had asked for the construction of this work, and they deprecated the idea that it was a concession to the Maritime Provinces. He would not discuss the principle of the measure, as the faith of Parliament stood pledged to the extent of \$2,000,000, while as to the benefits to accrue from the expenditure, he had never heard any two members agree. He protested against this being considered a work in the interest of the Maritime Provinces, and against the Maritime Provinces being charged with the money expended on the work. In reply the Minister of Marine quoted the St. John Telegraph and the late Mr. Elder in favor of the project. Mr. Welsh then spoke in denunciation of the work. He had denounced it every time it came before the House, and he denounced it again. He would not give two pence for the engineers' opinions; they were full of theories. The engineering difficulties could, not doubt, be overcome, and the railway completed, and Canada would have to pay \$2,000,000, though the railway would not be worth one cent when completed. Talk about wildcat schemes, this was one of the wildest called schemes ever entered into the imagination of anyone. How many Canadians had a dollar invested in the scheme? The money belonged to English capitalists, and the credit of Canada would be injured when the scheme was exposed and the railroad proved a failure. He had told the late House that if the Government brought a ship-owner, or a man engaged in shipping who had invested a dollar in the scheme, he would hold his tongue, but they never produced the man. He considered the Company should lay before Parliament a list of their shareholders.

Then, when Mr. Foster moved that the House again render itself into Committee of Supply, Mr. Laurier moved in amendment that the conduct and language of Sir Charles Tupper, High Commissioner of Canada in England, in interfering in the recent elections and in imputing treasonable and disloyal motives to a large proportion of the people of this Dominion, and also in assailing and vilifying the managers of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, and in reflecting upon the position of the said Company, is a breach of the duties of the office which he fills, and is calculated to destroy the efficiency of the said office, and to injure the credit of the Dominion, besides damaging a very important Corporation whose shareholders have invested large sums of money in the work of extending and promoting the railway system of Canada.

Mr. Laurier supported his motion in a brief and moderate speech, to which Sir John Thompson made a vigorous and exhaustive reply. After recess, Sir Richard Cartwright delivered himself of much vituperation, and was being replied to by Mr. Mackintosh when the episode occurred which, I have no doubt, will become historic in the annals of Canada. Sir Hector Langevin, with scarcely repressed emotion, intimated to the House, the serious news which had just been received of the Premier's health and, seconded by Mr. Laurier, moved the adjournment.

Since that moment, I may say, but little work has been done in Ottawa, and a period of unrest has prevailed which has rendered work almost impossible. Alternating between hope and despair, it is hard to settle down to anything, and it has been with far more than the usual difficulty that I have been able to write this comparatively short and, what, I fear, must prove uninteresting letter. The last news is that the "old man's" strength is perceptibly weakening, and in all probability, before this meets the eyes of my readers, the end will have come. What loss to Canada will result from his removal, time alone will tell. Speculation is rife as to his successor, and no better proof of his vast superiority as a statesman and a leader can be afforded than the difficulty which exists as to who the new chief shall be.

King's County Exhibition Association.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the above association, held in the Law Courts building, Georgetown, on the 2d June, inst, was fairly well attended.

Hon. D. Gordon, President of the Association, occupied the chair.

The Secretary, Mr. George F. Owen, presented the report of the managing committee for the past year and the accounts of the treasurer, Malcolm McDonald, Esq., together with the report of the auditor, Jos. R. McDonald, Esq., copies of which were printed and distributed to the shareholders present.

On motion of George F. Owen, seconded by Malcolm McDonald, the said report and accounts were approved of, and ordered to be filed.

On motion of Malcolm McDonald, Esq., seconded by C. L. Barnes and D. A. McKinnon, Hon. D. Gordon was unanimously re-elected president of the association for the current year.

Hon. Mr. Gordon acknowledged the hearty manner in which he had been nominated, and expressed the confidence he felt in the success of the Exhibition Association for King's County.

On motion of George F. Owen, seconded by James D. Dewar, Brudenell, James Clow, Esq., Murray Harbor North, was re-elected vice-president.

On motion of Dr. Barnes, seconded by A. J. Macdonald, Malcolm Macdonald was re-elected treasurer. George F. Owen was continued as secretary on motion of Jas. D. Dewar seconded by Wm. A. Poole. The managing committee at the last annual meeting were re-elected, viz: A. J. Macdonald, S. A. Aitken, Wm. A. Poole, R. W. Sprague, C. L. Barnes, F. G. Boyer, Capt. McLaren, Jas. E. Macdonald and D. A. McKinnon. Jos. R. McDonald was reappointed auditor.

A letter from the secretary of the Futurity Stakes of P. E. Island for 1891 was read by the secretary asking what premium would be given by the King's County Exhibition Association if the Futurity Stakes were trotted for on the Georgetown Park. The secretary was instructed to make an offer.

Other matters concerning the interests of the Association were then discussed, after which the meeting adjourned sine die.

Shot His Brother.

A STARTLING TRAGEDY IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

St. John's, Nfld., June 2.—Particulars of a startling tragedy have just been received from Grand Bank. James Follett, aged 35, shot and killed his brother Edward on the public street at midday. The cause of the shooting was Edward's undue familiarity with his brother's wife. Before starting out to murder his brother, James locked his wife in a room, telling her he was going to settle the affair. He then left the house, taking with him a loaded gun. Meeting his brother he took deliberate aim and fired. His victim dropped dead. James then returned to the house, and discovered that his wife had escaped through a window. His evident intention was to murder her, for after shooting his brother he reloaded the gun. He made no attempt to conceal himself and was arrested and placed in jail. He expresses no regret at having committed the deed. Both men have families. Judge Prowse has gone to investigate the case.

News Notes.

Secretary Blaine continues to improve slowly.

Winnipeg's rate of taxation is 19½ mills year.

Cardinal Gibbons is still weak from his recent illness.

The Bank of England's reserve now amounts to £19,000,000.

There has been another marked advance in the price of gold in Buenos Ayres, the precious metal going up to 321 per cent. premium on Friday. Failures are expected.

Anarchy is said to prevail in the New Hebrides Islands. Severe fighting has taken place among the natives, in which 600 were killed. The victors eat the bodies of those of their opponents who are slain. Among the Queen's birthday honors was a C. B. for Captain Henry Cane of H. M. S. Calliope, for his skill and seamanship at Apia during the hurricane of the 15th March, 1889, that swept away so many German and United States sailors. Captain Cane not only contrived to save his own ship and crew, but in so doing averted destruction from the U. S. ship Trenton which would have been crushed had the Calliope not managed to get into the open sea. The royal recognition is somewhat late in coming, but is fully deserved.
