DONAHOE'S MAGAZINE

"I am not at all sanguine that I am making the most judicious selection out of the mass of correspondence at my disposal," says Rev. Matthew Russell, S. J., in the second paper of the series, "Poets I Have Known," in the August number of Donahoe's. "The unpublished letters, now losing their right to that epithet, have been chosen chiefly to illustrate the selections from the second element of the papers.

The interesting nature of those letters is indicated by the names of the writers, including Lord Charles Russell, Cardinal Newman, Frederick Lucas John O'Hagan, Denis Florence McCarthy and John Edward Pigot. The subjects on which they express their views cover a wide range, from literary achievements to home interests, and important parliamentary measures, such as the Gladstone Land Act. A splendid collection of portraits and views illustrate the text.

Other illustrated papers are "Some Kentucky Catholic Literators," by Charles J. O'Malley, who writes with critical yet kindly appreciation of the work they have accomplished, and predicts that in the time to come its influence will be felt;—"An Old Mission in Arizona," and "The Order of Loretto," by Anna C. Minogue.

In "The Moral Power of Music," Mrs. Anette S. Driscoll makes a strong plea for music in making the home attractive.

Judge Jno. J. McDonough relates his personal experience in applying the Law of Probation in Massachusetts. Frequent requests as to the value of the system suggested placing some facts before the general public.

The short stories in this mid-summer number are numerous and good; among them are "A Castle in Spain," by Katherine Tynan Hinkson; "The Prairie Cross," by Charles Curtz Hahn; "The Lilies of Manuel," by Elizabeth Vore; and "The Duke's Motio," by Blanche Elizabeth Wade.
