Unknown Britishers Grab Golf Open Lead

By JOHN FARROW Associated Press Sports Writer MUIRFIELD, Scotland (AP)—Two unknown British players, Fred Bullock and Arnold Stickle, Wednesday shot 69s for the lead in the British Open golf championship and then sat back and enjoyed themselves as high winds and rain sent later scores rocketing.

Bullock, a 40-year-old pro playing in only his second tournament this season, and 32-year-old Stickle got in their rounds before the 6,806-yard, par 36-72 Muirfield layout became a rough tough test. Early in the afternoon winds up to 40 miles an hour and short, sharp rainstorms added three or four more strokes to the course. Afflicted by these conditions and by greens that already were slow from Tuesday night's rains, were Peter Thomson, the defending champion from Australia, young Gary Player of South Africa and several other favorites.

Ingo Named Top Fighter

NEW YORK (AP)—Sweden's Ingemar Johansson Wednesday was named Ring magazine's "fighter of the month" for winning the world heavyweight championship on his third-round knockout of Floyd Patterson.

The Goteborg gunner will be presented with a gold championship belt when he returns to the United States for the first defense of his title. Patterson took over Johansson's former spot as the No. 1 contender. Ring editor Nat Fleischer continues to recognize Sugar Ray Robinson as middleweight champion despite the action of the National Boxing Association in vacating the title. Ring has Carmen Basilio as No. 1 and Gene Fullmer as No. 2. The two contenders will meet in August for NBA recognition as champion.

Harvard's Crew Captures Race

HENLEY - ON - THAMES, England (AP)—Harvard's unbeaten lightweight crew made a fine start in defence on the Thames Challenge Cup Wednesday as the Royal Henley Regatta opened in drizzling rain. The Union Boat Club eight from Boston and two United States fours also won their opening heats on the narrow Thames River. American oarsmen suffered only one setback—a heartbreaking loss by the schoolboy eight from Phillips Academy, Andover, Mass.

The Harvard lightweights rowed with four of the same men who won the Thames Challenge Cup—no. 2 trophy for eight-oared crews—in this unofficial world championship of rowing. They won handily by two lengths from the Crowland Rowing Club of London.

Harvard's heavyweight varsity eight, also undefeated this year, is going after the regatta's top prize, the grand challenge cup. It wasn't required to row Wednesday. The Union Club eight also reached the second round of the Thames Challenge Cup with an easy but unimpressive victory over Reading University.

The Princeton Cottage Club and Belmont Hill School of Massachusetts won their opening heats in the Wyfold challenge-cup event. This is for fours without coxswain.

The Andover schoolboys rowed one of the fastest heats of the Thames Challenge Cup but lost by a few feet to the Thames Rowing Club of London.

Reds Purchase Willie Jones

CINCINNATI (AP)—Cincinnati Reds obtained veteran third baseman Willie Jones from Cleveland Indians Wednesday. Jones was the Philadelphia Phillies' regular third sacker from 1949 until June 5, when he was sent to Cleveland in exchange for outfielder Jim Bojger and Cash.

He went to bat only 18 times for the Indians, getting four hits and driving in one run. Jones batted 271 last year, hit 14 homers and drove in 60 runs. He led the National League in fielding in 1953, 1954, 1955, 1956 and 1958. The 35-year-old infielder played in the National League all-star team in 1950 and 1951.

final against the late Eddie Sanders of California. Anyone who saw the handsome Swede go through his lackadaisical workouts in preparing for Patterson had to be influenced by what he saw. Johansson looked like a joke. The one impressive phase of his training was the number of left jabs he threw and his superb condition.

Olmedo Coasts Into Finals; Barry MacKay Eliminated

By AUBREY HIGGS WIMBLEDON, England (Reuters)—Top-seeded Alex Olmedo coasted into the Wimbledon singles tennis finals Wednesday and the last native American, Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, was eliminated by unranked Rod Laver of Australia.

Olmedo, a Peruvian-born member of the American Davis Cup team, demolished Roy Emerson of Australia in straight sets, 6-4, 6-0, 6-4. Laver, a red-haired 19-year-old, outlasted Mackay 11-13, 11-9, 10-8, 7-9, 6-3 in a tension-packed marathon that lasted three hours 50 minutes. The 1958 U.S. singles match at Wimbledon in six years.
