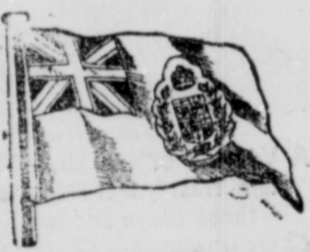

HE CLAIMS DAMAGES.—A Halifax exchange says: An interesting case will come up next term of the County Court. A man named Bayer had a net placed in Salmon river, Halifax Co., which was seized by the Dominion Government officers. Bayer has entered a suit for damages for the net and the fish taken, and also for trespass on his land. He claims that the Dominion Government have no power to pass any law to control him, as his title comes from an old grant giving him the exclusive right of fishing where his net was spread.

STEAMER SOLD.—The steamer Premier was sold at auction at Halifax on Wednesday, for \$31,500 to George Campbell of F. D. Corbett & Co. It is understood that the purchase was made for the Marine Securities Corporation of London, limited. The sale was made at the instance of the Eastern Steamship Company with the consent of the mortgagees. The Marine Securities Corporation held a mortgage on the vessel to secure account current of the Eastern Steamship Company which is due, subject to adjustment of some small items, \$31,251 91. The vessel was sold with the understanding that the mortgagees undertake to release their mortgage upon receipt of the amount due thereon out of the moneys realized on sale of the vessel.—Halifax Herald.

Russian Cruelty.

A GENERAL POISONED WHILE MAKING AN INVESTIGATION.

Letters from Tashkent report that General Baranok, who recently died at that town and is generally believed to have been poisoned by persons unknown, has been the result of the administrative reforms which he was about to introduce in Turkestan, had been deputed to investigate and report upon the conduct of the Grand Duke Nicholas Constantinovich, the czar's cousin, who has lived in exile in Central Asia since the painful drama which 20 years ago brought about the disgrace of his imperial highness.

The grand duke's manner of living is described as strange beyond measure; so extraordinary, indeed, that many people suppose him to be either demented or addicted to habits of intemperance. His tyranny to those about him is excessive and all the people tremble at his approach. Lately the grand duke has had a magnificent palace built at Tashkent, but he lives in an old and dilapidated building with his wife, a person whom he married in a fit of eccentricity and whom he constantly beats. Another of the peculiarities of his imperial highness is to wear at home and abroad a native robe or khalat, which resembles a robe de chambre, and is neither rich in appearance nor free from rents. At his orders are 20 Ural Cossacks who carry out his every command with blind obedience.
